POLICY CONSIDERATIONS

The Licensing Sub-Committee is required to have regard to the City of Westminster statement of Licensing Policy, effective from 7th January 2016.

GUIDANCE CONSIDERATIONS

The Licensing Sub-Committee is required to have regard to any guidance issued by the Secretary of State under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003. The most recent version was published in April 2018.

CORE HOURS WHEN CUSTOMERS ARE PERMITTED TO BE ON THE PREMISES (As set out in the Council's Statement of Licensing Policy 2016)

For premises for the supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises:

Friday and Saturday: 10:00 to midnight

Sundays immediately prior to Bank Holidays: Midday to midnight

Other Sundays: Midday to 22:30 Monday to Thursday: 10:00 to 23:30.

• For premises for the supply of alcohol for consumption off the premises:

Monday to Saturday: 08:00 to 23:00

Sundays: 10:00 to 22:30.

• For premises for the provision of other licensable activities:

Friday and Saturday: 09.00 to midnight

Sundays immediately prior to Bank Holidays: 09.00 to midnight

Other Sundays: 09.00 to 22.30 Monday to Thursday: 09.00 to 23.30.



Procedure for virtual hearings held under the Licensing Act 2003

The purpose of this procedure is to clarify how the Licensing Sub-Committee ("the Sub-Committee") will conduct virtual licensing hearings made under the Licensing Act 2003 (as amended) and for licensing applications under other regimes. All hearings are conducted with due regard to the Council's Constitution, relevant legislation and case law, regulations and guidance.

Accessing virtual hearings

Virtual Licensing Sub-Committee hearings will be held on Microsoft Teams as a live Teams event. Each application will be dealt with by a separate Teams meeting. All applicants, responsible authorities and other persons (who have submitted a valid representation) (collectively called "Parties") will be provided with a link to the meeting beforehand. **Only these parties will be able to participate in the hearing** (together with their adviser) provided they have registered, in advance, with the Licensing Authority, as specified below. A link for the general public to watch the meeting will be available on the Council's website.

Final Submissions before the Hearing

The parties (or their representatives) should use their best endeavours to ensure that all of their final submissions have been made so as to be included in the Sub-Committee report (typically **no later, than 5.pm, 5 working days** before the Sub-Committee hearing). This means by 5pm on the Thursday, the week before the Sub-Committee hearing is due to take place. Final submissions should set out the key points, policies and conditions that a party wishes the Sub-Committee to take account of in determining the application.

Any final submissions that a party wishes to make, (that have not been submitted so as to have been included in the report), **must** be submitted to the Licensing Service by **no later than 12 noon 3 working days** before the hearing is due to take place. The Licensing email address is: Licensing@westminster.gov.uk.

Rules during Licensing Hearings

The following rules must be followed by all parties to ensure the virtual hearing can progress as successfully as possible:

- All parties wishing to participate in the hearing must register their wish to participate in the hearing and provide their email addresses to the Licensing Service at
 <u>Licensing@westminster.gov.uk</u> no later than 12 noon on the Monday before the Thursday hearing is scheduled to take place.
- All parties should join the virtual hearing at least 15 minutes before the advertised start time to ensure they are ready to start at the advertised start time. After the advertised start time has passed no registered parties will be allowed to join, except in exceptional circumstances, when permitted by the Chairman, as this could disrupt the meeting.
- All parties must only address the hearing when invited to do so by the Chairman.
- All parties must keep their microphones on mute unless they are speaking. The Chairman has the ability to mute all parties' microphones.

- If a party wishes to interject, they should put their name in the messaging field. The chairman has the discretion to invite the party to make their comment at an appropriate stage in the hearing.
- All parties are asked to keep their comments as succinct as possible.
- If a party has a question for another party, this must be addressed to the Chairman who will have the discretion to ask the relevant party to respond.
- Parties wishing to make suggestions as to the conditions that may be imposed in the event
 of the application being granted should do so by reference to the schedule of proposed
 conditions set out in the Conditions Schedule annexed to the committee papers. In so
 doing, they should use the same numbering in that schedule. This is to ensure that there is
 ease of referencing the conditions by all the parties.
- To ensure the smooth running of hearings, a time limit will be placed on each party's submissions. This time limit must be adhered to but the Chairman has the flexibility to amend the time limit when it is considered appropriate to do so.
- When referring to the hearing papers, participants should give the page and paragraph number when appropriate.
- The Chairman has the discretion to amend these rules in any given case where they consider it is appropriate to do so.

