The premises will also add to its conditions the following condition: A copy of the premises' dispersal policy shall be made readily available at the premises for inspection by a Police officer and/or an authorised officer of Westminster City Council. I am writing with reference to the above application for which I am in receipt of. The premises is located within the Cumulative Impact Area and it is our belief that the changes applied for will have a negative impact on Crime and disorder. Therefore the Metropolitan Police as a responsible authority are making a representation against this application. The changes of greatest concern are those applied to increase the hours of sale for take away alcohol and late night refreshment. Premises offering late night refreshment as takeaway particularly those that are open later than the surrounding bars and or other fast food restaurants, this will lead to an increase of footfall in the area and with the addition of intoxication this can increase crime and disorder. The most common crimes being those of Theft, Robbery and Assault. Whilst I appreciate consideration has been taken to amend the need for SIA staff, this will not suffice for the impact caused by take away sales. Therefore I am proposing that Condition 43 remains on the licence. Please let me know if you would like to discuss this further.

The applicant is seeking the following:

1. Extend the sale of alcohol, late night refreshment and opening hours from midnight to 1am Thursday, Friday and Saturday with consequent changes to conditions as follows:

• Condition 42 to read; "On Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays, from 22:00 until close, there shall be a minimum of 1 SIA door supervisor on duty at the premises. They shall wear either a high visibility yellow jacket or vest"

Remove existing condition 43

• Condition 44 to read " to "There shall be no supply of alcohol for consumption off the premises after 23:30 hours Monday to Wed, 00.30 Thurs to Sat and 23:30 on Sunday "

I wish to make the following representations based on the plans and operating schedule submitted:

1. The extension in hours for the licensable activities sought and subsequent changes to conditions may have the effect of increasing Public Nuisance in the WECIZ.

Environmental Health also makes the following comments:

- The extension in hours sought go further beyond 'core' hours and insufficient mitigation has been provided to take account of the fact that the premises is located in the WECIZ
- The changes in conditions are insufficient to allay Environmental Health concerns and particular concern is registered for the removal of condition 43
- The Council revised its Statement of Licensing Policy earlier this year. One of the new requirements under the Policy is that greater emphasis has been placed on licensed premises demonstrating compliance with policy CH1, Protection of Children from Harm, (see page 36 of policy)

I write in relation to the application submitted for a variation of the premises licence for Basement To Second Floor, 138 Shaftesbury Avenue, London, WC2H 8HB

As a responsible authority under section 13 (4) of the Licensing Act 2003 as amended under the Police and Social Responsibility Act 2011, the Licensing Authority have considered your application in full. The Licensing Authority has concerns in relation to this application and how the premises would promote the four Licensing Objectives: Public Nuisance

Prevention of Crime & Disorder

Public Safety

Protection of children from harm

The application seeks the following variations:

(1) extend the sale of alcohol, late night refreshment and opening hours from midnight to 1am

Thursday Friday and Saturday. NO changes on other days

(2) vary existing condition 42. from "On Fridays and Saturdays, from 22:00 until close, there shall be a minimum of 1 SIA door supervisor on duty at the premises. They shall wear either a high visibility yellow jacket or vest." to "On Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays, from 22:00 until close, there shall be a minimum of 1 SIA door supervisor on duty at the premises. They shall wear either a high visibility yellow jacket or vest."

(3) remove existing condition 43 - There shall be no sales of hot food or hot drink for consumption off the premises after 23.30 hours.

(4) vary existing condition 44. from "There shall be no supply of alcohol for consumption off the premises after 23:00 hours Monday to Saturday and 22:30 on Sunday " to "There shall be no supply of alcohol for consumption off the premises after 23:30 hours Monday to Wed, 00.30 Thurs to Sat and 23:30 on Sunday "

The premises is located within the West End Cumulative Impact Area and as such various policy points must be considered, namely HSR1, RTN1 and CIP1.

Policy CIP1 states:

A. It is the Licensing Authority's policy to refuse applications within the West End Cumulative Impact Zone for: pubs and bars, fast food premises, and music and dancing and similar entertainment, other than applications to:

1. Vary the hours within Core Hours under Policy HRS1, and/or

2. Vary the licence to reduce the overall capacity of the premises.

C. Applications for other premises types within the West End Cumulative Impact Zones will be subject to other policies within this statement and must demonstrate that they will not add to cumulative impact.

D. For the purposes of this policy the premises types referred to in Clause A are defined within the relevant premises use policies within this statement.

Policy RTN1(B) states:

B. Applications inside the West End Cumulative Impact Zone will generally be granted subject to:

1. The application meeting the requirements of policies CD1, PS1, PN1 and CH1.

2. The hours for licensable activities are within the council's Core Hours Policy HRS1.

3. The applicant has demonstrated that they will not add to cumulative impact within the Cumulative Impact Zone.

4. The application and operation of the venue meeting the definition of a restaurant as per Clause C.

C. For the purposes of this policy a restaurant is defined as:

1. A premises in which customers are shown to their table or the customer will select a table themselves to which food is either served to them or they have collected themselves.

2. Which provide food in the form of substantial table meals that are prepared on the premises and are served and consumed at a table.

Which do not provide any takeaway service of food and/or drink for immediate consumption.
 Where alcohol shall not be sold, supplied, or consumed on the premises otherwise than to persons who are bona fide taking substantial table meals and provided always that the consumption of alcohol by such persons is ancillary to taking such meals.

5. The sale and consumption of alcohol prior to such meals may be in a bar area but must also be ancillary to the taking of such meal.

Policy HRS1 (C) (8) states that the core hours for restaurants are:

Monday to Thursday: 9am to 11.30pm.

Friday and Saturday: 9am to 12am.

Sunday: 9am to 22.30pm.

Sundays immediately prior to a bank holiday: 9am to 12am

HRS1 (D) states: Core hours are when customers are permitted to be on the premises and therefore the maximum opening hours permitted will be to the same start and terminal hours for each of the days where licensable activity is permitted

The applicant is seeking to vary the hours outside of core hours in the West end cumulative impact zone, therefore the Licensing Authority encourage the applicant to provide submissions on how this will not add to cumulative impact in the West End Cumulative Impact.

The Licensing Authority has concerns over the removal of condition 43 below and encourages the applicant to provide further submissions on how this will be operated and controlled to have no adverse impact on the cumulative impact area. *43. There shall be no sales of hot food or hot drink for consumption off the premises after 23.30 hours.*

Paragraph F101 states; Fast food premises provide late night refreshment either by way of take-away food for immediate consumption, or fast food on a counter or self-seating basis. These types of premises are in general more likely than restaurants (as defined in this section) to lead to people remaining on the streets of the West End Cumulative Impact Zone or returning rapidly to those streets. If no fast food premises were available people would be more inclined to disperse, and in retaining people until a later hour these fast food premises undermine the objective of timely dispersal. Late at night, it is likely that they would be attractive to persons who have been drinking elsewhere.

The Licensing Authority considers that seeking to minimize the number of people on the street late at night, through rapid dispersal, especially those who have been drinking, is fundamental to promoting the licensing objectives of the prevention of crime and disorder, public nuisance, and public safety. The Licensing Authority comes to this view notwithstanding the benefits which may be offered by well run fast food premises in terms of security, staff, CCTV, toilets, and the provision of a safe environment in which to wait until transport is available. These aspects have been considered by the council but are outweighed by the need for more rapid dispersal from the area in order to promote the licensing objectives.

The Licensing Authority's policies, in relation to the Cumulative Impact Areas, are directed at the global and cumulative effects of licences on the area as a whole. The Licensing Authority encourages the applicant to provide further submissions as to how the extension in hours and removal of condition 43 will not add to cumulative impact in the West End cumulative impact area, as per policy CIP1 and RNT1.

The Licensing Authority looks forward to receiving further submissions from the applicant in due course.

About The Soho Society

The Soho Society is a charitable company limited by guarantee established in 1972. The society is a recognised amenity group and was formed to make Soho a better place to live, work or visit by preserving and enhancing the area's existing diversity of character and uses, and by improving its facilities, amenities and environment.

Condition 40: The number of persons permitted in the premises (excluding staff) shall not exceed, first floor 80 persons, with no more than 120 persons at any one time. **Condition 43:** there shall be no sales of hot food or hot drink or consumption off the premises after 23.30 hours.

The Soho Society's position

The application: this 'restaurant' / fast food premises is situated in very close proximity to Soho and has applied to extend its alcohol licence on Thursday to Saturday by 1 hour from 12pm to 1am. It also proposes to vary condition 44 which would facilitate the supply of food and alcohol off the premises on Mon - Weds by 30 minutes to 11.30pm, Thurs - Sat by 1.5 hours to 1am, and Sunday 1 hour to 11.30pm.

