2. The kitchen has been relocated to the basement. Part of the kitchen was previously on the ground floor.
3. Addition of a bar servery on the ground floor with fixed seating.
4. Removal and reconfiguration of fixed furniture on the ground floor.
5. Addition of a disabled WC on the ground floor.
6. 2 additional female WC in the basement.
7. 1 additional male WC and 2 urinals in the basement.
8. Relocation of the WC's in the basement.
9. Additional back of house facilities in the basement.
10. Removal and reconfiguration of fixed furniture in the basement.

- (c) during the first thirty minutes after the above hours the consumption of the alcohol on the premises by persons taking table meals there if the alcohol was supplied for consumption as ancillary to the meals;

- (e) the ordering of alcohol to be consumed off the premises, or the despatch by the vendor of the alcohol so ordered;

- (g) the sale or supply of alcohol to any canteen or mess, being a canteen in which the sale or supply of alcohol is carried out under the authority of the Secretary of State or an authorised mess of members of Her Majesty's naval, military or air forces;
- (h) the taking of alcohol from the premises by a person residing there;
- (i) the supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises to any private friends of a person residing there who are bona fide entertained by him at his own expense, or the consumption of alcohol by persons so supplied;
- (j) the supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises to persons employed there for the purposes of the business carried on by the holder of the licence, or the consumption of liquor so supplied, if the liquor is supplied at the expense of their employer or of the person carrying on or in charge of the business on the premises.

In this condition, any reference to a person residing in the premises shall be construed as including a person not residing there but carrying on or in charge of the business on the premises.

16. No person under fourteen shall be in the bar of the licensed premises during the permitted hours unless one of the following applies:

- (a) He is the child of the holder of the premises licence.
- (b) He resides in the premises, but is not employed there.
- (c) He is in the bar solely for the purpose of passing to or from some part of the premises which is not a bar and to or from which there is no other convenient means of access or egress.
- (d) The bar is in railway refreshment rooms or other premises constructed, fitted and intended to be used bona fide for any purpose to which the holding of the licence is ancillary.

In this condition "bar" includes any place exclusively or mainly used for the consumption of intoxicating liquor. But an area is not a bar when it is usual for it to be, and it is, set apart for the service of table meals and alcohol is only sold or supplied to persons as an ancillary to their table meals.

18. There shall be no adult entertainment in the form of nudity and no restricted films shall be shown

22. A sound limiting device shall be located in a separate and remove lockable cabinet from the volume control must be fitted to the musical amplification system set at a level determined by and to the satisfaction of an authorised officer of the Environmental Health Service's Community Protection Department so as to ensure that no noise nuisance is caused to local residents. The operational panel of the noise limiter shall then be secured to the satisfaction of officers from the Environmental Health Service. The keys securing the noise limiter cabinet shall be held by the applicant only, and shall not be accessed by any other person. The limiter shall not be altered without prior agreement with the Environmental Health Service.

Even if the terrace and windows are closed, guests come to smoke outside, because there is no place to smoke inside the premise, drivers wait with running motors and guests wait for their cars outside (whether or not permitted by the licence). A night club with late hours is not suitable at the location.

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I am a resident of north Mayfair and as such I am affected by noise from vehicles servicing and delivering to premises, as they drive through the streets. The numbers of delivery & servicing vehicles disturbing residents in Mayfair during late evenings and night-time are again increasing.

Residents living near the premises will be disturbed by any late evening and night-times deliveries or servicing noise, such as the usual banging, crashing of boxes and doors, and associated noise such as the bottles cascades and noise of waste/recycling being put outside.

Conditions should be included that ensure that residents are not disturbed by deliveries and servicing vehicles between 9pm and 8am, excepting WCC waste and recycling collections, and essential early morning perishable food deliveries, and are not disturbed by movement of goods or waste/recycling outside the premises between those hours.

The licensing team really needs to reject this application as we have seen some awful examples of tawdry commercialism taking over adjacent streets (Berkeley St comes to mind as one particular egregious case). In addition, there will be two large scale hospitality venues opening up soon in Mount St (in the Audley pub and of the Porche Showroom). These two new venues, coupled with expanding the size of George Club, will destroy the residential nature of Mount Street.

I plan to speak in the hearing as one of the residents of Mount Street. In addition, I plan to speak on behalf of many other residents who gave me permission to do so. We heard George Club is planning to have a nightclub in the future. So we need protection and guarantees that this club will never become a nightclub in the future. We need assurances that there won't be any future licensing applications requesting music and dancing!

Let me highlight that Mount Street needs serious protection from the council to protect its residential character. As residents, rather than living in peace and enjoying our neighbourhood, we have to continue fighting the greed exhibited by outside parties that are only out to maximize their profits. Residents are paying the cost of their grabbing hands. Enough is enough!

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Dear Sirs

I am writing in my capacity as West End Ward Councillor to express concern in relation to this application on behalf of residents in and around Mount Street.

There has been a significant upturn in criminality and anti-social behaviour associated with the increase in the number of licensed premises in this immediate area. Under the Licensing Objectives, the Committee should be cognizant of that concern, and that, following changes to the Use Classes Act, further commercial premises will be changed to restaurant/bar or similar use, with the likely further intensification of activities, in turn leading to disturbance, anti-social behaviour, and a threat to the residential amenity and safety of residents in Mount Street and the surrounding area.

It is not to suggest that the current operation or current operators are specifically responsible for such behaviour, but once the enlarged premises were to be licensed, the operator could change and they would have the benefit of the Licence.

Insofar as the Committee are able to impose Conditions on any licence that they are minded to grant, please could they include appropriate provisions to ensure that the management of the immediately surrounding area is undertaken in such a way as to cause minimal inconvenience to residential amenity, and that there is regular review opportunity and liaison with the operators, to ensure that, if such problems were to occur, they can be immediately nipped in the bud.

To that end, there should always be available to residents the mobile and/or home telephone number of the Licence Holder, and other responsible parties, so that they can ensure that the premises are properly managed in accordance with the Licensing Objectives.

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As a resident of ██████████ I am concerned that the street is reaching saturation point as regards licensed premises. Whilst the smaller George is a well run club a much larger premises poses an obvious threat to the residential nature of this historic street which is characterised by four floors of flats with small boutiques beneath.

There are residents immediately above George and opposite on all sides. As I know from experience these 19th century building are extremely difficult to soundproof and vibrations as well as sound travel to neighbouring premises. I see that music is planned and at private events

little regulation is proposed. The question arises why is this select club being expanded and will future applications request longer hours and nightclub designation? . Club membership is easy to obtain and only 48 hours is required between application and acceptance. Surely that is not enough time to do due diligence as to the suitability of potential members. I feel the membership requirements should be tightened up and the area of the premises given over to music severely restricted with no facility for dancing. Hours should not be extended in the future and off sales prohibited . George is a select dining club and it should remain that way in a residential street. Please confirm this objection will be registered. I may wish to speak at any future hearing.

As a resident of Mount Street I am very concerned by this variation. Whilst it does not at this time seek to vary the hours of operation or capacity it does seek to greatly expand the size of the venue. Seasoned operators in Mayfair are accustomed to submitting applications piecemeal and I fear for the future application to extend capacity and hours that will shortly be forthcoming when they argue that a venue of this size can not afford to operate without enhanced capacity

Mount street has seen a huge increase in licensed premises many of which are yet to open. I urge the council to pause from granting any new licenses or variations until the venues currently under construction are open and the impact on Mount street can be properly evaluated.

There has already been a surge in crime. The destruction of the Audley hounds and the recent break in at 14 Mount Street come easily to mind and this is before the opening of the reimagined Audley and the Greek in the Porsche Garage site bring huge additional volumes of people to the area.