Procedure

- The Chairman will open the meeting and introduce the members of the Sub-Committee and the other officers attending with the members, including the legal adviser, policy adviser and committee officer.
- 2. The Chairman will confirm the procedure that the hearing will follow.
- 3. The Sub-Committee members and officers will be asked to declare any interests they may have and any other procedural business will be transacted.
- 4. The presenting officer from the licensing service will introduce the application, giving a brief description of the application and introducing all the Parties in attendance for each application
- 5. Each party who has registered to speak, will be invited to make their representations and will be allowed a maximum of 10 minutes each. In order to ensure that the hearing is fair to all parties and is conducted in an orderly manner, the Chairman has the discretion to extend this time limit where it is appropriate for the determination of the application.
- 6. Parties will normally speak in the following order, (the order may change for other types of licensing applications):
 - a. The applicant
 - b. Responsible authorities
 - c. Other persons
- 7. The Chairman has the right to grant each party the opportunity to ask questions of each other for the purposes of clarification only where it is appropriate to do so. The Sub-Committee members will then be able to ask questions of the parties.

- 8. The legal adviser and/or policy officer may ask questions of the parties as they consider appropriate, including in relation to the conditions which should be attached to the application if the Sub-Committee is minded to grant the application.
- 9. Each party will have an opportunity to make a short closing submission each (not introducing any new evidence or case law) of no more than **5 minutes each**, in the following order:
 - a. Responsible authorities
 - b. Other persons
 - c. The applicant
- 10. The Chairman shall then **close the meeting** and all parties will leave the meeting. A Decision will not be announced at the end of the hearing unless there is a legal requirement to do so.
- 11. The Sub-Committee will deliberate in closed session and all parties will be advised of the outcome in a written Summary Decision. Unless otherwise required or permitted by Regulations, summary decisions will be made within a period of five working days of the last day of the hearing. The written summary of the decision ("Summary Decision") will be sent to all the parties as soon as possible after the Decision has been made. The full Decision, setting out the reasons for the Decision, (Formal Notification) will be sent to the parties as soon as possible thereafter. The time limit for appealing will not commence until the Formal Notification has been sent to the parties.

I refer to the application for a New Premises Licence for the above premises.

The applicant has submitted floor plans of the premises.

This representation is based on the plans and operating schedule submitted.

The applicant is seeking the following

- 1. To provide for the Supply of Alcohol 'On' and 'Off' the premises Monday to Saturday between 10.00 and 03.00 hours and Sunday between 12.00 to 00.00 hours. Unrestricted for hotel residents.
- 2. To provide Late Night Refreshment 'Indoors' and 'Outdoors' Monday to Saturday between 23.00 and 03.30 hours. Unrestricted for hotel residents.
- 3. To provide regulated entertainment comprising
 - Films (Indoors) Unrestricted
 - Live Music (Indoors and Outdoors)
 - Recorded Music (Indoors and Outdoors) Unrestricted
 - Performance of Dance (Indoors and Outdoors)
 - Anything of a similar description to Live Music, Recorded Music and Performance of Dance (Indoors and Outdoors)

Monday to Saturday between 09.00 and 03.00 hours and Sunday between 09.00 to 23.00 hours.

I wish to make the following representation

- 1. The hours requested for the Supply of Alcohol will have the likely effect of causing an increase in Public Nuisance within the area.
- 2. The hours requested to permit the provision of late night refreshment will have the likely effect of causing an increase in Public Nuisance and impact on Public Safety within the area.
- 3. The hours requested to permit the provision of regulated entertainment will have the likely effect of causing an increase in Public Nuisance within the area.

