	The Applicant is part of the Maroush / Ranoush Lebanese chain of restaurants known for their high quality of operation and standards. The premises has reopened recently and has not posed any concerns to the relevant authorities.						
	The prevention of crime and disorder: The Maroush Group has operated in London since 1979 and their numerous various establishments, provides the Metropolitan Police with little concern. Nonetheless, in order to prevent crime and disorder the premises has CCTV installed throughout. There are 40 staff in total and staff are trained to prevent the consumption and supply of drugs at the premises and will not serve alcohol to a person whom they believe to be intoxicated. An incident						

log will be kept at the premises, and made available on request to an authorised officer of the City Council or the police. Substantial food and non-intoxicating beverages, including drinking water, shall be available in all parts of the premises where alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises. It should be noted that the problems associated with alcohol do not present themselves at the various premises run by the Group.

Public safety:

The premises have been approved by the London Fire & Emergency Planning Authority. The appropriate Fire Safety checks are regularly undertaken and additionally the Operator has carried out regular Health and Safety Risk Assessments.

The prevention of public nuisance:

Signs are placed at the exit of the premises to request that patrons leave quietly and quickly so as not to disturb residents.

Self-closing mechanisms are fitted to all main doors to the premises to ensure that noise escape is minimal.

Notices shall be prominently displayed in any area used for smoking requesting patrons to use the area quietly.

All appropriate ducting and air-conditioning units have been installed and work efficiently. Ducting discharges at roof level thereby prevent nuisance from the omission of odours.

All ventilation shafts have carbon filters to prevent the omission of odours and are regularly cleaned. There is a taxi service available from nearby firm. Deliveries are only made during ordinary business hours (9am to 5pm) to prevent disturbance to residents and rubbish is collected during the usual City of Westminster rubbish collection hours.

The protection of children from harm:

The premises will not provide adult entertainment. It is intended that the Challenge 21 proof of age scheme shall operate at the premises and staff and will refuse to serve any person they believe is under age.

As indicated, the operation of other establishments run by the Maroush Group have provided little concern to the Responsible Authorities and the proposed application will not impede on the promotion of the Licensing Objectives.

The owners and operators of Crocker's Folly, a restaurant pub recently opened on our corner, have now applied to extend operating hours inside as well as on the outside patio. If approved, this extension would have a highly detrimental impact on the tranquillity of our residential street.

We as the local residents want to preserve the tranquillity of our residential neighbourhood.

Our children can walk alone here, the nights are safe and quiet, and there is no disorderly conduct or noise at night.

We object to any extension so that the operating hours, already long, remain as they are. In fact, I feel tricked. The operators clearly wanted to just get permission under the guise of a quiet establishment, and then planned on changing the operations all along. We the residents would have objected much more strongly from the start.

Some of the reasons to object to extended hours of operation:

- Safe and peaceful, residential character of our neighbourhood to be preserved
 with no outside crowds after 9pm (as it has until now) or indoors after 11pm. This
 is a fair balance between the needs of the restaurant operators and the
 residents. Working people, elderly and specially young children must have rest
 and tranquillity after that time.
- No nuisance from boisterous drinking noise and crowds later than we have now.
- No increase to litter, debris and bottles from bigger crowds eating and drinking later
- No increasing risk of crime in an otherwise tranquil family, residential area.
- Specially April-October, no packs of sports fans gathering later in our streets and pavements after drinking at Lord's causing even greater nuisance and public safety risk.

It is attractive and safe for the neighbourhood to ensure the continued operation of the premises - but NOT with later operation and specially NOT on the outside patio.

When Crocker's Folly was renovated, there was disquiet amongst the residents about the potential for disrupting the tranquillity of the area. We understood that a degree of compromise was necessary, as so a limited opening time was accepted. In discussions with the company they were willing to accept that because of our reservations, which they said they understood. They are now attempting to break that agreement and are deliberately trying to extend the hours to an extent to which we would have objected

very strongly had it been suggested initially.

Once extended hours – especially outside the pub in the summer – are permitted, when Lords' Cricket Ground has matches the pub area will become as noisy and intrusive as it is at the pub beside Baker Street station on Wembley days, where it is almost impossible to get past on the pavement.

The current limit of 9 pm has worked well in ensuring noise levels are well controlled, and in deterring groups from congregating outside at an anti-social hour.

An additional hour of drinking outside would very likely have adverse consequences in terms of more noise and potential nuisance, especially in the summer months.

When Crocker's Folly was originally granted a licence, the committee at Westminster Council listened carefully to the many objections raised by local residents and accordingly granted a licence with several conditions, including the limiting of operating hours and controls on outside drinking. These conditions were placed in recognition that this is a residential neighbourhood, and that residents, particularly those living very close to Crocker's Folly, had a reasonable right for peace and quiet.

We are firmly opposed to a gradual loosening of these conditions which have served as an effective basis for a balance between the rights of residents and the interests of the management of Crocker's Folly.