Mount Street is finely balanced between residential, retail and hospitality and any issuing or variation of a licence should be very carefully considered so as not to adversely impact residents or other local businesses.

If the application is located within a Special Consideration Zone they have demonstrated that they have taken account of the issues identified in that area and provided adequate mitigation. 3. Whether there is residential accommodation in the proximity of the premises that would likely be adversely affected by premises being open or carrying out operations at the hours proposed. 4. The proposed hours of the licensable activities and when
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customers will be permitted to remain on the premises.

5. The proposed hours when any music, including incidental music, will be played.
6. The hours when customers will be allowed to take food or drink outside the premises or be within open areas which form part of the premises.
7. The existing hours of licensable activities and the past operation of the premises (if any) and hours of licensable premises in the vicinity.
8. Whether customers and staff have adequate access to public transport when arriving at and leaving the premises, especially at night.
9. The capacity of the premises.
10. The type of use, recognising that some venues are more likely to impact the licensing objectives than others; for example, pubs and bars are higher risk than theatres, cinemas and other cultural and sporting venues due to the nature of the operation.
11. The Licensing Authority will take into account the active measures proposed for a 'winding down' period including arrangements for people to be collected from the premises to travel home safely.
12. Conditions on hours may be attached that require that the supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises ceases a suitable period of time before customers are required to leave the premises.
13. The council, acting as the Licensing Authority, may reduce hours if, after review, it is necessary to impose conditions specifying shorter hours in order to promote the licensing objectives.
14. Specific days for non-standard hours should be identified and justified as part of the application to allow responsible authorities and interested parties to evaluate the impact that these licensable activities may have, and to plan accordingly. 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4. Equality Implications

Pre application advice purpose: To assess the premises for a new or variation licence regarding licensing capacity and conditions.

Background to application: The premises will be expanding in size and undergoing a full refurbishment. The change of layout will be extensive and impact on the current means of escape. The existing premises licence does not cover these new areas which are a substantial increase on the current areas but still less than 50% of the current licensed area, therefore a new or variation licence application can be applied.

Inspection carried out by Alan Lynagh (District Surveyor Licensing - DS) and Ian Watson (Senior Practitioner Environmental Health (Licensing)).

District Surveyor Comments

Means of Escape

- At ground floor level discounting the largest exit (new proposed restaurant entrance) leaves the existing current front entrance (no dimensions on plan and the rear exit through the newly created smaller bar/private room area. This rear exit is inward opening so will be limited to 60 persons. Therefore, the existing front entrance should be capable of supporting 90 persons, which would equate to a clear width required of 850mm for this exit in line with approved document B. If this is the case then the 150 persons will be acceptable. If this exit is between 750mm and 850 mm then it would only support 60 persons in line with approved document B, although if using the CLG guidance for small existing premises this may be argued to allow 80 persons for a medium risk premises. This would therefore allow up to 140 persons, however this in tandem with the small central alternative exit to the middle of the ground floor should be acceptable for 150 persons. If this small central exit is to be removed for

emergency egress then we would recommend the existing entrance exit needs to be 850mm clear width to support the 150 persons max capacity at this level.

- At basement level there are two exits at 850mm (horizontal widths) provided however these are both in a similar direction from all parts of the basement to the south of the bar location. Therefore, it could be argued that these act as a single exit and hence the maximum occupancy should be limited to 60 persons. However, this is a small discrepancy between 60 and 74 persons and with a good level of fire detection to give early warning (would recommend the system is confirmed as L2 coverage as a minimum) the 74 person should be acceptable.
- However, while the means of escape in relation to exit width are deemed acceptable the current travel distances appear to be close to/over the 18m as required from the worst impacted banquette seating to the area to the south of the bar location. The actual travel distance should be confirmed, and any deviations justified. In addition, the back of house corridor to the south of the plan containing offices, wine store, cigar vault etc also appears to have excessive travel distances in a single direction. It should therefore be clarified what the exit provision for staff is in this area as it appears to be via the kitchen given there is an S22 exit sign located above the kitchen door on the plan. We would therefore need confirmation of how exiting through a kitchen will be managed and justified for staff in this corridor.
- It has been noted also that there is an S22 exit sign above the existing exit door that leads via the existing external exit staircase and from the public area into the staff exit corridor. It is our understanding that this signage is incorrect, and the external exit staircase is being removed as it is not shown on the proposed plan and the exit into the staff corridor exit is an oversight as we would not support public exiting via the kitchen. Therefor clarity around the exit signage in these locations should be provided.
- Given the limited capacity of 74 persons, the likely limited time it will take to exit this capacity via the basement exit routes and the small compartment size of the ground floor and basement it may be that the need to compartment the ground floor from the basement by the current accommodation staircase could be reassessed and may not be necessary. We would suggest suitable fire safety advice is procured for this and any justifications to do this sent to us for consideration.
- It is noted there is a delivery lift being provided and we would ask for clarity around the use of this lift and if there is an intention to use it for disabled access to the basement also.
- Please find below some general advice for the proposed works:
 - All fire doors protecting exit routes should be provided with intumescent strips and smoke seals, three hinges and self-closing devices and generally comply with the relevant provisions of Table B1 of Approved Document B.
 - Suitable primary and secondary lighting should be provided throughout, and this should include all changes of level and key staff areas such as fire alarm panel location. This should also include the external terrace area also. We would expect the system to be in line with BS 5266.
 - Contrasting nosing's should be provided to all exit staircases.
 - Every escape route (other than those in ordinary use) should be marked by emergency exit signs complying with BS 5499: Part 1 and these will be located in accordance with the recommendations of BS 5499: Part 4.
 - A cause and effect for the fire alarm system should be produced for consideration and

this should include suitable cut offs of the music and other entertainment systems within the premises.

- Lighting to all public areas should be under management control and not be operable by members of the public.
- All doors should be in line with the plans as provided with regard to widths. To clarify the width of a doorway is the clear width measured between the leaves (or, if a single door, the leaf and the frame or doorstep) of the doors when open at right angles to the frame. Door hardware may be ignored if the door opens more than 90 degrees to the frame. Doorways should be not less than 2060mm high except that the height may be reduced to 1960mm in existing buildings. Curtains or drapes should generally not be hung across doors or escape routes within any of the licensable areas as this could impede any evacuation.
- All exit doors proposed should be free from fastenings when public, entertainers or staff are present or have fastenings that may be readily opened in emergency without using both hands or a key to open the door. Note 1: This does not preclude the use of a key to open the door from the outside. Note 2: Any removable devices, such as locks, bolts, chains or padlocks, used to improve security must be removed before the premises are occupied. A door alarm system is preferable to removable security devices where possible. Where there may be more than 60 people, any fastenings on doors should be panic bolts or panic latches operated by push bars complying with *BS EN 1125*. If a room holds less than 60 people, push pads or lever handles complying with *BS EN 179* are acceptable. The use of latches operated by lever handles should be avoided in public areas. Round knobs should not be used as they could be difficult to operate. Any door furniture should be fitted between 800mm and 1200mm above floor level and should provide visual contrast with the surface of the doors. To avoid confusion push plates should usually be fitted for pushing doors and handles to pull doors.
- Any platforms, temporary or otherwise introduced over 380mm high to which the public have access should be provided with suitable guarding. All staircases should be provided with suitable handrails 800mm above pitch line of stairs.
- Special effects such as dry ice, smoke, pyrotechnics, lasers, strobe lighting and real flame effects require specialists for both installation and operation. Site specific risk assessments should be carried out by the operator and a suitable condition should be placed on the licence with regarding to pre-approval of effects.