The applicant has stated that this new application is to combine two existing premises Licences for the premises with similar conditions.

A check on the premise's history indicates noise complaints relating to the operation of the premises and additional conditions may be required. A copy of the noise history can be seen at Appendix 3

There should not be any extension of licensing hours, nor any increase in the numbers of people who can drink alcohol until 3am, in order to protect residents from late night noise.			
If this Licence application is granted as it stands, it will allow noise nuisance from non-amplified entertainment/music to residents in the area surrounding the hotel. Both music and the drumming band for the Drum Awards have been causing noise nuisance for residents up to several streets away. The noise bounces off buildings close to the hotel. This amplifies the noise affecting at least five blocks of flats as well as residents of properties closer to the hotel Current Licence conditions state that amplified music or singing should not be audible 1 metre outside any residential property. There is no restriction on NON-amplified music or singing at nuisance levels. The drumming on the Marriott forecourt is not amplified. The other musicians and groups are not always amplified. But the noise they make is louder than much amplified music. Some weddings at the Marriott involved bands of musicians playing around the local streets, unamplified. On the face of it this appears to be a straightforward surrender of two licences and their replacement by a single one which of course is unexceptional. However it would appear that not all conditions in the existing licences have been carried forward into the new licence. Taking licence 13/03942 for example conditions 14,15,21 and 22 fit into that category. 14 is of extreme importance. In our view all these conditions should appear in the new licence. In addition other conditions which are now normally found in licences eg loading /unloading restrictions and emanation of noise might be considered for inclusion in the new licence.

Lately it seems the clients who hire out the venue for their function are bringing in their own catering and sound equipment into the hotel during the day, then at night when the function has finished it is loaded out. This equipment is van loads of catering tins, furniture and sound and

huge sound systems. These huge lorries and vans move to the front of the hotel and start loading up until the early hours of the morning. The casual staff and staff of the hotel then exit out of the back of the hotel noisily with no concern for anyone. There is never a door person or security to tell them to be quiet The noise of the music can also be heard coming from the venue. The base resonates and thuds away until it is turned off. On many occasions the Westminster noise team have been called by myself and other neighbours to complain about these disturbances. The hotel management seem to have no concern for the residents at all. I have spoken to Mr Pask, the general manager on several occasions but the situation gets worse. I have often been told my the managers of the Hotel that they are running a business and there is little that can be done. I work full time and my business as a costume supervisor is just as important as The Marriot Hotel I have attached several images to illustrate my concern. It looks as if in the new licence application that the hours are to be extended until 3pm, 7 days a week. Could you please take into consideration the hundreds of working class people like myself I hotels notice such Claridge's and The Connaught do not have issues like this. I strongly object to this licence going forward. I would appreciate a conversation with someone from Westminster licensing team and the residents association of the and and myself to take place at some point. I do realise we are working class people but it would be wonderful as Westminster residents if we had a voice in this matter. These issues of have really affected my health over the past few years, I do hope you take into consideration my concerns. Over the past 5 years the Marriot has used the venue as a more of a night club / party venue holding several busy parties several times a week. This would be fine if it were not for the clients who bring in their own catering vans and even lorries, sound equipment, and furniture. After 1am in the morning these vans are loaded up, the noise of catering and sound equipment being loaded up till sometimes 3am in the morning is horrendous. The Westminster noise team have been contacted on numerous occasions, groups of drivers and casual staff leave the building noisily and gather in groups chatting and smoking. This is never regulated by a door man of security staff. I have photos to back up my case. The general manager should show some respect to has been here for over 100 years. No other hotel in working class people. the area holds functions such as this and they all survive in business. If the hotel is granted a licence till 3am it will mean noise 24 hours a day. Please will you consider carefully, it would be super if a meeting could be held with the residents . I work full time and this has affected my health and well being considerably. There is also a noisy air vent and compressor machine that need dealing with as well. They need to show the working class a bit of respect and not bully us. Having taken advice on this matter, I would like to submit the following additional points. The application form does not make it clear (nor even seem to refer to the fact) that a number of very important conditions on the current licences have been deleted from the proposals. The application states that conditions 'have been amended to reflect the current position and remove anomalies'. I was not able to view the proposed conditions until recently as they had not been made available on the Council's website. Those which have not been replicated are (numbers are as per licence 13/03942/LIPDPS):