These premises on the junction with Cambridge Circus, Charing Cross Road, Shaftesbury Avenue and Soho is in an area already known for its high level of crime and public nuisance. The proposed extension to its licence, with a capacity of 120 people and a takeaway offer for immediate consumption will increase these levels and have a detrimental impact on residents living on Charing Cross Road, Shaftesbury Avenue and in Soho. We therefore object to this application as it will fail to promote the licensing objectives and increase cumulative impact in the West End CIZ.

Night time economy: Soho is at the forefront of the late-night economy in Westminster with its

numerous restaurants, bars and entertainment establishments. The area is already densely populated at night with people drinking on the street, creating loud levels of noise, causing disturbance and anti-social behaviour. In Soho between 01:00 - 06:00 there are 114 licensed premises for the sale of alcohol in Soho, with a capacity of well over 20,483.

Old Compton Street: just beyond Shaftesbury Avenue lies Old Compton St and the neighbouring Greek, Frith and Dean Streets offer a range of mixed uses including, restaurants, retail shops, bars, cafes, night clubs, pubs and residential accommodation. These streets attract large numbers of people during the daytime and even greater numbers at night due to the high number of evening and late night premises on offer. This area has the largest concentration of licensed premises in Soho, *106 in total between the hours of 00:00 - 03:30 and with a capacity of over 10,000.* A new late night restaurant / takeaway on the other side of the street will have a huge impact in this part of Soho.

Statement of Licensing Policy 2021

Reviewing the Statement of Licensing Policy, the following policies apply to this application.

Core Hours Policy HRS1: this application seeks to extend its alcohol on and off sales licence outside of core hours. When considering such applications the Council must consider the effect of later opening hours on compliance with the requirements of other policies, in particular CD1 and PN1, and also have regard to the following which are relevant in this case; residential accommodation in the proximity of the premises and its impact, and the hours of licensable premises in the vicinity.

Restaurants Policy RTN1: The Policy states, 'B. Applications inside the West End Cumulative Impact Zone will generally be granted subject to...' and goes on to list four criteria one of which being,

3. 'The application has demonstrated that they will not add to cumulative impact within the Cumulative Impact Zone.'

Section C provides the definition of a restaurant which includes, 3. 'Which do not provide any takeaway service or food and a drink for immediate consumption.'

Fast Food Premises FFP1: although these premises is described as a 'restaurant' with a takeaway offer (including alcohol) the operation is more aligned to the operating model of McDonalds, counter service serving chicken and chips in disposable paper containers, in our view it meets the criteria associated with fast food premises as defined in section D,

1. 'A premises that provides late-night refreshment, either by way of fast food over a counter, via a self seating basis or takeaway for immediate consumption.'

3. 'The food and drink are provided in pre-sealed or opened disposable packaging which is intended for immediate consumption.'

It is policy to refuse such applications in the West End CIZ, F.30 states premises, '....open after 11 pm can attract large groups of customers, many of whom have been consuming alcohol in pubs, bars or nightclubs sometimes some distance away. The congregation of people around these premises leads to additional noise and disturbance...'. The Licensing Authority and Met Police are also concerned with the levels of crime and disorder outside such premises (F.31). The applicant will need to demonstrate why they are an exception to policy, we believe there is none.

Cumulative Impact Policy CIP1

This area has been identified by the Westminster City Council (Statement of Licensing Policy, 2021) as under stress because of the cumulative effect of the concentration of late night and drink led premises and night cafes has led to serious problems of disorder and/or public

nuisance affecting residents, visitors and other businesses.

The policies in relation to the stress areas are directed at the global and cumulative effects of licences on the area as a whole (D16. of the policy). The policy provides a presumption to refuse pubs and bars, music and dance venues and fast food premises, the policies are intended to be strict and will only be overridden in genuinely exceptional circumstances (D.11 of the policy). The growth in the number of licensed premises in Soho has led to a marked deterioration in the quality of life and well-being of local residents and it has jeopardised the sustainability of the community. Soho has a substantial residential community and many of these residents suffer from problems such as, but not limited to, high levels of noise nuisance, problems with waste, urinating and defecating in the streets, threats to public safety, anti-social behaviour, crime and disorder and the change in character of this historic area. Any addition to the number of people on the streets late at night will increase cumulative impact in the West End Cumulative Impact Zone.

The Licensing Objectives

In our view this application will fail to promote the following licensing objectives.

Prevention of Crime and Disorder

The recently published Westminster City Council Cumulative Impact Assessment 2020 presents overwhelming evidence of the year on year increase in cumulative impact in the West End Zone 1 which includes Soho, *it highlights the rate of crime as 10 - 13 times higher between 6pm - 6am compared to the borough average.* It goes on to detail the number and types of crimes in the West End as presented below.

- **Public realm crimes:** (serious violence, robberies, theft and drug offences), alcohol-related callouts incidents, anti-social behaviour and demands on services were prevalent in Westminster between 2017 and 2019, among the highest in London and the country. All incidents observed concentrated in the West End many occurring in the evening and at night as well as weekends.
- Total incident type 2017-2019: serious violent crimes Night, 795 proportion of Borough's incidents (31%). Robberies Night, 2237 (33%). Theft and Handling Night, 24,407 (33%). Drug Offences Night, 1529 (40%). Noise Complaints Night, 1389 (16%). Reactive Waste Management, 6630 (10%). Ambulance call outs to locations of licensed premises, 5353 (22%). Anti-Social behaviour on transport Night, 592 (13%), Anti-Social behaviour MPS, 9662 (16%). Total = 50,594.
- Data description of incidents in 2017-2019 found all incident categories observed varied both in space and time. Many occurred in the evening and at night and on weekends when alcohol related activities typically peak. Incidents where primarily concentrated in the West End where licensed premises are disproportionally concentrated.
- **Robberies:** clustered within the West End, Charing Cross, Oxford Street in the evening and night.
- Serious violent crimes: recorded between 6pm and 6am concentrated overwhelmingly in the West End.
- **Drug related crimes**: Westminster recorded the highest volume of drug offences of any borough between 2017-2019. Half of crimes were reported (48%) in the evening and night time. Drug related crimes between **6pm 6am** were significantly clustered in and around the west end to varying degrees.
- **Theft and Handling:** most common crime type in the borough, in the evening and night they are particularly concentrated in the West End and along Oxford Street.

Comparing crime statistics in and around Old Compton St between September 2019 to

February 2020 shows high levels of crimes in this small area of Soho,

Old Compton St: Robbery= 19. Theft person = 162. Violence with injury = 47. All crime = 429.

Dean St: Robbery = 12. Theft person = 57. Violence with injury = 30. All crime = 280.

Greek St : Robbery = 12. Theft person = 76. Violence with injury = 33. All crime = 244

Frith St : Robbery = 13. Theft person = 46. Violence with injury = 23. All crime = 143.

Criminal activity is not limited to these types of crimes at night, these streets and especially Old Compton St also attracts drug dealers who are in the area targeting people as they leave premises, there are more dealers in the area at night than during the daytime, this is linked to the large number of late night venues which in turn creates the drug market.

The CIA 2020 highlights the rise in crime late at night, people already intoxicated will be drawn to these premises from other pubs and bars in the area on the search of late night food, with a capacity of 120 there is a real prospect of people becoming victims of crime as they leave these premises, the same also applies to those buying off sales of food and alcohol.

We have provided evidence of the high levels of crime in the area. We believe if the application is granted it will increase the level of crime and disorder.

Prevention of Public Nuisance

There are a significant number of residential properties in this area and residents already suffer from noise disturbance and antisocial behaviour from the huge number of licensed premises. This area attracts large numbers of people on a night out either eating or drinking in the numerous premises or just walking through and hanging around, it is an extremely busy and noisy place late at night attracting pedicabs playing very loud music, intoxicated people shouting and screaming and without public toilets the streets and private doorways become the outdoor toilets.

We are in no doubt patrons from these premises will enter Soho searching for more entertainment, adding to the existing noise and disturbance suffered by residents living on these streets. If granted this application will result in a further reduction in residential amenity.

Conclusion

The application proposes to extend its on and off sales licence in an area already saturated with late night licences. If granted these premises will fail to promote the licensing objectives and increase cumulative impact in the West End Cumulative Impact Zone. We respectfully request this application is rejected.

Annex 1 – Mandatory conditions

- 1. No supply of alcohol may be made at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of this licence.
- 2. No supply of alcohol may be made at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or the personal licence is suspended.
- 3. Every supply of alcohol under this licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.
- 4.
- (1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
- (2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises
 - (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to;
 - drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
 - drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
 - (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
 - (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
 - (d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner;
 - (e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).
- 5. The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
- 6.
- (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.

- (2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.
- (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either –
 - (a) a holographic mark, or
 - (b) an ultraviolet feature.
- 7. The responsible person must ensure that
 - (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures -
 - (i) beer or cider: ¹/₂ pint;
 - (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
 - (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml;
 - (b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
 - (c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

A responsible person in relation to a licensed premises means the holder of the premise licence in respect of the premises, the designated premises supervisor (if any) or any individual aged 18 or over who is authorised by either the licence holder or designated premises supervisor. For premises with a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity that which enables him to prevent the supply of alcohol.