I write to strongly oppose the application for extended licensing hours at Crocker's Folly, 24 Aberdeen Place, for the following reasons:

- 1) not suitable for a residential conservation area;
- 2) many working families on Cunningham Place and Aberdeen Place with young children and increased noise from the Patio and those coming and leaving and smoking outside after 11pm will impact quiet use and enjoyment of their residences, and sleep;
- 3) extended hours will result in antisocial behaviour from increased drinking and smoking outside on the pavement in a residential area;
- 4) further antisocial behaviour from seasonal (e.g. Lord's cricket matches) sporting

events, as evidenced by the large crowds that gather on the street outside pubs on St John's Wood high street) which is entirely unsuitable for a residential area;

- 5) increased litter & debris from increased smokers and use of patio Cunningham Place in particular already has a significant litter & debris issue with leaves and litter and debris accumulating on the wide pavement;
- 6) grade II nature of houses on Cunningham Place means there are restrictions on double pane glass for windows and so sound insulation is already poor in these houses with street traffic and pedestrian traffic sound not buffered; increasing both street and pedestrian traffic will have a detrimental sound impact for those living on Cunningham Place.

The current hours of 9pm on the patio and 11pm inside are in keeping with the residential nature of the neighbourhood and conservation area, and strike the right balance between promoting commerce and protecting the right to quiet use and enjoyment of local residents.

And I see no need for additional security personnel! Cricket fans are usually affluent and non-violent.





When determining an application for a new premises licence under the provisions of the Licensing Act 2003, the licensing authority must, unless it decides to reject the application, grant the licence subject to the conditions which are indicated as mandatory in this schedule.

At a hearing the licensing authority may, in addition, and having regard to any representations received, grant the licence subject to such conditions which are consistent with the operating schedule submitted by the applicant as part of their application, or alter or omit these conditions, or add any new condition to such extent as the licensing authority considers appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives.

This schedule lists those conditions which are consistent with the operating schedule, or proposed as appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives by a responsible authority or an interested party as indicated. These conditions have not been submitted by the licensing service but reflect the positions of the applicant, responsible authority or interested party and have not necessarily been agreed

Conditions: On Current Licence -

Mandatory:

- 1. No supply of alcohol may be made at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of this licence.
- 2. No supply of alcohol may be made at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or the personal licence is suspended.
- 3. Every supply of alcohol under this licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.
- 4. (1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
 - (2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises—
 - (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to;
 - (i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
 - (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);

- (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- (d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner;
- (e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).
- 5. The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
- 6. (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
 - (2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.
 - (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either—
 - (a) a holographic mark, or
 - (b) an ultraviolet feature.
- 7. The responsible person must ensure that—
 - (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures—
 - (i) beer or cider: ½ pint;
 - (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
 - (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml;

- (b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
- (c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

A responsible person in relation to a licensed premises means the holder of the premise licence in respect of the premises, the designated premises supervisor (if any) or any individual aged 18 or over who is authorised by either the licence holder or designated premises supervisor. For premises with a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity that which enables him to prevent the supply of alcohol.

- 8(i) A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.
- 8(ii) For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 8(i) above -
 - (a) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979:
 - (b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula -

P = D+(DxV)

Where -

- (i) P is the permitted price,
- (ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
- (iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;
- (c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence -
 - (i) the holder of the premises licence,
 - (ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or
 - (iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;
- (d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and

- (e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.
- 8(iii). Where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8(ii)(b) above would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that subparagraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.
- 8(iv). (1) Sub-paragraph 8(iv)(2) below applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8(ii)(b) above on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.
 - (2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.
- 9. All persons guarding premises against unauthorised access or occupation or against outbreaks of disorder or against damage (door supervisors) must be licensed by the Security Industry Authority.

Annex 3 – Conditions attached after a hearing by the licensing authority

- 10. No deliveries to the premises shall take place between 17:00 and 09:00 on the following day.
- 11. Rubbish to be collected during the usual City of Westminster rubbish collection hours.
- 12. The venue shall install and maintain a comprehensive CCTV system at the premises as per the minimum requirements of a Metropolitan Police Licensing Team. All entry and exit points will be covered enabling frontal identification of every person entering in any light condition. The CCTV system shall continually record whilst the venue is open for licensable activities and during all times when customers remain on the premises. All recordings shall be stored for a minimum period of 31 days with date and time stamping. Recordings shall be immediately arranged by a member of staff for hand over to Police or authorised officer following their request, throughout the preceding 31 day period.
- 13. A staff member from the premises who is conversant with the operation of the CCTV system shall be on the premises at all times when the premises are open to the public. This staff member shall be able to arrange for Police to view recent data or footage with the absolute minimum of delay when requested.
- 14. An incident log shall be kept for the premises, and made available on request to an authorised officer of the City Council or the Police, which will record the following:
 - (a) all crimes reported to the venue;
 - (b) any complaints received regarding crime and disorder:

- (c) any incidents of disorder;
- (d) any faults in the CCTV system;
- (e) any visit by a relevant authority or emergency service.
- 15. A minimum of 1 SIA licensed door supervisors shall be on duty at the entrance of the premises from 20:00 hours whilst it is open for business on Friday and Saturday. SIA licences worn by door staff shall be on display at all times, carried within yellow high visibility arm bands.
- 16. A minimum of 1 SIA licensed door supervisors shall be on duty at the entrance of the premises during the hours of licensable activity on Lord's Cricket Ground match days.
- 17. A Challenge 21 proof of age scheme shall be operated at the premises where the only acceptable forms of identification are recognised photographic identification cards, such as a driving licence, passport or proof of age card with the PASS Hologram.
- 18. Substantial food and non-intoxicating beverages, including drinking water, shall be available in all parts of the premises where alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises.
- 19. No noise shall emanate from the premises nor vibration be transmitted through the structure of the premises which gives rise to a nuisance.
- 20. Loudspeakers shall not be located in the entrance lobby or outside the premises building.
- 21. All windows and external doors shall be kept closed after 21:00 hours, or at any time when regulated entertainment takes place, except for the immediate access and egress of persons.
- 22. A sound limiting device located in a separate and remote lockable cabinet from the volume control shall be fitted to any musical amplification system and set at a level determined by and to the satisfaction of an authorised officer of the Environmental Health Service to ensure that no noise nuisance is caused to local residents. The operational panel of the noise limiter shall then be secured to the satisfaction of officer from the Environmental Health Service. The keys securing the noise limiter cabinet shall be held by the licence holder or authorised manager only, and shall not be accessed by any other person. The limiter shall not be altered without prior agreement with the Environmental Health Service.
- 23. Alcohol consumed outside the premises building shall only be consumed by patrons seated at tables.
- 24. After 21:00 hours patrons permitted to temporarily leave and then re-enter the premises, e.g.to smoke, shall not be permitted to take drinks or glass containers with them.

The applicant proposes to amend this condition to read:

- 24. After 22:00 hours patrons permitted to temporarily leave and then re-enter the premises, e.g.to smoke, shall not be permitted to take drinks or glass containers with them.
- 25. Notices shall be prominently displayed at all exits and all areas used for smoking requesting patrons to respect the needs of local residents and businesses and leave the area quietly.
- 26. After 21:00 hours patrons permitted to temporarily leave and then re-enter the premises, e.g. to smoke, shall be limited to 10 persons at any one time.

The applicant proposes to amend this condition to read:

- 26. After 22:00 hours patrons permitted to temporarily leave and then re-enter the premises, e.g. to smoke, shall be limited to 10 persons at any one time.
- 27. All outside tables and chairs shall be rendered unusable by 21:00 hours and the external area to the left of the entrance door as you face the premise shall be rendered unusable by 19:00 hours each day.


The applicant proposes to amend this condition to read:

- 27. All outside tables and chairs shall be rendered unusable by 22:00 hours and the external area to the left of the entrance door as you face the premise shall be rendered unusable by 19:00 hours each day.
- 28. All waste shall be properly presented and placed out for collection no earlier than 30 minutes before the scheduled collection times.
- 29. No waste or recyclable materials, including bottles, shall be moved, removed or placed in outside areas between 21.00 hours and 08.00 hours.

The applicant proposes to amend this condition to read:

- 29. No waste or recyclable materials, including bottles, shall be moved, removed or placed in outside areas between 22.00 hours and 08.00 hours.
- 30. The premises licence holder shall ensure that any patrons drinking and/or smoking outside the premises do so in an orderly manner and are supervised by staff so as to ensure that there is no public nuisance or obstruction of the public highway.
- 31. There shall be no striptease or nudity, and all persons shall be decently attired at all times, except when the premises are operating under the authority of a Sexual Entertainment Venue licence.
- 32. The number of persons accommodated at any one time (excluding staff) shall not exceed 150 with a maximum of 40 in the external areas.
- 33. During the hours of operation of the premises, the licence holder shall ensure sufficient measures are in place to remove and prevent litter or waste arising or accumulating from customers in the area immediately outside the premises, and that this area shall be swept and or washed, and litter and sweepings collected and stored in accordance with the approved refuse storage arrangements by close of business.

- 34. Flashing or particularly bright lights on or outside the premises shall not cause a nuisance to nearby properties, save insofar as they are necessary for the prevention of crime.
- 35. Notices shall be prominently displayed at any area used for smoking requesting patrons to respect the needs of local residents and use the area quietly.
- 36. A direct telephone number for the manager at the premises shall be publicly available at all times the premises is open. This telephone number is to be made available to residents and businesses in the vicinity.
- 37. No fumes, steam or odours shall be emitted from the licensed premises so as to cause a nuisance to any persons living or carrying on business in the area where the premises are situated.
- 38. The hours for Regulated Entertainment and Sale of Alcohol may be extended from the end of permitted hours on New Year's Eve to the start of permitted hours on New Year's Day.
- 39. Late Night refreshment shall be permitted from 23:00 on New Year's Eve until 05:00 on New Year's Day.