- 14. The type of entertainment to be provided at the premises shall be restricted to dancing and the showing of videos; live entertainment, provided by a maximum of eight performers up to ten dates per annum; DJs up to twenty five dates per annum
- 15. The entertainment to be provided under this licence shall remain ancillary to the main use of the building as a hotel.
- 21. There shall be no direct access from the street to any bar.
- 22. No external advertisement of the Licensed facilities.

As will be clear from my representations previously, the presence of these conditions on the current licences has not proved sufficient to prevent nuisance from a variety of sources connected to events held at the hotel. The absence of these conditions is therefore extremely concerning, particularly as the applicant should be well aware of issues arising from these events. Accordingly, it is extremely concerning that the applicant appears, by omitting these conditions, to be widening the scope of events and licensable activities to the public without any mitigating action or proposals.

It is very difficult from looking at the plans of the premises whether the Licensed areas are changing.

The Marriott Hotel Duke Street is situated in an area that has a large residential population, some of the dwellings look straight out onto the hotel these dwellings consist of residents of all ages consisting of very young to very senior people some of whom are disabled, the residents consist of retired, working and those in education all of who have different sleep and rest requirements. There are dwellings in neighbouring streets where residents who fall into the same categories live, some of these dwellings are on the routes to and from the underground stations, the future Crossrail station and bus routes. An increase in the licence hours is going to make existing problems worse and create new ones causing extra disturbance to residents who need to get up early for work or other reasons It is on these grounds that I object very strongly to the application being granted.


Fire Exit Route

 - (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic (other than any promotion or discount available to an individual in respect of alcohol for consumption at a table meal, as defined in section 159 of the Act);
 - (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less;
 - (d) provision of free or discounted alcohol in relation to the viewing on the premises of a sporting event, where that provision is dependent on;
 - (i) the outcome of a race, competition or other event or process, or
 - (ii) the likelihood of anything occurring or not occurring;
 - (e) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner.
- 5. The responsible person shall ensure that no alcohol is dispensed directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).

- (a) Subject to the following paragraphs, the permitted hours on weekdays shall commence at 10.00 (12:00 on Christmas Day and Good Friday) and extend until 03.00 on the morning following, except that -
 - (i) the permitted hours shall end at 00.00 midnight on any day on which music and dancing is not provided after midnight; and
 - (ii) on any day that music and dancing end between 00.00 midnight and 03.00, the permitted hours shall end when the music and dancing end;
- (b) In relation to the morning on which summer time begins, paragraph (a) of this condition shall have effect-
 - (i) with the substitution of references to 04.00 for references to 03.00.
- (c) The sale of alcohol must be ancillary to the use of the premises for music and dancing and substantial refreshment.
- (d) The permitted hours on New Year's Eve will extend to the start of permitted hours on the following day 00:00 on 31st December or if there are no permitted hours on 1 January, to 00:00 on New Year's Eve.

NOTE - The above restrictions do not prohibit:

- the supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises to any private friends of a person residing there who are bona fide entertained by him at his own expense, or the consumption of alcohol by persons so supplied;
- (j) the supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises to persons employed there for the purposes of the business carried on by the holder of the licence, or the consumption of liquor so supplied, if the liquor is supplied at the expense of their employer or of the person carrying on or in charge of the business on the premises.

In this condition, any reference to a person residing in the premises shall be construed as including a person not residing there but carrying on or in charge of the business on the premises.

- 21. No person under fourteen shall be in the bar of the Licensed premises during the permitted hours unless one of the following applies:
 - (a) He is the child of the holder of the premises licence.
 - (b) He resides in the premises, but is not employed there.