General Fire/Public Safety Considerations

We would recommend the proposed fire/public strategy for the building licence considers the points detailed below:

- Level of fire alarm detection to be considered and it is recommended that system is in line with BS 5839 Part 1 2002 Category L1/L2 protection to allow maximum flexibility with capacity calculations.
- All protected exit routes to be provided with 30 minutes fire separation to other parts of the premises. The existing areas of penetration to other floors should be appropriately fire stopped/rated.
- All Fire doors protecting escape routes will be provided with intumescent strips and smoke seals and all fire doors will comply with the relevant provisions of Table B1 of Approved Document B.
- Full details of the emergency lighting scheme should be provided and we would expect the system to be in line with BS 5266.

- Lighting to all public areas should be under management control.

General points for Consideration

Doors

To clarify the width of a doorway on the means of escape routes is the clear width measured between the leaves (or, if a single door, the leaf and the frame or doorstop) of the doors when open at right angles to the frame. Door hardware may be ignored if the door opens more than 90 degrees to the frame. Doorways should be not less than 2060mm high except that the height may be reduced to 1960mm in existing buildings. Curtains or drapes should never be hung across doors or escape routes within any of the licensable areas as this could impede any evacuation.

Double Swing Doors and Doors Across Corridors

Double swing doors, doors across corridors and doors that may cause an obstruction should be fitted with safety glass vision panels with zones of visibility between 500mm and 1500mm from the floor. Fire resisting safety glass panels should be fitted in fire doors to the same level of fire resistance as the door itself.

Thresholds

No door should open immediately over or onto a step. A single step on the line of a doorway is not acceptable. A landing at least as wide as the door and at least as long as the width of the door plus 400mm, should be provided between the door and the first step of any stair.

There should be no upstand or threshold bar across any doorway or escape route, other than a chamfered weather bar or threshold seal for sound insulation protruding a maximum of 6mm and arranged so as not to cause a trip hazard.

Door fastenings

All exit doors should be free from fastenings when public, entertainers or staff are present or have fastenings that may be readily opened in emergency without using both hands or a key to open the door.

Note 1: This does not preclude the use of a key to open the door from the outside.

Note 2: Any removable devices, such as locks, bolts, chains or padlocks, used to improve security must be removed before the premises are occupied. A door alarm system is preferable to removable security devices where possible.

Where there may be more than 60 people, any fastenings on doors should be panic bolts or panic latches operated by push bars complying with BS EN 1125.

If a room holds less than 60 people, push pads or lever handles complying with BS EN 179 are acceptable. The use of latches operated by lever handles should be avoided in public areas. Round

knobs should not be used as they could be difficult to operate.

Any door furniture should be fitted between 800mm and 1200mm above floor level and should provide visual contrast with the surface of the doors. To avoid confusion push plates should usually be fitted for pushing doors and handles to pull doors.

Lighting

The premises should have an adequate supply of both normal and emergency and each system should be sufficient to enable the public, performers and staff to see their way to move around the premises safely and to escape from the premises.

Adequate emergency lighting in addition to sufficient normal lighting should be provided so that all parts of the premises including toilets and internal and external exit routes leading to the street are illuminated. All emergency lighting should comply with BS 5266: Parts, 1, 7 & 8.

Both supplies of lighting should be independently capable of providing the recommended minimum illuminance. However, whilst both normal and emergency supplies are functioning properly, either or both supplies may operate at a reduced level so long as the minimum recommended illuminance is provided. In the event of the failure of either supply the remaining supply should be automatically restored to full illuminance.

The lighting and emergency lighting circuits should not normally be switched off by the operation of any RCD. The lighting should be operated by an automatic switching system or remain on when the public are present. Light switches should preferably not be installed in public areas such as the event space but if so installed should be key-operated or otherwise protected from unauthorised operation.

Maintained emergency lighting (that is operating whenever the premises are occupied) should be installed where the normal lighting may be dimmed. Where non-maintained emergency lighting is installed, it should come into operation on the failure of the local normal lighting circuit forming part of the normal lighting.

Lighting fittings should be fixed at least 2100mm above floor level or pitch line of stairs. Suspended fittings, other than small lamp pendants, should be provided with suitable means of suspension independent of the electric cable. Heavy fittings should be rigidly fixed or be provided with two non-combustible independent means of suspension.

Communication

Adequate communication is needed throughout the premises. Where noise levels are loud communications systems such as a public address system may be needed especially in emergency as there are emergencies where the fire system does not suffice. Consideration should be given to the type and style of operation proposed and the type of entertainment available as this will help inform any decisions made regarding communication systems. In some circumstances a duty manager, equipped with two-way communication with designated members of staff is sufficient.

Exit Signage

All exit routes should be suitably signed, with particular attention drawn to the need for signage throughout the large ground floor space.

Protected Exit Routes

All protected exit routes should be provided with 30 minutes fire separation to other parts of the premises or as detailed in the Fire Strategy.

All Fire doors protecting escape routes should be provided with intumescent strips and smoke seals and all fire doors will comply with the relevant provisions of Table B1 of ADB.

Every escape route (other than those in ordinary use) should be marked by emergency exit signs complying with BS 5499: Part 1 and these will be located in accordance with the recommendations of BS 5499: Part 4

In addition, the normal works condition and plans change condition should be attached to the application.

The above list is not exhaustive but details some of the key considerations for the proposed use of the space. It is also advised that a final clearance inspection should take place prior to any use under the licence.

Licensing Policy:

The premises are not located within any cumulative impact zone or special consideration zone therefore policy PB1 would apply in part, but this can be mitigated by way of conditions.

This policy recognise that applications must demonstrate that the proposals meet the relevant criteria

in policies CD1, PS1, PN1 and CH1 with regard to operational conditions. Such conditions must also address the later opening hours especially with regard to PN1 and CD1. The hours policy HRS1 would also apply, although the premises already operate satisfactorily outside the core hours.

There is no policy requirement to demonstrate that the premises will add to cumulative impact in the area.

The proposed hours of operation are outside the core hours policy but reflect the current operating hours. The premises are located within/beneath a residential building but there are no noise/nuisance related complaints or adverse visits within the last three years.

The premises currently operate as a member's restaurant and lounge and there is no strict policy use for this use. Policy D27 recognises that well managed members clubs, albeit those that operate under a club premises certificate, have little association with crime and disorder and public nuisance, because of their membership controls and the strict criteria which the premises must meet.

In particular these "qualifying clubs" are often characterised by long standing membership which is valued by the member and gives a real incentive for the club to promote the licensing objectives in its neighbourhood. New members are often nominated and vetted by existing members and in all cases, there is a delay of at least two days between the grant of membership and the use of the club by the new member. Membership is usually intended to be long term and often renewable annually, with a significant financial commitment on joining.

The existing premises licence has strict membership conditions including a 48-hour joining period and it could be demonstrated that they also have long standing and valued membership.

Public Toilet Provision

The current plans show,
Female 4 x WC's
Male 2 x WC's plus 2 urinals
Disabled 1 x WC

Staff
2 x WC's

The public toilet provision proposed would support a maximum capacity of 210-220 persons excluding staff.

Licensing Position:

The premises could apply for a new licence or variation of the existing licence. Both options have their advantages, but the current licence already has operational conditions that have worked for both the premises and location. The current licence also benefits from unrestricted recorded music and private entertainment that could be lost if a new licence is applied for.

The additional space/licensed area is less than 50% of the current licensed area with the majority of the new space in the basement being taken up by back of house services. The current premises licence does not have an enforceable capacity condition, but an historic Fire Authority condition states a maximum capacity of 150 persons.