- 8(i) A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.
- 8(ii) For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 8(i) above -
 - "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979;
 - (b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula -

P = D + (DxV)

Where -

- (i) P is the permitted price,
- D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
- V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;

- (c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence -
 - (i) the holder of the premises licence,
 - (ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or
 - (iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;
- (d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and
- (e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.
- 8(iii). Where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8(ii)(b) above would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.

8(iv).

- (1) Sub-paragraph 8(iv)(2) below applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8(ii)(b) above on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.
- (2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.
- 9. All persons guarding premises against unauthorised access or occupation or against outbreaks of disorder or against damage (door supervisors) must be licensed by the Security Industry Authority.


- 10. The sale of alcohol for consumption on the premises shall only be to persons purchasing a substantial table meal there and as an ancillary to that meal, which is to be eaten seated at a table or counter in the premises.
- 11. Substantial food and non-intoxicating beverages, including drinking water, shall be available in all parts of the premises where alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises.
- 12. No super-strength beer, lagers, ciders or spirit mixtures of 5.5% ABV (alcohol by volume) or above shall be sold at the premises
- 13. There shall be no self service of alcohol.
- 14. A Challenge 25 proof of age scheme shall be operated at the premises where the only acceptable forms of identification are recognised photographic identification cards, such as a driving licence, passport or proof of age card with the PASS Hologram
- 15. The premises shall install and maintain a comprehensive CCTV system as per the minimum requirements of the Westminster Police Licensing Team. All entry and exit points will be covered enabling frontal identification of every person entering in any light condition. The CCTV system shall continually record whilst the premises is open for licensable activities and during all times when customers remain on the premises. All recordings shall be stored for a minimum period of 31 days with date and time stamping. Viewing of recordings shall be made available immediately upon the request of Police or authorised officer throughout the entire 31 day period.
- 16. A staff member from the premises who is conversant with the operation of the CCTV system shall be on the premises at all times when the premises is open. This staff member must be able to provide a Police or authorised council officer copies of recent CCTV images or data with the absolute minimum of delay when requested.
- 17. A direct telephone number for the manager at the premises shall be publicly available at all times the premises is open. This telephone number is to be made available to residents and businesses in the vicinity.
- 18. No rubbish, including bottles, shall be moved, removed or placed in outside areas between 0000 hours and 0600 hours or as in compliance with Westminster City Council's own waste contractor collection hours.
- No deliveries of alcohol to the premises shall take place between 23:00 hours and 06:00 hours on the following day
- 20. Notices shall be prominently displayed at all exits requesting patrons to respect the needs of local residents and businesses and leave the area quietly.
- 21. Persons temporarily leaving the premises onto the public highway for the purposes of smoking shall not take any drinks with them.
- 22. Notices shall be prominently displayed at any area used for smoking requesting patrons to respect the needs of local residents and use the area quietly.
- 23. The premises licence holder shall ensure that any patrons smoking outside the premises do so in an orderly manner and are supervised by staff so as to ensure that there is no public nuisance or obstruction of the public highway.


- 24. No noise generated on the premises, or by its associated plant or equipment, shall emanate from the premises nor vibration be transmitted through the structure of the premises which gives rise to a nuisance.
- 25. During the hours of operation of the premises, the licence holder shall ensure sufficient measures are in place to remove and prevent litter or waste arising or accumulating from customers in the area immediately outside the premises, and that this area shall be swept and or washed, and litter and sweepings collected and stored in accordance with the approved refuse storage arrangements by close of business.
- 26. The approved arrangements at the premises, including means of escape provisions, emergency warning equipment, the electrical installation and mechanical equipment, shall at all material times be maintained in good condition and full working order.
- 27. The means of escape provided for the premises shall be maintained unobstructed, free of trip hazards, be immediately available and clearly identified in accordance with the plans provided.
- 28. All emergency doors shall be available at all material times without the use of a key, code, card or similar means.
- 29. All emergency doors shall be maintained effectively self-closing and not held open other than by an approved device.
- 30. The edges of the treads of steps and stairways shall be maintained so as to be conspicuous.
- 31. Curtains and hangings shall be arranged so as not to obstruct emergency safety signs or emergency equipment.
- 32. All fabrics, curtains, drapes and similar features including materials used in finishing and furnishing shall be either non-combustible or be durably or inherently flame-retarded fabric. Any fabrics used in escape routes (other than foyers), entertainment areas or function rooms, shall be non-combustible.
- 33. Flashing or particularly bright lights on or outside the premises shall not cause a nuisance to nearby properties, save insofar as they are necessary for the prevention of crime.
- 34. An incident log shall be kept at the premises, and made available on request to an authorised officer of the City Council or the Police. It must be completed within 24 hours of the incident and will record the following:
 - (a) all crimes reported to the venue
 - (b) all ejections of patrons
 - (c) any complaints received concerning crime and disorder
 - (d) any incidents of disorder
 - (e) all seizures of drugs or offensive weapons
 - (f) any faults in the CCTV system
 - (g) any refusal of the sale of alcohol
 - (h) any visit by a relevant authority or emergency service.
- 35. The premises may remain open for the sale of alcohol and the provision of late night refreshment from the terminal hour for those activities on New Year's Eve through to the commencement time for those activities on New Year's Day.
- 36. All sales of alcohol for consumption off the premises shall be in sealed containers and ancillary to a takeaway meal only, and shall not be consumed on the premises or in the immediate vicinity of the premises.

- 37. The sale of alcohol shall be limited to a selection of 3 beers.
- 38. No fumes, steam or odours shall be emitted from the licensed premises so as to cause a nuisance to any persons living or carrying on business in the area where the premises are situated.
- 39. All waste shall be properly presented and placed out for collection no earlier than 30 minutes before the scheduled collection times
- The number of persons permitted in the premises (excluding staff) shall not exceed
 First floor: 80 persons
 With no more than 120 persons at any one time
- 41. There shall be no licensable activity in the basement or on the second floor of the premises.
- 42. On Fridays and Saturdays, from 22:00 until close, there shall be a minimum of 1 SIA door supervisor on duty at the premises. They shall wear either a high visibility yellow jacket or vest.
- 43. There shall be no sales of hot food or hot drink for consumption off the premises after 23.30 hours.
- 44. There shall be no supply of alcohol for consumption off the premises after 23:00 hours Monday to Saturday and 22:30 on Sunday

Wingstop

This is a chain of restaurants where the sole focus is on the flavour of chicken wings. The restaurant chain was founded in 1994 in Garland, Texas and their headquarters are in Dallas, Texas.

1997 saw the opening of their first franchised Wingstop location and by 2002 they had served the world one billion wings. Its' flavour that defines them and has made Wingstop one of the fastest growing brands in the restaurant industry attracting top entrepreneurs and operators with the drive and passion to own their own business.

There are more than 1,000 restaurants open across the United States, Mexico, Singapore, the Philippines, Indonesia, and the United Arab Emirates. This restaurant on Shaftesbury Avenue is the flagship for the UK and has been operating for almost 6 months.

The Food

Wingstop is the destination when you crave fresh (never faked) wings, hand-cut seasoned fries and any of their famous sides. It is for people who demand flavour in everything they do because it's more than a meal, it's a flavour experience. The average spend per person is around £15.

The Location

The restaurant is located on the corner of Shaftesbury Avenue and Charing Cross Road, at Cambridge Circus. The unit was previously occupied by HSBC bank and comprises basement, ground, first and second floors, with a total floor area of 395.6sqm.

The restaurant is be laid out with the kitchen and a seating area at ground floor level and an accessible WC, the main seating area and customer toilets at first floor level and ancillary storage and staff facilities at basement level.

Transport Links

The site is well served by a variety of modes of public transport including many 24hr bus services and three nearby underground stations; namely Charing Cross Road, Tottenham Court Road and Leicester Square Station which all provide 24 hour tube services on weekends.

The area surrounding the premises is predominantly commercial with a number of similar premises within a few yards of Wingstop. The management and staff at Wingstop have developed good working relationships with a number of local businesses, of which several businesses have taken the time to provide letters in support of our variation; which are included in the licensing hearing report.

Waste Management

Wingstop have allocated an area of the ground floor as a bin storage area to accommodate wheelie bins for storage of waste and recycling.

All waste and recycling is collected on a daily basis by a private waste service provider or by the Local Authority.

Amendments to Application

The applicant had applied for extended hours for off sales of alcohol and late night refreshment at the premises, and the removal of condition 43 of the licence.

These amendments to the licence are no longer sought, having read the representations.

The variation application is therefore limited to extending the hours for alcohol, late night refreshment and opening hours from midnight to 1am Thursday, Friday and Saturday. No changes are sought for the other days of the week.