But an area is not a bar when it is usual for it to be, and it is, set apart for the service of table meals and alcohol is only sold or supplied to persons as an ancillary to their table meals.

22.	The terminal hour for late night refreshment on New Year's Eve is extended to 05:00 on New Year's Day.



 - (2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises—
 - (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to;
 - (i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
 - (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
 - (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
 - (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or

less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;

- (d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner;
- (e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).
- 5. The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
- 6. (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
 - (2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.
 - (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either—

 - (iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;
- (d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and
- (e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.
- 8(iii). Where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8(ii)(b) above would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.

 - (b) to control the movement of the children and other persons admitted while entering and leaving the building or any part thereof, and
 - (c) to take all other reasonable precautions for the safety of the children.
- 22. The terminal hour for late night refreshment on New Year's Eve is extended to 05:00 on New Year's Day.
- 23. No regulated entertainment shall take place on the private forecourt after 21:45 hours.
- 24. There shall be no more than 4 tables and 8 chairs on the private forecourt.
- 25. After 23:00 hours the private forecourt shall not be used by patrons and staff for licensable activities.
- 26. All licensable activities (including associated clearing, cleaning and collection of bottles or glassware) in the private forecourt area shall cease by 23:00 hours.
- 27. All outside tables and chairs in the private forecourt area shall be brought inside or rendered unusable by 23:00 hours.
- 28. When the private forecourt area is used solely for customers seated at outside tables and chairs alcohol shall be served by waiter or waitress only and only to persons seated at tables.
- 29. Regulated entertainment on the private forecourt will not start before 10:00 hours and will cease at 21:45 hours.
- 30. No more than 12 events per annum are to take place on the private forecourt area and notification to the Licensing Authority, Metropolitan Police and Residents Association shall be given 7 days in advance.
- 31. Amplified music and or speech played on the private forecourt area shall not be audible at any time 1 metre outside residential properties.

Conditions proposed by the Police and agreed with the applicant so as to form part of the operating schedule.

32. The premises shall install and maintain a comprehensive CCTV system as per the minimum requirements of the Westminster Police Licensing Team. All entry and exit points will be covered enabling frontal identification of every person entering in any light

condition. The CCTV system shall continually record whilst the premises is open for licensable activities and during all times when customers remain on the premises. All recordings shall be stored for a minimum period of 31 days with date and time stamping. Viewing of recordings shall be made available immediately upon the request of Police or authorised officer throughout the entire 31 day period.

- 33. A staff member from the premises who is conversant with the operation of the CCTV system shall be on the premises at all times when the premises is open. This staff member must be able to provide a Police or authorised council officer copies of recent CCTV images or data with the absolute minimum of delay when requested.
- 34. An incident log shall be kept at the premises, and made available on request to an authorised officer of the City Council or the Police. It must be completed within 24 hours of the incident and will record the following:
 - (a) all crimes reported to the venue
 - (b) all ejections of patrons
 - (c) any complaints received concerning crime and disorder
 - (d) any incidents of disorder
 - (e) all seizures of drugs or offensive weapons
 - (g) any refusal of the sale of alcohol
 - (h) any visit by a relevant authority or emergency service.
- 35. A Challenge 25 proof of age scheme shall be operated at the premises where the only acceptable forms of identification are recognised photographic identification cards, such as a driving licence, passport or proof of age card with the PASS Hologram.

Conditions proposed by the Environmental Health

- 36. There shall be no live music provided within the external forecourt area of the hotel.
- 37. After 20.00 hours, all equipment used as part of an event within the ground floor function rooms shall only be removed from the premises following the end of that event via the front entrance of the hotel and loaded directly into vehicles parked within the external forecourt.
- 38. Sound deadening material shall be temporarily laid out on the external forecourt at all times that equipment is being removed from the hotel following an event in the ground floor function rooms.
- 39. The hotel night manager or someone with equivalent responsibility shall use their best endeavours to ensure that all vehicles collecting equipment following a function have their engines and radios switched off, that conversation by all persons within the external forecourt is kept to a minimum and that the sound deadening material is appropriately laid out to all vehicles.