With the proposed changes the operational capacity might increase to 210-220 persons, less than a 50% increase.

Conditions proposed to reflect the current operating style with updated model conditions.

- Intoxicating liquor will not be sold or supplied to persons admitted to the premises, other than to
 - a) Members of the club and their bona fide guests meeting at the premises for consumption by those members and their bona fide guests a list of whom will be held at reception for inspection by the relevant authorities. No person shall be admitted to the membership of the said club without an interval of at least 48 hours between nomination or application for membership and admission.
 - b) Artistes or persons employed on the premises.
 - c) Any person attending a private function at the premises, a list of whom will be held at reception for inspection by any of the relevant statutory authorities.
- A list of the names and addresses of members of the Club shall be kept on the premises at all times together with a book showing the names and dates of attendance of any guests introduced by members. Both the list and the book shall be produced on demand for inspection by the police or an authorised officer of the Council.
- A copy of the club rules will be available at the premises for inspection by the Police or authorised officer of the council.
- Between the hours of 08.00- and 09.00-hours Monday to Saturday and 08.00- and 12.00-hours Sunday the supply of alcohol shall be ancillary to the provision of substantial food.
- After 23.00 hours Monday to Saturday and 22.30 hours Sunday the supply of alcohol on the ground floor shall be ancillary to the provision of substantial food.
- Alcohol consumed outside the premises building shall only be consumed by patrons seated at tables.
- Substantial food and non-intoxicating beverages, including drinking water, shall be available in all parts of the premises where alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises.
- There shall be no sales of hot food or hot drink for consumption 'Off' the premises after 23:00 hours.
- All sales of alcohol for consumption 'Off' the premises shall be in sealed containers only and shall not be consumed on the premises.
- The premises shall install and maintain a comprehensive CCTV system as per the minimum requirements of the Westminster Police Licensing Team. All entry and exit points will be covered enabling frontal identification of every person entering in any light condition. The CCTV system shall continually record whilst the premises is open for licensable activities and during all times when customers remain on the premises and will include the external area immediately outside the premises entrance. All recordings shall be stored for a minimum period of 31 days with date and time stamping. Viewing of recordings shall be made available immediately upon the request of Police or authorised officer throughout the preceding 31 day period.

- A staff member from the premises who is conversant with the operation of the CCTV system shall be on the premises at all times when the premises are open. This staff member must be able to provide a Police or authorised council officer copies of recent CCTV images or data with the absolute minimum of delay when requested.
- A Challenge 21 or Challenge 25 scheme shall be operated at the premises where the only acceptable forms of identification are recognised photographic identification cards, such as driving licence, military ID card, passport or proof of age card with the PASS Hologram.
- An incident log shall be kept at the premises, and made available on request to an authorised officer of the City Council or the Police, which will record the following:
 - (a) all crimes reported to the venue
 - (b) all ejections of patrons
 - (c) any complaints received regarding crime and disorder
 - (d) any incidents of disorder
 - (e) any faults in the CCTV system
 - (f) any refusal of the sale of alcohol
 - (g) any visit by a relevant authority or emergency service
- The approved arrangements at the premises, including means of escape provisions, emergency warning equipment, the electrical installation and mechanical equipment, shall at all material times be maintained in good condition and full working order.
- The means of escape provided for the premises shall be maintained unobstructed, free of trip hazards, be immediately available and clearly identified in accordance with the plans provided.
- All emergency exit doors shall be available at all material times without the use of a key, code, card or similar means.
- All emergency doors shall be maintained effectively self-closing and not held open other than by an approved device.
- Curtains and hangings shall be arranged so as not to obstruct emergency safety signs or emergency equipment.
- All windows and external doors shall be kept closed after 21.00 hours, or at any time when regulated entertainment takes place on the ground floor, except for the immediate access and egress of persons.
- No noise generated on the premises, or by its associated plant or equipment, shall emanate from the premises nor vibration be transmitted through the structure of the premises which gives rise to a nuisance.
- Loudspeakers shall not be located in the entrance lobby of the premises or outside the building.

- No regulated entertainment shall be provided to the external terrace.
- A noise limiter must be fitted to the musical amplification system and maintained in accordance with the following criteria:
 - (a) the limiter must be set at a level determined by and to the satisfaction of an authorised Environmental Health Officer, so as to ensure that no noise nuisance is caused to local residents or businesses,
 - (b) The operational panel of the noise limiter shall then be secured by key or password to the satisfaction of the authorised Environmental Health Officer and access shall only be by persons authorised by the Premises Licence holder,
 - (c) The limiter shall not be altered without prior written agreement from the Environmental Health Consultation Team,
 - (d) No alteration or modification to any existing sound system(s) should be affected without prior knowledge of the Environmental Health Consultation Team, and
 - (e) No additional sound generating equipment shall be used on the premises without being routed through the sound limiter device.
- Notices shall be prominently displayed at all exits requesting patrons to respect the needs of local residents and businesses and leave the area quietly.
- All waste shall be properly presented and placed out for collection no earlier than 30 minutes before the scheduled collection times.
- During the hours of operation of the premises, the licence holder shall ensure sufficient measures are in place to remove and prevent litter or waste arising or accumulating from customers in the area immediately outside the premises, and that this area shall be swept and or washed, and litter and sweepings collected and stored in accordance with the approved refuse storage arrangements by close of business.
- Patrons permitted to temporarily leave and then re-enter the premises, e.g. to smoke or make a phone call, shall not be permitted to take glass containers with them.
- After 23.00 hours departing patrons waiting for a taxi shall remain inside the premises.
- No licensable activities shall take place until the premises has been assessed as satisfactory by the Environmental Health Consultation Team at which time this condition shall be removed from the Licence by the licensing authority.
- No licensable activities shall take at the premises until the capacity of the premises has been determined by the Environmental Health Consultation Team and the licensing authority has replaced this condition on the licence with a condition detailing the capacity so determined.
- Before the premises open to the public, the plans as deposited will be checked by the Environmental Health Consultation Team to ensure they are an accurate reflection of the premises constructed. Where the premises layout has changed during the course of construction new plans shall be provided to the Environmental Health Consultation Team and the Licensing Authority.

Consider

- All outside tables and chairs shall be rendered unusable by 23.00 hours each day.
- No waste or recyclable materials, including bottles, shall be moved, removed from or placed in outside areas between 23.00 hours and 08.00 hours on the following day.
- There shall be no sales of hot food or hot drink for consumption off the premises after 23.00 hours.
- No deliveries to the premises shall take place between 23.00 and 08.00 hours on the following day.
- The premises licence holder shall ensure that any patrons drinking and/or smoking outside the premises do so in an orderly manner and are properly supervised by staff so as to ensure that there is no public nuisance or obstruction of the public highway.
- A direct telephone number for the manager at the premises shall be publicly available at all times the premises is open. This telephone number and/or is to be made available to residents and businesses in the vicinity.
- After 21.00 hours there shall be a personal licence holder on duty on the premises at all times when the premises are authorised to sell alcohol.

Conclusion

The application, new or variation should reflect the current operation of the premises supported by model and unique conditions to address the licensing objectives and policy concerns. Any smoking area should be positioned so as not to impact on any adjacent premises or residential amenity. The licensing objectives of Public Safety, Prevention of Public Nuisance and Crime and Disorder are addressed with model conditions and these should satisfy the responsible authorities.

As part of the application process it is advised that the other responsible authorities will also need to assess the proposals and may wish to make additional comments.

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1. INTRODUCTION

Birley Clubs are proposing to refurbish an existing establishment at the current George Club, 87-88 Mount Street, London. The proposals will also consist of extending the restaurant into the adjacent retail unit located at 89 Mount Street.