Following on from this, condition 42 would be amended so security was also provided on Thursday as per the application form.

The operation would therefore be restricted to condition 10 on the existing licence which reads:

The sale of alcohol for consumption on the premises shall only be to persons purchasing a substantial table meal there and as an ancillary to that meal, which is to be eaten seated at a table or counter in the premises.

The premises will also add to its conditions the following condition:

A copy of the premises' dispersal policy shall be made readily available at the premises for inspection by a Police officer and/or an authorised officer of Westminster City Council.

We confirm that the average customer must wait between 8 and 12 minutes for their order to be ready as the food is freshly prepared dependant on the flavours ordered. In turn, we feel Wingstop does not operate as a fast food premises and therefore should not be associated with the cumulative impact often caused by such venues.

The premises is located on the Cambridge Circus junction and surrounded by a number of premises operating to a similar concept and to a later hour. The premises benefits from not having residents as neighbours therefore any concerns with operations later in the evening impacting on local residents is minimized.



Health & Safety/Food Safety Trainings at WINGSTOP UK

Each of our employee completes their Health & Safety/Food safety trainings on our E-learning platform as well as being trained on site once completing site specific risk assessments.

All e-learning modules are to be completed within 5 days from the beginning of employment.

CGCA Document supporting Soho Society Representation

This document is being provided by the Covent Garden Community Association (CGCA) in support of the Soho Societies Representation regarding the application by Wingstop, 138 Shaftesbury Avenue London WC2H 8HB to vary its licence (Application 21/07770/LIPV).

The CGCA's area of interest is on the East side of Charing Cross Road. Although these premises are on the West they have an impact in the immediate vicinity. The CGCA, with the Soho Societies support, recently opposed an application to Camden for a New Late Night Refreshment Licence on the East side of Cambridge Circus (German Doner Kebab). This application was refused because of the risk of harm to the Licensing Objectives. We believe that the proposed extension of hours for Wingstop risks the same type of harm.

Application

This is an application for to vary the Licence for Wingstop. The variation seeks to make the following changes to **ending** times for Licensable Activities. There are no changes to start times

These changes mean that the premises could operate an additional 3 hours per week for licensable activities on the premises and an additional 5.5 hours for the sale of hot food and 6 hours for the sale of alcohol for consumption off the premises.

The CGCA supports the Soho Society's view that the grant of a variation to allow these additional hours will fail to support the Licensing Objectives related to Public Nuisance and Crime and Disorder. Given their location in the heart of the CIZ, and next door to Camden's CIA, they already attract large numbers of customers in the late evening who make substantial amounts of noise. The customers who purchase food and drink for takeaway cause noise away from the premises in the areas where they consume their purchases, and also leave litter in those locations.

Premises Location

The premises are situated on the South-West corner of Cambridge Circus. There are significant amounts of residential property on the East side of Charing Cross Road both North and South of the

Circus which fall within the CGCA's area, even though the premises are outside this area. A map showing residential accommodation in the vicinity is given as Attachment 1. This is not complete as we are not aware of all of the location of residents in Soho, to the North-West of the Circus.

The area within 0.5 miles of the premises typically has a very high level of reported crime as illustrated in Attachment 2. In 2019 (the last full year before COVID19) this area had 38,209 reported crime, or 42% of the total reported crime in the whole of Westminster for the same period, in 9.5% of the area of the City.

Much of this crime is associated with the high number of visitors to the area, as they are attractive targets for criminals, and with the night-time economy. Both Camden and Westminster have designated this part of their respective Boroughs as Cumulative Impact Areas because of the harm to the Licensing Objectives from the large number of licensed premises in the area.

Impact on the Licensing Objectives

In considering the impact of the proposed variation on the Licensing Objectives we believe that it is appropriate to look at the different elements of the variation separately and consider each of them on its merits.

Extension of operations on the premises from 00:00-01:00 Thursday to Saturday

The premises propose to open for an additional hour on 3 nights of the week. These premises are not a traditional restaurant with waiter service etc. This is a Quick Service Restaurant (QSR), making it more similar to a McDonalds. QSR premises have a high throughput of people eating on the premises. The proposal to remain for 1 hour after core hours on Friday and Saturday and 1.5 hours later on Thursday will encourage customers to come to these premises from other parts of the CIZ, or Camden's CIA, when the pubs and bars there close, rather than dispersing from the area. This will add to the number of people in the area in the early morning, contributing to the cumulative impact from all licenced premises in the area. The fact that the customers will be eating on the premises does not make any difference, they can still cause issues in the area arriving and leaving the premises.

Later hours for food to be sold for consumption off the premises

The application proposes to remove of condition 43, which restricts the last time when food can be sold for consumption off the premises, to 23:30, 30 minutes before the premises close. This would allow consumption of food off the premises to continue for an additional 30 minutes every day, and when combined with the extension on Thursday – Saturday mentioned above for an extra 90 minutes on each of these days.

The sale of hot food for consumption off the premises retains people in the area who might otherwise have left. They also tend to find "quiet" areas in which to sit and eat their meals, whilst themselves making noise and leaving litter. This is particularly an issue in the Seven Dials area where there are large numbers of residential properties above ground floor level but plenty of locations where customers of LNR premises can sit and consume their purchases. The issue of noise and littering associated with LNR premises is noted in the SoLP as a reason for Policy FFP1.

As an illustration of this issue we attach an image in Attachment 3 of packaging and food left by customers from Wingstop. This was left a 200m walk from the premises, although within a 120m radius on the map. This illustrates the point that nuisance can be caused over a wide area from this type of premises. It also illustrates the point that nuisance in one Borough can be generated by licensed premises in another. Wingstop is in Westminster and the litter was left in Camden.

Extension of period for off-sales of alcohol

The application proposes to extend the off-sales of alcohol until 30 minutes before the premises are able to sell hot food for takeaway. This presumably is to allow customers who buy hot food during the extended period for which this may be permitted to buy alcohol to accompany this.

The sale of alcohol to people who have already been drinking, to accompany their meal to consume in the area will fail to support the Licensing Objective of the Prevention of Public Nuisance and Crime and Disorder. Until 23:00 this is permitted under the current licence. Allowing this to extend beyond this time will only lead to a higher level of alcohol consumption, most likely by people who have already been drinking. This will give rise to additional noise, littering and most likely to street urination, as the people will be away from the premises and not have access to the toilets available to those eating and drinking on the premises.

The sale of alcohol alongside takeaway food is not permitted from the more traditional restaurant after 23:00 and we can see no way in which allowing it in this case can be done whilst supporting the Licensing Objectives.


We support the Soho Society's position in this case.



CONDITIONS CONSISTENT WITH THE OPERATING SCHEDULE AND CONDITIONS PROPOSED BY A PARTY TO THE HEARING

When determining an application for a new premises licence under the provisions of the Licensing Act 2003, the licensing authority must, unless it decides to reject the application, grant the licence subject to the conditions which are indicated as mandatory in this schedule.

At a hearing the licensing authority may, in addition, and having regard to any representations received, grant the licence subject to such conditions which are consistent with the operating schedule submitted by the applicant as part of their application, or alter or omit these conditions, or add any new condition to such extent as the licensing authority considers appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives.

This schedule lists those conditions which are consistent with the operating schedule, or proposed as appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives by a responsible authority or an interested party as indicated. These conditions have not been submitted by the licensing service but reflect the positions of the applicant, responsible authority or interested party and have not necessarily been agreed

Conditions: On Current Licence -

Mandatory:

- 1. No supply of alcohol may be made at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of this licence.
- 2. No supply of alcohol may be made at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or the personal licence is suspended.
- 3. Every supply of alcohol under this licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.
- 4. (1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
 - (2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises—
 - (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to;
 - (i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
 - (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
 - (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;

- (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- (d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner;
- (e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).
- 5. The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
- 6. (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
 - (2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.
 - (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either—
 - (a) a holographic mark, or
 - (b) an ultraviolet feature.
- 7. The responsible person must ensure that—
 - (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures—
 - (i) beer or cider: $\frac{1}{2}$ pint;
 - (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
 - (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml;
 - (b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
 - (c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

A responsible person in relation to a licensed premises means the holder of the premise licence in respect of the premises, the designated premises supervisor (if any) or any individual aged 18 or over who is authorised by either the licence holder or designated premises supervisor. For premises with a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity that which enables him to prevent the supply of alcohol.

- 8(i) A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.
- 8(ii) For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 8(i) above -
 - (a) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979;
 - (b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula -

P = D + (DxV)

Where -

- (i) P is the permitted price,
- (ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
- V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;
- (c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence -
 - (i) the holder of the premises licence,
 - (ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or
 - (iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;
- (d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and
- (e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.
- 8(iii). Where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8(ii)(b) above would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.
- 8(iv). (1) Sub-paragraph 8(iv)(2) below applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8(ii)(b) above on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.
 - (2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.
- 9. All persons guarding premises against unauthorised access or occupation or against outbreaks of disorder or against damage (door supervisors) must be licensed by the Security Industry Authority.