ACA Acoustics Limited has been commissioned to carry out an assessment of noise emissions from the proposed restaurant and, where necessary, make recommendations to reduce sound emissions to ensure compliance with appropriate criteria.

This report presents results of sound insulation tests carried out during visits to site, assessment of the measured levels, consideration of noise from replacement mechanical services equipment, and outlines any recommendations that may be required.

2. ACOUSTIC CRITERIA

Westminster City Council (WCC) provides the following criteria in relation to developments such as this.

2.1 Noise generating commercial uses including music and entertainment uses (e.g. restaurant, clubs, pubs) and gyms

The design and construction of the separating building structure should be such that any received noise value in the residential habitable spaces meets the criteria in the table 2. The NR [Noise Rating] values should be

used to demonstrate that the received noise would effectively be inaudible. Where noise generating commercial uses including music and entertainment uses (e.g. restaurants, clubs, pubs) and gyms, (both amplified music and impact noise from gym activities and equipment) are proposed, either as part of new development, conversion or change of use, the below standards shall be used. The values in table 2 should not be exceeded inside any residential dwellings or other noise sensitive properties.

Where existing residential units or other noise sensitive receptors could be affected the design of the development must ensure that there will be no increase of noise above existing levels. Where a new use is proposed under the Town and Country Planning (Use Classes) (Amendment) (England) Regulations 2020 the design criteria in table 2 for residential habitable spaces should still be met. This applies where a new use is adopted in proximity to an existing noise sensitive property, for example a shop adjoining a residential property being converted to a restaurant. The criteria should also be applied in cases where there are proposals to extend operating hours or intensify the existing use. Any additional plant or equipment required for the new use must also meet the criteria in Section 2.4.

To determine the numerical values required to comply with the Noise Criteria for music and entertainment shown in Table 1 would require background sound levels to be measured internally within adjoining residential flats during the late evening/night-time periods. This is typically not practical and therefore ACA Acoustics propose to interpret the criteria as the representative background being nominally equivalent to NR30 during the daytime and NR25 at night; the fixed criteria levels from Table 1. The Leq sound emissions from the restaurant shall be designed to achieve a level 10dB better than the NR30 curve during the daytime and the NR25 curve at night-time in the 63Hz and 125Hz octave frequency bands, and the Lfmax emissions to be 10dB better than the NR40 curve at night.

ACA Acoustics understands that opening times will be later than 23:00 hours and therefore the night-time criterion of NR25 has been used.

2.2 Minimising noise from plant machinery and internal/external activities

Table 3 within Section 2.4 of The Noise Technical Guidance Note Document (which accompanies the Westminster City Plan 2019-2040)

provides criteria for noise emissions from new mechanical plant and machinery, and states the following,
Development including plant or machinery, or contains activities that cause noise from amplified and unamplified music or human voices both internally and externally should achieve the following standards:

1) where the existing external noise level exceeds WHO Guideline levels of LAeq,16hrs 55dB daytime (07.00- 23.00) and LAeq,8hrs 45dB night-time (23.00-07.00):

either

(a) where noise from the proposed development will not contain tones or be intermittent sufficient to attract attention, the maximum emission level (LAeq15min) should not exceed 10 dB below the minimum external background noise at the nearest noise sensitive properties. The background noise level should be expressed in terms of LA90,15min.

Or

(b) where noise emitted from the proposed development will contain tones, or will be intermittent sufficient to attract attention, the maximum emission level (LAeq15min) should not exceed 15 dB below the minimum external background noise at the nearest noise sensitive properties.

2) where the existing external noise level does not exceed WHO Guideline levels of LAeq,16hrs 55dB daytime (07.00- 23.00) and LAeq,8hrs 45dB night-time (23.00-07.00):

either

(a) where noise from the proposed development will not contain tones or be intermittent sufficient to attract attention, the maximum emission level (LAeq15min) should not exceed 5 dB below the minimum external

background noise at the nearest noise sensitive properties. The background noise level should be expressed in terms of LA90,15min.

Or

(b) where noise emitted from the proposed development will contain tones, or will be intermittent sufficient to attract attention, the maximum emission level (LAeq15min) should not exceed 10 dB below the minimum external background noise at the nearest noise sensitive properties.

3. SOUND INSULATION TEST RESULTS

Sound insulation tests were carried out between the existing restaurant and an adjoining flat above. The tests were conducted prior to undertaking any works.

The survey was conducted by Sam Message of ACA Acoustics on Tuesday 7th September 2021. Tests were conducted in accordance with the methodology of BS EN ISO 16283-1:2014. Summary results are shown in the table below.

The results indicate a very good level of sound insulation performance is already achieved by the existing structure. The client has advised that the

same structure continues into the adjacent premises and by extension, the same sound insulation performance.

4. ACOUSTIC ASSESSMENT

The client has confirmed that for the vast majority of the time music will be played at background levels only.

Increased music volumes will only be played in the basement area of the restaurant. This is further removed from the residential flats which would increase the level of sound insulation to the flats upstairs.

Nonetheless, to ensure a robust assessment sound transmission to the flats above has been calculated based on the measured level difference between the ground floor restaurant and first floor residential flats.

ACA Acoustics have measured music levels within other restaurants operated by the client. Levels measured are understood to be representative of those within the restaurant during a weekend evening period and therefore represent a worst-case.

Based on the anticipated source sound level and the measured level difference of the existing structure, resultant sound levels inside the flats above are shown below.

Results in Table 4 demonstrate that sound transmission from the restaurant to adjoining flats is low and complies with City of Westminster Council’s planning consent requirements. It is of benefit to note that actual levels of transmission will be even lower than the values shown, as high-volume music will only be played within the basement, increasing the level of separation to the flats.

It is anticipated that external doors or internal lobby doors will typically be kept closed when music is playing inside the venue. This will ensure that operational noise emissions to outside windows of nearby dwellings are low and will not be detrimental to the amenity of residential occupants.

Although the sound insulation performance of the structure is already very good and no additional works are required to comply with the City of Westminster’s criteria, it is nonetheless good practice for the sound system to comprise multiple smaller loudspeakers rather than a smaller number of large speakers. This reduces the overall volume, whilst

retaining the quality of the sound. Speakers should be supported on resilient hangers.

Allowing for the existing building construction and decorative fitout work which will improve the sound insulation performance further, sound transmission to local neighbours and adjoining apartments above will be low and will not cause disturbance due to operation of the premises.

5. MECHANICAL PLANT

It is understood all existing mechanical plant already has planning permission and will be replaced on a ‘like-for-like’ basis. This will ensure that any new plant will not exceed the current sound levels at the nearest noise-sensitive receptor. As the plant will be replaced with more modern versions, it is anticipated the sound levels should, in fact, decrease.

An unattended sound level survey was carried out over a 24-hour period on Wednesday 1st September to Thursday 2nd September 2021 by Sam Message of ACA Acoustics Limited to establish the existing sound levels at the receptors, which is the two flats directly above the rear of the premises, overlooking the plant area. The soundscape at the monitoring position was assessed as representative of the receptors and consisted primarily of the existing plant.

The following equipment was used during the survey; the sound level meter was calibrated before the survey and checked after with no deviation noted.

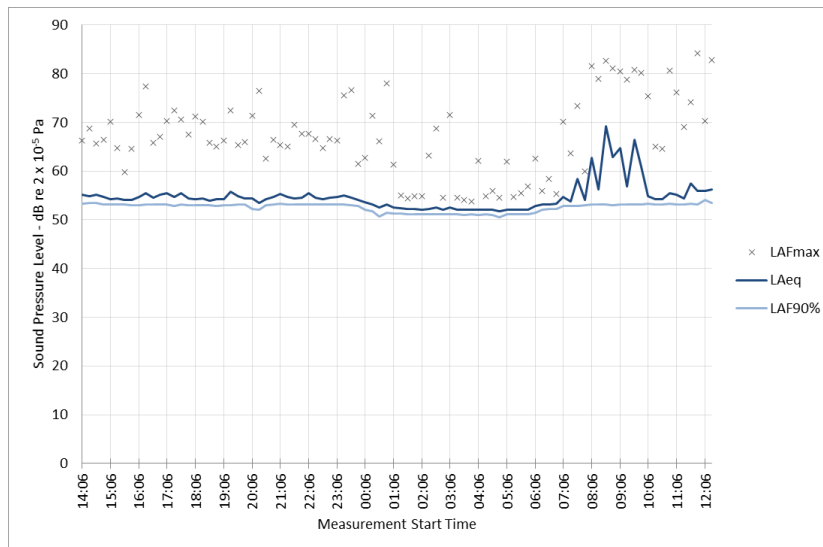


Figure 1: Sound level survey results –1st – 2nd September 2021

6. CONCLUSION

ACA Acoustics have undertaken an assessment of operational noise from the proposed restaurant and conclude that allowing for sound insulation performance of the existing structure and anticipated worst-case source levels based on measurements taken at other premises operated by the client, noise levels transmitted to adjoining residential premises will be low and complies with the criteria of City of Westminster Council.

All mechanical plant will be replaced on a like-for-like basis, which at worse case would result in no increase in the existing sound levels at the nearest receptor and should in fact result in a decrease in sound levels, thus improving the health and quality of life of adjoining residents and fully in accordance with the requirements of the National Planning Policy Framework and Noise Policy Statement for England.

We confirm that the requirements of the Local Authority Planning Policy will be met and from a premises license perspective there will be no adverse impact to neighbouring occupiers from a noise perspective.

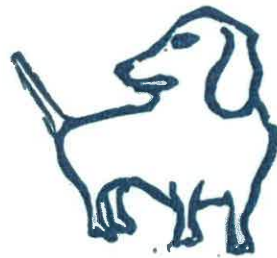

- (ii) Alcohol may be sold or supplied for one hour following the hours set out above other than Christmas Day and New Year's Eve and on Christmas day, between 15:00 and 19:00 to persons taking table meals in the premises in a part of the premises usually set apart for the service of such persons and for consumption by such a person in that part of the premises as an ancillary to his meal. For other purposes or in other parts of the premises the hours set out above shall continue to apply.

- (iii) (a) Alcohol may be sold or supplied until 01.00 in the morning following weekdays (other than Good Friday and Christmas Day), 00.30 a.m. in the morning following Sundays (other than Christmas Day) and 00.30 in the morning following Good Friday to persons taking table meals in the premises in a part of the premises usually set apart for the service of such persons and for consumption by that person in that part of the premises as an ancillary to his meal.

(b) That part of the premises must also be used for the provision of entertainment by persons present and performing to which the sale or supply of alcohol is also ancillary.

(c) The alcohol must be sold or supplied at a time before (i) the provision of entertainment by persons present and performing or (ii) the provision of substantial refreshment, has ended. For other purposes or in other parts of the premises the hours set out above shall continue to apply.

(d) This condition does not authorise any sale or supply to any person admitted to the premises either after midnight (23.00 on Sunday) or less than half an hour before the entertainment is due to end, except in accordance with condition number 10(ii) above.

NOTE - The above restrictions do not prohibit:

- (a) during the first thirty minutes after the above hours the consumption of the alcohol on the premises;