Annex 3 – Conditions attached after a hearing by the licensing authority

- 10. The sale of alcohol for consumption on the premises shall only be to persons purchasing a substantial table meal there and as an ancillary to that meal, which is to be eaten seated at a table or counter in the premises.
- 11. Substantial food and non-intoxicating beverages, including drinking water, shall be available in all parts of the premises where alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises.
- 12. No super-strength beer, lagers, ciders or spirit mixtures of 5.5% ABV (alcohol by volume) or above shall be sold at the premises
- 13. There shall be no self service of alcohol.
- 14. A Challenge 25 proof of age scheme shall be operated at the premises where the only acceptable forms of identification are recognised photographic identification cards, such as a driving licence, passport or proof of age card with the PASS Hologram
- 15. The premises shall install and maintain a comprehensive CCTV system as per the minimum requirements of the Westminster Police Licensing Team. All entry and exit points will be covered enabling frontal identification of every person entering in any light condition. The CCTV system shall continually record whilst the premises is open for licensable activities and during all times when customers remain on the premises. All recordings shall be stored for a minimum period of 31 days with date and time stamping. Viewing of recordings shall be made available immediately upon the request of Police or authorised officer throughout the entire 31 day period.
- 16. A staff member from the premises who is conversant with the operation of the CCTV system shall be on the premises at all times when the premises is open. This staff member must be able to provide a Police or authorised council officer copies of recent CCTV images or data with the absolute minimum of delay when requested.
- 17. A direct telephone number for the manager at the premises shall be publicly available at all times the premises is open. This telephone number is to be made available to residents and businesses in the vicinity.
- 18. No rubbish, including bottles, shall be moved, removed or placed in outside areas between 0000 hours and 0600 hours or as in compliance with Westminster City Council's own waste contractor collection hours.
- 19. No deliveries of alcohol to the premises shall take place between 23:00 hours and 06:00 hours on the following day
- 20. Notices shall be prominently displayed at all exits requesting patrons to respect the needs of local residents and businesses and leave the area quietly.
- 21. Persons temporarily leaving the premises onto the public highway for the purposes of smoking shall not take any drinks with them.
- 22. Notices shall be prominently displayed at any area used for smoking requesting patrons to respect the needs of local residents and use the area quietly.

- 23. The premises licence holder shall ensure that any patrons smoking outside the premises do so in an orderly manner and are supervised by staff so as to ensure that there is no public nuisance or obstruction of the public highway.
- 24. No noise generated on the premises, or by its associated plant or equipment, shall emanate from the premises nor vibration be transmitted through the structure of the premises which gives rise to a nuisance.
- 25. During the hours of operation of the premises, the licence holder shall ensure sufficient measures are in place to remove and prevent litter or waste arising or accumulating from customers in the area immediately outside the premises, and that this area shall be swept and or washed, and litter and sweepings collected and stored in accordance with the approved refuse storage arrangements by close of business.
- 26. The approved arrangements at the premises, including means of escape provisions, emergency warning equipment, the electrical installation and mechanical equipment, shall at all material times be maintained in good condition and full working order.
- 27. The means of escape provided for the premises shall be maintained unobstructed, free of trip hazards, be immediately available and clearly identified in accordance with the plans provided.
- 28. All emergency doors shall be available at all material times without the use of a key, code, card or similar means.
- 29. All emergency doors shall be maintained effectively self-closing and not held open other than by an approved device.
- 30. The edges of the treads of steps and stairways shall be maintained so as to be conspicuous.
- 31. Curtains and hangings shall be arranged so as not to obstruct emergency safety signs or emergency equipment.
- 32. All fabrics, curtains, drapes and similar features including materials used in finishing and furnishing shall be either non-combustible or be durably or inherently flame-retarded fabric. Any fabrics used in escape routes (other than foyers), entertainment areas or function rooms, shall be non-combustible.
- 33. Flashing or particularly bright lights on or outside the premises shall not cause a nuisance to nearby properties, save insofar as they are necessary for the prevention of crime.
- 34. An incident log shall be kept at the premises, and made available on request to an authorised officer of the City Council or the Police. It must be completed within 24 hours of the incident and will record the following:
 - (a) all crimes reported to the venue
 - (b) all ejections of patrons
 - (c) any complaints received concerning crime and disorder
 - (d) any incidents of disorder
 - (e) all seizures of drugs or offensive weapons
 - (f) any faults in the CCTV system
 - (g) any refusal of the sale of alcohol
 - (h) any visit by a relevant authority or emergency service.

- 35. The premises may remain open for the sale of alcohol and the provision of late night refreshment from the terminal hour for those activities on New Year's Eve through to the commencement time for those activities on New Year's Day.
- 36. All sales of alcohol for consumption off the premises shall be in sealed containers and ancillary to a takeaway meal only, and shall not be consumed on the premises or in the immediate vicinity of the premises.
- 37. The sale of alcohol shall be limited to a selection of 3 beers.
- 38. No fumes, steam or odours shall be emitted from the licensed premises so as to cause a nuisance to any persons living or carrying on business in the area where the premises are situated.
- 39. All waste shall be properly presented and placed out for collection no earlier than 30 minutes before the scheduled collection times
- 40. The number of persons permitted in the premises (excluding staff) shall not exceed First floor: 80 persons With no more than 120 persons at any one time
- 41. There shall be no licensable activity in the basement or on the second floor of the premises.
- 42. On Fridays and Saturdays, from 22:00 until close, there shall be a minimum of 1 SIA door supervisor on duty at the premises. They shall wear either a high visibility yellow jacket or vest.

Condition 42 is proposed to be varied by the applicant to the following:

- 42. On Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays, from 22:00 until close, there shall be a minimum of 1 SIA door supervisor on duty at the premises. They shall wear either a high visibility yellow jacket or vest.
- 43. There shall be no sales of hot food or hot drink for consumption off the premises after 23.30 hours.
- 44. There shall be no supply of alcohol for consumption off the premises after 23:00 hours Monday to Saturday and 22:30 on Sunday

The applicant is proposing the addition of the following condition:

45. A copy of the premises' dispersal policy shall be made readily available at the premises for inspection by a Police officer and/or an authorised officer of Westminster City Council

- 1. No supply of alcohol may be made at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of this licence.
- 2. No supply of alcohol may be made at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or the personal licence is suspended.
- 3. Every supply of alcohol under this licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.
- 4. (1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
 - (2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises—
 - (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to;
 - drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
 - drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
 - (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
 - (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
 - (d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner;
 - (e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).
- 5. The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
- 6. (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
 - (2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.

- (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either—
 - (a) a holographic mark, or
 - (b) an ultraviolet feature.
- 7. The responsible person must ensure that—
 - (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures—
 - (i) beer or cider: ¹/₂ pint;
 - (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
 - (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml;
 - (b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
 - (c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

A responsible person in relation to a licensed premises means the holder of the premise licence in respect of the premises, the designated premises supervisor (if any) or any individual aged 18 or over who is authorised by either the licence holder or designated premises supervisor. For premises with a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity that which enables him to prevent the supply of alcohol.

- 8(i) A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.
- 8(ii) For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 8(i) above -
 - "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979;
 - (b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula -

P = D+(DxV)

Where -

- (i) P is the permitted price,
- D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
- V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;
- (c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence -
 - (i) the holder of the premises licence,

- (ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or
- (iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;
- (d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and
- (e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.
- 8(iii). Where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8(ii)(b) above would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.
- 8(iv). (1) Sub-paragraph 8(iv)(2) below applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8(ii)(b) above on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.
 - (2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.
- 9. All persons guarding premises against unauthorised access or occupation or against outbreaks of disorder or against damage (door supervisors) must be licensed by the Security Industry Authority.