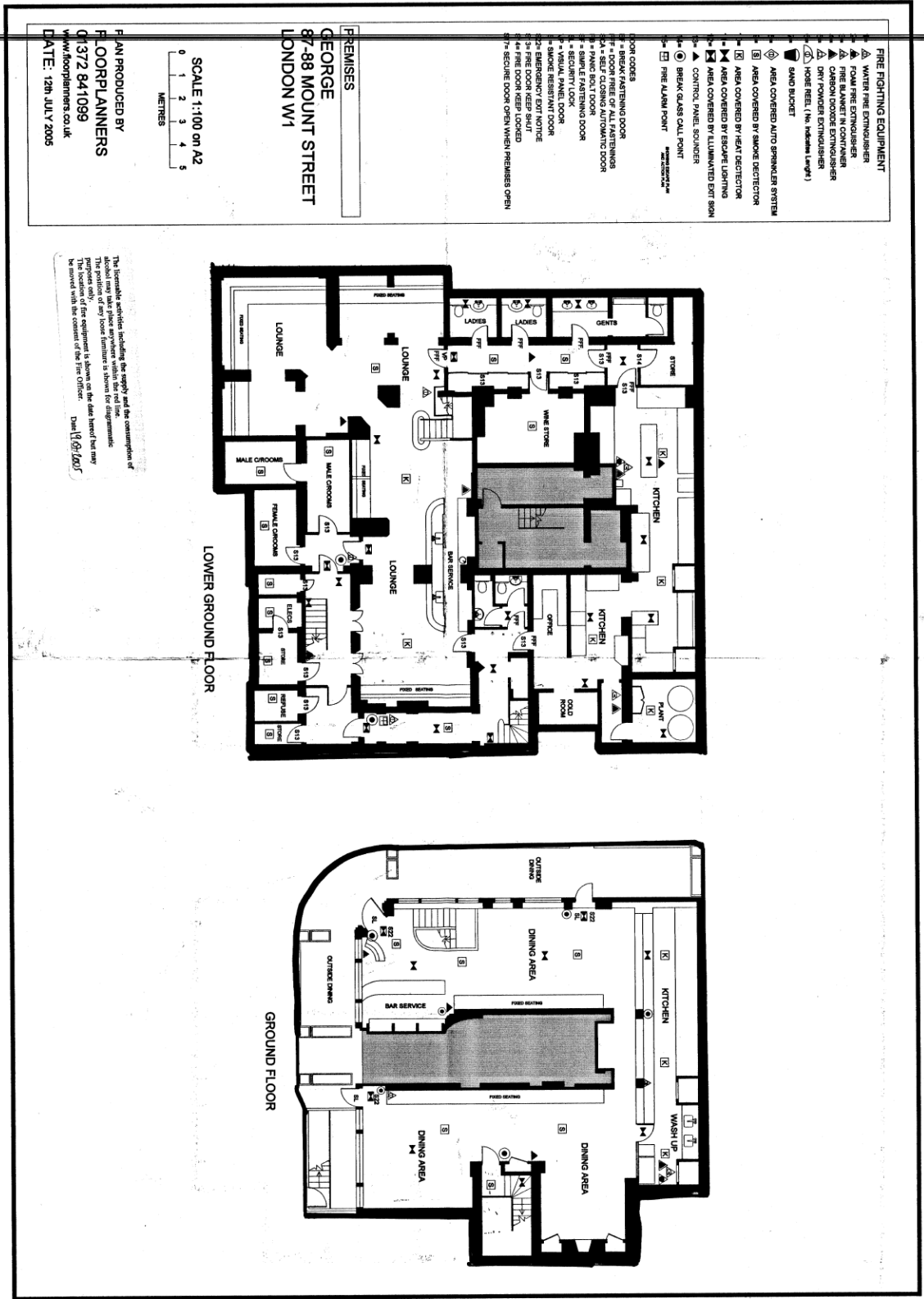

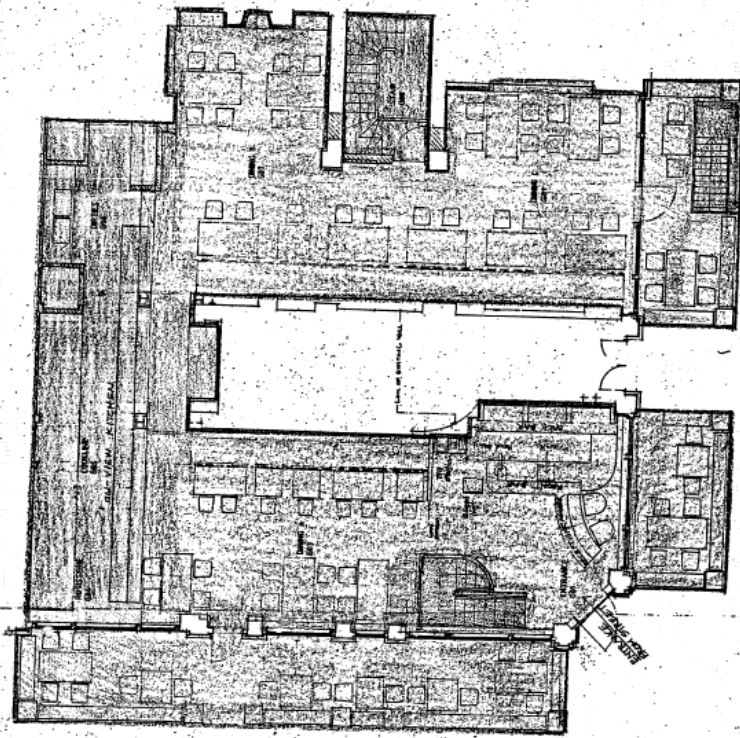

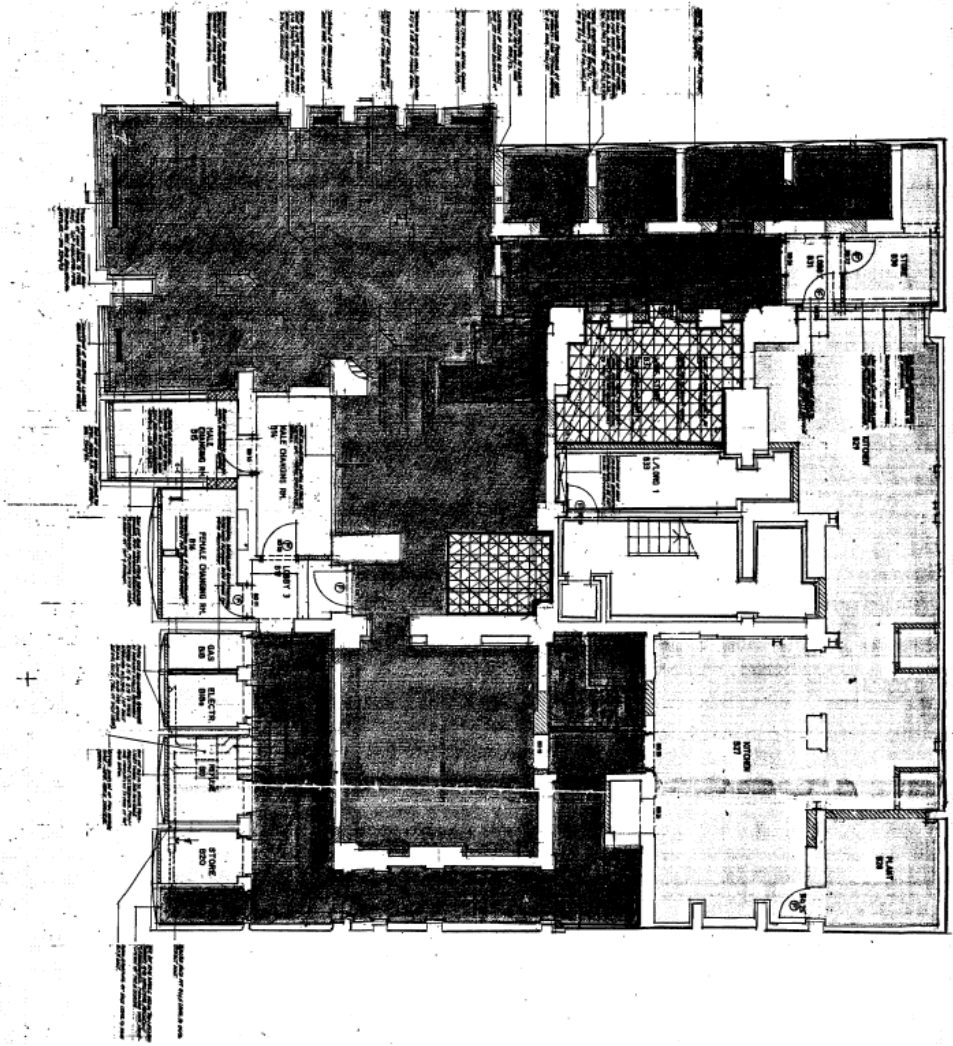

Viewing of recordings shall be made available immediately upon the request of Police or authorised officer throughout the preceding 31 day period.

A staff member from the premises who is conversant with the operation of the CCTV system shall be on the premises at all times when the premises are open. This staff member must be able to provide a Police or authorised council officer copies of recent CCTV images or data with the absolute minimum of delay when requested.

14. The maximum number of persons, including staff, to be present in the licensed premises shall not exceed the number specified from time to time by the proper officer of the London Fire and Civil Defence Authority. a)As to the basement 50 persons. b)As to the ground floor 100 persons.

The applicant has proposed to vary condition 14 to the following wording:

No licensable activities shall take at the premises until the capacity of the premises has been determined by the Environmental Health Consultation Team and the licensing authority has replaced this condition on the licence with a condition detailing the capacity so determined.

Conditions which reproduce the effect of any restriction imposed on the use of the premises by specified enactment

The applicant has proposed to delete condition 15 from the operating schedule of the licence.

15. (i) Alcohol shall not be sold, supplied, consumed in or taken from the premises except during permitted hours.

In this condition, permitted hours means:

- (a) On weekdays, other than Christmas Day or Good Friday, 08:00 to 23:00
 - (b) On Sundays, other than Christmas Day, 08:00 to 22:30
 - (c) On Good Friday, 12:00 to 22:30
 - (d) On Christmas Day, 12:00 to 15:00 and 19:00 to 22.30
 - (e) On New Year's Eve from the end of permitted hours on New Year's Eve to the start of permitted hours on the following day (or, if there are no permitted hours on the following day, midnight on 31st December).
- (ii) Alcohol may be sold or supplied for one hour following the hours set out above other than Christmas Day and New Year's Eve and on Christmas day, between 15:00 and 19:00 to persons taking table meals in the premises in a part of the premises usually set apart for the service of such persons and for consumption by such a person in that part of the premises as an ancillary to his meal. For other purposes or in other parts of the premises the hours set out above shall continue to apply.
- (iii) (a) Alcohol may be sold or supplied until 01.00 in the morning following weekdays (other than Good Friday and Christmas Day), 00.30 a.m. in the morning following Sundays (other than Christmas Day) and 00.30 in the morning following Good Friday to persons taking table meals in the premises in a part of the premises usually set apart for the service of such persons and for consumption by that person in that part of the premises as an ancillary to his meal.
- (b) That part of the premises must also be used for the provision of entertainment by persons present and performing to which the sale or supply of alcohol is also ancillary.
- (c) The alcohol must be sold or supplied at a time before (i) the provision of entertainment by persons present and performing or (ii) the provision of substantial refreshment, has ended. For other purposes or in other parts of the premises the hours set out above shall continue to apply.
- (d) This condition does not authorise any sale or supply to any person admitted to the premises either after midnight (23.00 on Sunday) or less than half an hour before the entertainment is due to end, except in accordance with condition number 10(ii) above.