Annex 3 – Conditions attached after a hearing by the licensing authority


- 10. No deliveries to the premises shall take place between 17:00 and 09:00 on the following day.
- 11. Rubbish to be collected during the usual City of Westminster rubbish collection hours.
- 12. The venue shall install and maintain a comprehensive CCTV system at the premises as per the minimum requirements of a Metropolitan Police Licensing Team. All entry and exit points will be covered enabling frontal identification of every person entering in any light condition. The CCTV system shall continually record whilst the venue is open for licensable activities and during all times when customers remain on the premises. All recordings shall be stored for a minimum period of 31 days with date and time stamping. Recordings shall be immediately arranged by a member of staff for hand over to Police or authorised officer following their request, throughout the preceding 31 day period.
- 13. A staff member from the premises who is conversant with the operation of the CCTV system shall be on the premises at all times when the premises are open to the public. This staff member shall be able to arrange for Police to view recent data or footage with the absolute minimum of delay when requested.
- 14. An incident log shall be kept for the premises, and made available on request to an authorised officer of the City Council or the Police, which will record the following:
 - (a) all crimes reported to the venue;
 - (b) any complaints received regarding crime and disorder;
 - (c) any incidents of disorder;
 - (d) any faults in the CCTV system;
 - (e) any visit by a relevant authority or emergency service.
- 15. A minimum of 1 SIA licensed door supervisors shall be on duty at the entrance of the premises from 20:00 hours whilst it is open for business on Friday and Saturday. SIA licences worn by door staff shall be on display at all times, carried within yellow high visibility arm bands.
- 16. A minimum of 1 SIA licensed door supervisors shall be on duty at the entrance of the premises during the hours of licensable activity on Lord's Cricket Ground match days.
- 17. A Challenge 21 proof of age scheme shall be operated at the premises where the only acceptable forms of identification are recognised photographic identification cards, such as a driving licence, passport or proof of age card with the PASS Hologram.
- 18. Substantial food and non-intoxicating beverages, including drinking water, shall be available in all parts of the premises where alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises.
- 19. No noise shall emanate from the premises nor vibration be transmitted through the structure of the premises which gives rise to a nuisance.
- 20. Loudspeakers shall not be located in the entrance lobby or outside the premises building.
- 21. All windows and external doors shall be kept closed after 21:00 hours, or at any time when regulated entertainment takes place, except for the immediate access and egress of persons.

- 22. A sound limiting device located in a separate and remote lockable cabinet from the volume control shall be fitted to any musical amplification system and set at a level determined by and to the satisfaction of an authorised officer of the Environmental Health Service to ensure that no noise nuisance is caused to local residents. The operational panel of the noise limiter shall then be secured to the satisfaction of officer from the Environmental Health Service. The keys securing the noise limiter cabinet shall be held by the licence holder or authorised manager only, and shall not be accessed by any other person. The limiter shall not be altered without prior agreement with the Environmental Health Service.
- 23. Alcohol consumed outside the premises building shall only be consumed by patrons seated at tables.
- 24. After 21:00 hours patrons permitted to temporarily leave and then re-enter the premises, e.g.to smoke, shall not be permitted to take drinks or glass containers with them.
- 25. Notices shall be prominently displayed at all exits and all areas used for smoking requesting patrons to respect the needs of local residents and businesses and leave the area quietly.
- 26. After 21:00 hours patrons permitted to temporarily leave and then re-enter the premises, e.g. to smoke, shall be limited to 10 persons at any one time.
- 27. All outside tables and chairs shall be rendered unusable by 21:00 hours and the external area to the left of the entrance door as you face the premise shall be rendered unusable by 19:00 hours each day.
- 28. All waste shall be properly presented and placed out for collection no earlier than 30 minutes before the scheduled collection times.
- 29. No waste or recyclable materials, including bottles, shall be moved, removed or placed in outside areas between 21.00 hours and 08.00 hours.
- 30. The premises licence holder shall ensure that any patrons drinking and/or smoking outside the premises do so in an orderly manner and are supervised by staff so as to ensure that there is no public nuisance or obstruction of the public highway.
- 31. There shall be no striptease or nudity, and all persons shall be decently attired at all times, except when the premises are operating under the authority of a Sexual Entertainment Venue licence.
- 32. The number of persons accommodated at any one time (excluding staff) shall not exceed 150 with a maximum of 40 in the external areas.
- 33. During the hours of operation of the premises, the licence holder shall ensure sufficient measures are in place to remove and prevent litter or waste arising or accumulating from customers in the area immediately outside the premises, and that this area shall be swept and or washed, and litter and sweepings collected and stored in accordance with the approved refuse storage arrangements by close of business.
- 34. Flashing or particularly bright lights on or outside the premises shall not cause a nuisance to nearby properties, save insofar as they are necessary for the prevention of crime.
- 35. Notices shall be prominently displayed at any area used for smoking requesting patrons to respect the needs of local residents and use the area quietly.

- 36. A direct telephone number for the manager at the premises shall be publicly available at all times the premises is open. This telephone number is to be made available to residents and businesses in the vicinity.
- 37. No fumes, steam or odours shall be emitted from the licensed premises so as to cause a nuisance to any persons living or carrying on business in the area where the premises are situated.
- 38. The hours for Regulated Entertainment and Sale of Alcohol may be extended from the end of permitted hours on New Year's Eve to the start of permitted hours on New Year's Day.
- 39. Late Night refreshment shall be permitted from 23:00 on New Year's Eve until 05:00 on New Years Day.







I thought it might be helpful to attach the following maps to help the Sub-committee understand the high density residential nature of the area immediately around crockers folly (if they are not already familiar with it). On the first map I have marked with a blue X the houses on Aberdeen place and Cunningham place where families with young school age children reside (those that I know of - there may well be further children on Aberdeen and Northwick Terrace). The second map shows in blue circles high density housing estates with a mix of vulnerable residents and families (Wharncliffe estate & lisson grove estate).

CONDITIONS CONSISTENT WITH THE OPERATING SCHEDULE AND CONDITIONS PROPOSED BY A PARTY TO THE HEARING

When determining an application for a new premises licence under the provisions of the Licensing Act 2003, the licensing authority must, unless it decides to reject the application, grant the licence subject to the conditions which are indicated as mandatory in this schedule.

At a hearing the licensing authority may, in addition, and having regard to any representations received, grant the licence subject to such conditions which are consistent with the operating schedule submitted by the applicant as part of their application, or alter or omit these conditions, or add any new condition to such extent as the licensing authority considers appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives.

This schedule lists those conditions which are consistent with the operating schedule, or proposed as appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives by a responsible authority or an interested party as indicated. These conditions have not been submitted by the licensing service but reflect the positions of the applicant, responsible authority or interested party and have not necessarily been agreed

Conditions: On Current Licence -

Mandatory:

- 1. No supply of alcohol may be made at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of this licence.
- 2. No supply of alcohol may be made at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or the personal licence is suspended.
- 3. Every supply of alcohol under this licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.
- 4. (1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
 - (2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises—
 - (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to;
 - (i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
 - (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
 - (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;

- (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- (d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner;
- (e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).
- 5. The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
- 6. (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
 - (2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.
 - (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either—
 - (a) a holographic mark, or
 - (b) an ultraviolet feature.
- 7. The responsible person must ensure that—
 - (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures—
 - (i) beer or cider: $\frac{1}{2}$ pint;
 - (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
 - (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml;
 - (b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
 - (c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

A responsible person in relation to a licensed premises means the holder of the premise licence in respect of the premises, the designated premises supervisor (if any) or any individual aged 18 or over who is authorised by either the licence holder or designated premises supervisor. For premises with a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity that which enables him to prevent the supply of alcohol.

- 8(i) A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.
- 8(ii) For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 8(i) above -
 - (a) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979;
 - (b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula -

P = D + (DxV)

Where -

- (i) P is the permitted price,
- (ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
- V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;
- (c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence -
 - (i) the holder of the premises licence,
 - (ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or
 - (iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;
- (d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and
- (e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.
- 8(iii). Where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8(ii)(b) above would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.
- 8(iv). (1) Sub-paragraph 8(iv)(2) below applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8(ii)(b) above on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.
 - (2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.
- 9. All persons guarding premises against unauthorised access or occupation or against outbreaks of disorder or against damage (door supervisors) must be licensed by the Security Industry Authority

Annex 3 – Conditions attached after a hearing by the licensing authority

- 10. No deliveries to the premises shall take place between 17:00 and 09:00 on the following day.
- 11. Rubbish to be collected during the usual City of Westminster rubbish collection hours.
- 12. The venue shall install and maintain a comprehensive CCTV system at the premises as per the minimum requirements of a Metropolitan Police Licensing Team. All entry and exit points will be covered enabling frontal identification of every person entering in any light condition. The CCTV system shall continually record whilst the venue is open for licensable activities and during all times when customers remain on the premises. All recordings shall be stored for a minimum period of 31 days with date and time stamping. Recordings shall be immediately arranged by a member of staff for hand over to Police or authorised officer following their request, throughout the preceding 31 day period.

The Metropolitan Police have purposed the following updated condition which has been agreed by the applicant s as to form part of the operating schedule

(a) The premises shall install and maintain a comprehensive CCTV system as per the minimum requirements of the Westminster Police Licensing Team.

(b) All entry and exit points will be covered enabling frontal identification of every person entering in any light condition.

(c) The CCTV system shall continually record whilst the premises is open for licensable activities and during all times when customers remain on the premises and will include the external area immediately outside the premises entrance.

(d) All recordings shall be stored for a minimum period of 31 days with date and time stamping.

(e) Viewing of recordings shall be made available immediately upon the request of Police or authorised officer throughout the entire 31-day period.

- 13. A staff member from the premises who is conversant with the operation of the CCTV system shall be on the premises at all times when the premises are open to the public. This staff member shall be able to arrange for Police to view recent data or footage with the absolute minimum of delay when requested.
- 14. An incident log shall be kept for the premises, and made available on request to an authorised officer of the City Council or the Police, which will record the following:
 - (a) all crimes reported to the venue;
 - (b) any complaints received regarding crime and disorder;
 - (c) any incidents of disorder;
 - (d) any faults in the CCTV system;
 - (e) any visit by a relevant authority or emergency service.
- 15. A minimum of 1 SIA licensed door supervisors shall be on duty at the entrance of the premises from 20:00 hours whilst it is open for business on Friday and Saturday. SIA licences worn by door staff shall be on display at all times, carried within yellow high visibility arm bands.
- 16. A minimum of 1 SIA licensed door supervisors shall be on duty at the entrance of the premises during the hours of licensable activity on Lord's Cricket Ground match days.

- 17. A Challenge 21 proof of age scheme shall be operated at the premises where the only acceptable forms of identification are recognised photographic identification cards, such as a driving licence, passport or proof of age card with the PASS Hologram.
- 18. Substantial food and non-intoxicating beverages, including drinking water, shall be available in all parts of the premises where alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises.
- 19. No noise shall emanate from the premises nor vibration be transmitted through the structure of the premises which gives rise to a nuisance.
- 20. Loudspeakers shall not be located in the entrance lobby or outside the premises building.
- 21. All windows and external doors shall be kept closed after 21:00 hours, or at any time when regulated entertainment takes place, except for the immediate access and egress of persons.
- 22. A sound limiting device located in a separate and remote lockable cabinet from the volume control shall be fitted to any musical amplification system and set at a level determined by and to the satisfaction of an authorised officer of the Environmental Health Service to ensure that no noise nuisance is caused to local residents. The operational panel of the noise limiter shall then be secured to the satisfaction of officer from the Environmental Health Service. The keys securing the noise limiter cabinet shall be held by the licence holder or authorised manager only, and shall not be accessed by any other person. The limiter shall not be altered without prior agreement with the Environmental Health Service.
- 23. Alcohol consumed outside the premises building shall only be consumed by patrons seated at tables.
- 24. After 21:00 hours patrons permitted to temporarily leave and then re-enter the premises, e.g.to smoke, shall not be permitted to take drinks or glass containers with them.
- 25. Notices shall be prominently displayed at all exits and all areas used for smoking requesting patrons to respect the needs of local residents and businesses and leave the area quietly.
- 26. After 21:00 hours patrons permitted to temporarily leave and then re-enter the premises, e.g. to smoke, shall be limited to 10 persons at any one time.
- 27. All outside tables and chairs shall be rendered unusable by 21:00 hours and the external area to the left of the entrance door as you face the premise shall be rendered unusable by 19:00 hours each day.

The applicant has proposed to vary condition 27 to the following:


All outside table and chairs shall be rendered unusable by 22:30 hours

- 28. All waste shall be properly presented and placed out for collection no earlier than 30 minutes before the scheduled collection times.
- 29. No waste or recyclable materials, including bottles, shall be moved, removed or placed in outside areas between 21.00 hours and 08.00 hours.

- 30. The premises licence holder shall ensure that any patrons drinking and/or smoking outside the premises do so in an orderly manner and are supervised by staff so as to ensure that there is no public nuisance or obstruction of the public highway.
- 31. There shall be no striptease or nudity, and all persons shall be decently attired at all times, except when the premises are operating under the authority of a Sexual Entertainment Venue licence.
- 32. The number of persons accommodated at any one time (excluding staff) shall not exceed 150 with a maximum of 40 in the external areas.
- 33. During the hours of operation of the premises, the licence holder shall ensure sufficient measures are in place to remove and prevent litter or waste arising or accumulating from customers in the area immediately outside the premises, and that this area shall be swept and or washed, and litter and sweepings collected and stored in accordance with the approved refuse storage arrangements by close of business.
- 34. Flashing or particularly bright lights on or outside the premises shall not cause a nuisance to nearby properties, save insofar as they are necessary for the prevention of crime.
- 35. Notices shall be prominently displayed at any area used for smoking requesting patrons to respect the needs of local residents and use the area quietly.
- 36. A direct telephone number for the manager at the premises shall be publicly available at all times the premises is open. This telephone number is to be made available to residents and businesses in the vicinity.
- 37. No fumes, steam or odours shall be emitted from the licensed premises so as to cause a nuisance to any persons living or carrying on business in the area where the premises are situated.
- 38. The hours for Regulated Entertainment and Sale of Alcohol may be extended from the end of permitted hours on New Year's Eve to the start of permitted hours on New Year's Day.
- 39. Late Night refreshment shall be permitted from 23:00 on New Year's Eve until 05:00 on New Years Day.

I write in relation to the application submitted for a new premises licence for Ground Floor, 6 Bedford Street, London, WC2E 9HZ

As a responsible authority under section 13 (4) of the Licensing Act 2003 as amended under the Police and Social Responsibility Act 2011 the Licensing Authority have considered your application in full. The Licensing Authority has concerns in relation to this application and how the premises would promote the Licensing Objectives:

- Prevention of Public Nuisance
- Prevention of Crime & Disorder
- Public Safety
- Protection of children from harm

The application is for a 'shadow' licence of premises licence 21/00270/LIPCH. Please can you confirm the interest of the Legal And General Assurance (Pensions Management) Limited in the property?

The Licensing Authority has reviewed the application against the current premises Licence and it has been made on the same terms and with the same conditions as the existing licence.

In the Council's statement of Licencing Policy, point D.20 and F.39 state:

"The Licensing Authority may consider granting applications for licences within the West End Cumulative Impact Zone that duplicate the terms and conditions of the current operational licence for that same premises but are issued to the landowner, or other person with an interest in the property and that the licence has no affect by condition. These 'Shadow Licences' are normally sought by the landowner to protect the interest of their property due to the policy to refuse certain new applications. A Shadow Licence will, in the event that a licence lapses, is surrendered or is revoked the property own can look to market the property with the licence. The holder of the Shadow Licence would in those circumstances need to apply to the Licensing Authority to vary the licence to remove any conditions preventing the use of that licence. At that point the Licensing Authority will consider whether the operation of the premises is likely to be an exception to policy. It will be for the Shadow Licence licensee to demonstrate that they are an exception within the applications operating schedule."

With this in mind the Licensing Authority would like the applicant to accept the Council's amended model condition 97 which states:

"The shadow licence will not take effect when the current licence is in operation."

Subject to the above the Licensing Authority will be minded to withdraw its objection.



- 1. No supply of alcohol may be made at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of this licence.
- 2. No supply of alcohol may be made at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or the personal licence is suspended.
- 3. Every supply of alcohol under this licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.
- 4. (1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
 - (2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises—
 - (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to;
 - (i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
 - (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
 - (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
 - (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
 - (d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner;
 - (e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).
- 5. The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
- 6. (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
 - (2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.

- (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either—
 - (a) a holographic mark, or
 - (b) an ultraviolet feature.
- 7. The responsible person must ensure that—
 - (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures—
 - (i) beer or cider: ¹/₂ pint;
 - (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
 - (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml;
 - (b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
 - (c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

A responsible person in relation to a licensed premises means the holder of the premise licence in respect of the premises, the designated premises supervisor (if any) or any individual aged 18 or over who is authorised by either the licence holder or designated premises supervisor. For premises with a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity that which enables him to prevent the supply of alcohol.

- 8(i) A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.
- 8(ii) For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 8(i) above -
 - (a) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979;
 - (b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula -

P = D+(DxV)

Where -

- (i) P is the permitted price,
- (ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
- (iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;
- (c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence -

- (i) the holder of the premises licence,
- (ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or
- (iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;
- (d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and
- (e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.
- 8(iii). Where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8(ii)(b) above would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.
- 8(iv). (1) Sub-paragraph 8(iv)(2) below applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8(ii)(b) above on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.
 - (2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

Conditions reproducing the effect of conditions subject to which the relevant existing licences have effect

Conditions for Sale of Alcohol

9. Substantial food and suitable beverages other than intoxicating liquor (including drinking water) shall be available during the whole of the permitted hours in all parts of the premises where intoxicating liquor is sold or supplied.

Conditions which reproduce the effect of any restriction imposed on the use of the premises by specified enactment

10. (i) Alcohol shall not be sold, supplied, consumed in or taken from the premises except during permitted hours.

In this condition, permitted hours means:

- (a) On weekdays, other than Christmas Day, Good Friday or New Year's Eve, 10:00 to 23:00;
- (b) On Sundays, other than Christmas Day or New Year's Eve, 12:00 to 22:30;
- (c) On Good Friday, 12:00 to 22:30;
- (d) On Christmas Day, 12:00 to 15:00 and 19:00 to 22:30;
- (e) On New Year's Eve, except on a Sunday, 10:00 to 23:00;
- (f) On New Year's Eve on a Sunday, 12:00 to 22:30;
- (g) On New Year's Eve from the end of permitted hours on New Year's Eve to the start of permitted hours on the following day (or, if there are no permitted hours on the following day, midnight on 31st December).

- (ii) Alcohol may be sold or supplied for one hour following the hours set out above (other than Christmas Day and New Year's Eve), and on Christmas Day, between 15:00 and 19:00, to persons taking table meals in the premises in a part of the premises usually set apart for the service of such persons and for consumption by such a person in that part of the premises as an ancillary to his meal. For other purposes or in other parts of the premises the hours set out above shall continue to apply.
- (iii) (a) On Fridays and Saturdays only alcohol may be sold or supplied until 01:00 in the morning to persons taking table meals in the premises in a part of the premises usually set apart for the service of such persons and for consumption by that person in that part of the premises as an ancillary to his meal.
- (b) The alcohol must be sold or supplied at a time before (i) the provision of entertainment by persons present and performing or (ii) the provision of substantial refreshment has ended. For other purposes or in other parts of the premises the hours set out above shall continue to apply.
- (c) This condition does not authorise any sale or supply to any person admitted to the premises either after midnight or less than half an hour before the entertainment is due to end, except in accordance with condition number 10 (ii) above.
- NOTE The above restrictions do not prohibit:
- (a) during the first thirty minutes after the above hours the consumption of the alcohol on the premises;
- (b) during the first twenty minutes after the above hours, the taking of the alcohol from the premises unless the alcohol is supplied or taken in an open vessel;
- (c) during the first thirty minutes after the above hours the consumption of the alcohol on the premises by persons taking table meals there if the alcohol was supplied for consumption as ancillary to the meals;
- (d) the sale or supply of alcohol to or the consumption of alcohol by any person residing in the licensed premises;
- (e) the ordering of alcohol to be consumed off the premises, or the despatch by the vendor of the alcohol so ordered;
- (f) the sale of alcohol to a trader or registered club for the purposes of the trade or club;
- (g) the sale or supply of alcohol to any canteen or mess, being a canteen in which the sale or supply of alcohol is carried out under the authority of the Secretary of State or an authorised mess of members of Her Majesty's naval, military or air forces;
- (h) the taking of alcohol from the premises by a person residing there;
- the supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises to any private friends of a person residing there who are bona fide entertained by him at his own expense, or the consumption of alcohol by persons so supplied;
- (j) the supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises to persons employed there for the purposes of the business carried on by the holder of the licence, or the consumption of liquor so supplied, if the liquor is supplied at the expense of their employer or of the person carrying on or in charge of the business on the premises.

In this condition, any reference to a person residing in the premises shall be construed as including a person not residing there but carrying on or in charge of the business on the premises.



CONDITIONS CONSISTENT WITH THE OPERATING SCHEDULE AND CONDITIONS PROPOSED BY A PARTY TO THE HEARING

When determining an application for a new premises licence under the provisions of the Licensing Act 2003, the licensing authority must, unless it decides to reject the application, grant the licence subject to the conditions which are indicated as mandatory in this schedule.

At a hearing the licensing authority may, in addition, and having regard to any representations received, grant the licence subject to such conditions which are consistent with the operating schedule submitted by the applicant as part of their application, or alter or omit these conditions, or add any new condition to such extent as the licensing authority considers necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives.

This schedule lists those conditions which are consistent with the operating schedule, or proposed as necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives by a responsible authority or an interested party as indicated. These conditions have not been submitted by the licensing service but reflect the positions of the applicant, responsible authority or interested party and have not necessarily been agreed

Mandatory Conditions

- 1. No supply of alcohol may be made at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of this licence.
- 2. No supply of alcohol may be made at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or the personal licence is suspended.
- 3. Every supply of alcohol under this licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.
- 4. (1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
 - (2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises—
 - (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to;
 - (i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
 - (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
 - (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
 - (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or

less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;

- (d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner;
- (e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).
- 5. The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
- 6. (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
 - (2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.
 - (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either—
 - (a) a holographic mark, or
 - (b) an ultraviolet feature.
- 7. The responsible person must ensure that—
 - (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures—
 - (i) beer or cider: $\frac{1}{2}$ pint;
 - (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
 - (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml;
 - (b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
 - (c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

A responsible person in relation to a licensed premises means the holder of the premise licence in respect of the premises, the designated premises supervisor (if any) or any individual aged 18 or over who is authorised by either the licence holder or designated premises supervisor. For premises with a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity that which enables him to prevent the supply of alcohol.

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- 8(i) A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.
- 8(ii) For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 8(i) above -
 - (a) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979;
 - (b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula -

P = D+(DxV)

Where -

- (i) P is the permitted price,
- (ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
- V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;
- (c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence -
 - (i) the holder of the premises licence,
 - (ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or
 - (iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;
- (d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and
- (e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.
- 8(iii). Where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8(ii)(b) above would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.
- 8(iv). (1) Sub-paragraph 8(iv)(2) below applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8(ii)(b) above on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.
 - (2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

Conditions reproducing the effect of conditions subject to which the relevant existing licences have effect

Conditions for Sale of Alcohol

9. Substantial food and suitable beverages other than intoxicating liquor (including drinking water) shall be available during the whole of the permitted hours in all parts of the premises where intoxicating liquor is sold or supplied.

Conditions which reproduce the effect of any restriction imposed on the use of the premises by specified enactment

10. (i) Alcohol shall not be sold, supplied, consumed in or taken from the premises except during permitted hours.

In this condition, permitted hours means:

- (a) On weekdays, other than Christmas Day, Good Friday or New Year's Eve, 10:00 to 23:00;
- (b) On Sundays, other than Christmas Day or New Year's Eve, 12:00 to 22:30;
- (c) On Good Friday, 12:00 to 22:30;
- (d) On Christmas Day, 12:00 to 15:00 and 19:00 to 22:30;
- (e) On New Year's Eve, except on a Sunday, 10:00 to 23:00;
- (f) On New Year's Eve on a Sunday, 12:00 to 22:30;
- (g) On New Year's Eve from the end of permitted hours on New Year's Eve to the start of permitted hours on the following day (or, if there are no permitted hours on the following day, midnight on 31st December).
- (ii) Alcohol may be sold or supplied for one hour following the hours set out above (other than Christmas Day and New Year's Eve), and on Christmas Day, between 15:00 and 19:00, to persons taking table meals in the premises in a part of the premises usually set apart for the service of such persons and for consumption by such a person in that part of the premises as an ancillary to his meal. For other purposes or in other parts of the premises the hours set out above shall continue to apply.
- (iii) (a) On Fridays and Saturdays only alcohol may be sold or supplied until 01:00 in the morning to persons taking table meals in the premises in a part of the premises usually set apart for the service of such persons and for consumption by that person in that part of the premises as an ancillary to his meal.
- (b) The alcohol must be sold or supplied at a time before (i) the provision of entertainment by persons present and performing or (ii) the provision of substantial refreshment has ended. For other purposes or in other parts of the premises the hours set out above shall continue to apply.
- (c) This condition does not authorise any sale or supply to any person admitted to the premises either after midnight or less than half an hour before the entertainment is due to end, except in accordance with condition number 10 (ii) above.
- NOTE The above restrictions do not prohibit:
- (a) during the first thirty minutes after the above hours the consumption of the alcohol on the premises;
- (b) during the first twenty minutes after the above hours, the taking of the alcohol from the premises unless the alcohol is supplied or taken in an open vessel;

- (c) during the first thirty minutes after the above hours the consumption of the alcohol on the premises by persons taking table meals there if the alcohol was supplied for consumption as ancillary to the meals;
- (d) the sale or supply of alcohol to or the consumption of alcohol by any person residing in the licensed premises;
- (e) the ordering of alcohol to be consumed off the premises, or the despatch by the vendor of the alcohol so ordered;
- (f) the sale of alcohol to a trader or registered club for the purposes of the trade or club;
- (g) the sale or supply of alcohol to any canteen or mess, being a canteen in which the sale or supply of alcohol is carried out under the authority of the Secretary of State or an authorised mess of members of Her Majesty's naval, military or air forces;
- (h) the taking of alcohol from the premises by a person residing there;
- the supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises to any private friends of a person residing there who are bona fide entertained by him at his own expense, or the consumption of alcohol by persons so supplied;
- (j) the supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises to persons employed there for the purposes of the business carried on by the holder of the licence, or the consumption of liquor so supplied, if the liquor is supplied at the expense of their employer or of the person carrying on or in charge of the business on the premises.

In this condition, any reference to a person residing in the premises shall be construed as including a person not residing there but carrying on or in charge of the business on the premises.

11. The terminal hour for Late Night Refreshment on New Year's Eve is extended to 05:00 on New Year's Day.