NOTE - The above restrictions do not prohibit:

- (a) during the first thirty minutes after the above hours the consumption of the alcohol on the premises;
- (b) during the first twenty minutes after the above hours, the taking of the alcohol from the premises unless the alcohol is supplied or taken in an open vessel;
- (c) during the first thirty minutes after the above hours the consumption of the alcohol on the premises by persons taking table meals there if the alcohol was supplied for consumption as ancillary to the meals;
- (d) the sale or supply of alcohol to or the consumption of alcohol by any person residing in the licensed premises;
- (e) the ordering of alcohol to be consumed off the premises, or the despatch by the vendor of the alcohol so ordered;
- (f) the sale of alcohol to a trader or registered club for the purposes of the trade or club;
- (g) the sale or supply of alcohol to any canteen or mess, being a canteen in which the sale or supply of alcohol is carried out under the authority of the Secretary of State or an authorised mess of members of Her Majesty's naval, military or air forces;
- (h) the taking of alcohol from the premises by a person residing there;
- (i) the supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises to any private friends of a person residing there who are bona fide entertained by him at his own expense, or the consumption of alcohol by persons so supplied;
- (j) the supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises to persons employed there for the purposes of the business carried on by the holder of the licence, or the consumption of liquor so supplied, if the liquor is supplied at the expense of their employer or of the person carrying on or in charge of the business on the premises.

In this condition, any reference to a person residing in the premises shall be construed as including a person not residing there but carrying on or in charge of the business on the premises.

The applicant has proposed to delete condition 16 from the operating schedule of the licence.

16. No person under fourteen shall be in the bar of the licensed premises during the permitted hours unless one of the following applies:
- (a) He is the child of the holder of the premises licence.
 - (b) He resides in the premises, but is not employed there.
 - (c) He is in the bar solely for the purpose of passing to or from some part of the premises which is not a bar and to or from which there is no other convenient means of access or egress.
 - (d) The bar is in railway refreshment rooms or other premises constructed, fitted and intended to be used bona fide for any purpose to which the holding of the licence is ancillary.

In this condition "bar" includes any place exclusively or mainly used for the consumption of intoxicating liquor. But an area is not a bar when it is usual for it to be, and it is, set

apart for the service of table meals and alcohol is only sold or supplied to persons as an ancillary to their table meals.

17. The terminal hour for late night refreshment on New Year's Eve is extended to 05:00 on New Year's Day.

Annex 3 – Conditions attached after a hearing by the licensing authority

The applicant has proposed to delete condition 18 from the operating schedule of the licence.

18. There shall be no adult entertainment in the form of nudity and no restricted films shall be shown
19. Substantial food and non-intoxicating liquor including drinking water shall be available when the premises is open to the public.

The applicant has proposed to vary condition 19 to the following wording:

Substantial food and non-intoxicating beverages, including drinking water, shall be available in all parts of the premises where alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises.

20. Departing patrons waiting for a taxi shall remain inside the premises.

The applicant has proposed to vary condition 20 to the following wording:

After 23.00 hours departing patrons waiting for a taxi shall remain inside the premises.

21. There shall be no external music and entertainment in the outside seating area.

The applicant has proposed to vary condition 21 to the following wording:

No regulated entertainment shall be provided to the external terrace.

The applicant has proposed to delete condition 22 from the operating schedule of the licence.

22. A sound limiting device shall be located in a separate and remove lockable cabinet from the volume control must be fitted to the musical amplification system set at a level determined by and to the satisfaction of an authorised officer of the Environmental Health Service's Community Protection Department so as to ensure that no noise nuisance is caused to local residents. The operational panel of the noise limiter shall then be secured to the satisfaction of officers from the Environmental Health Service. The keys securing the noise limiter cabinet shall be held by the applicant only, and shall not be accessed by any other person. The limiter shall not be altered without prior agreement with the Environmental Health Service.

The applicant has proposed to delete condition 23 from the operating schedule of the licence.

23. No alteration shall be made to the sound limiting device without prior consent of the

Environmental Health Officer.

24. Between the hours of 8am and 10am Monday to Saturday and 8am and 12 noon on Sunday the supply of alcohol shall be ancillary to the provision of substantial food.

The applicant has proposed to delete condition 25 from the operating schedule of the licence.

25. Live Music to be limited to no more than two performers.
26. All external doors shall be kept closed after 9pm except for immediate access and egress.

The applicant has proposed to vary condition 26 to the following wording:

All windows and external doors shall be kept closed after 21.00 hours, or at any time when regulated entertainment takes place on the ground floor, except for the immediate access and egress of persons.

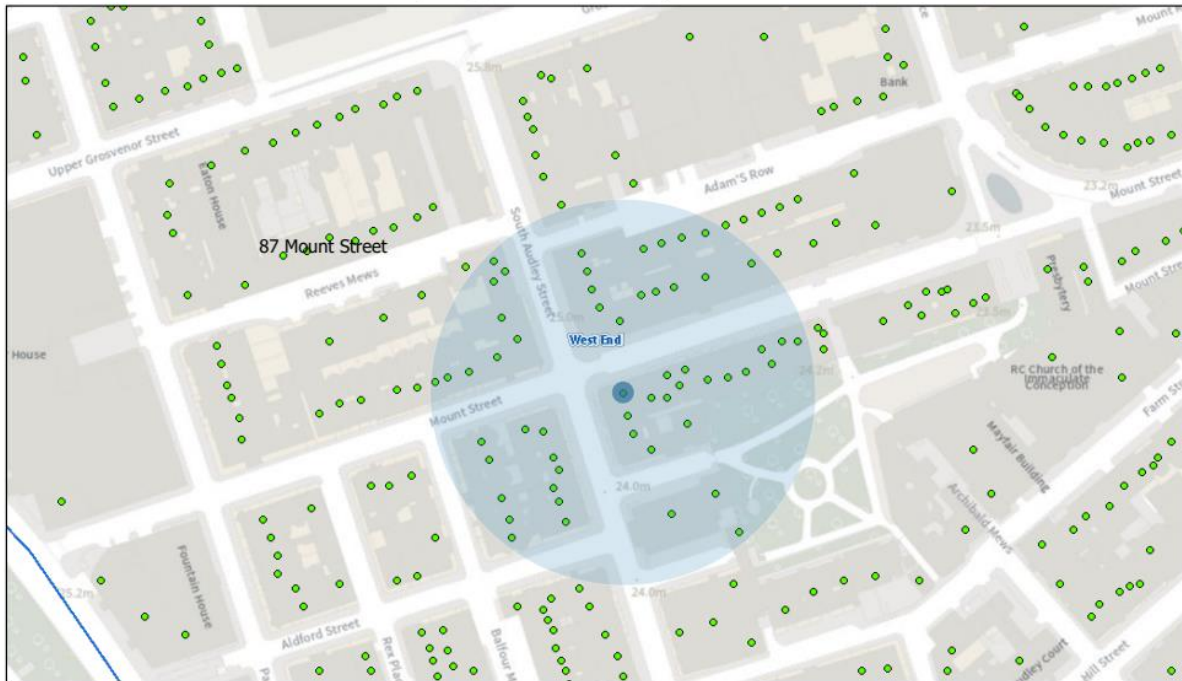
27. Signs shall be displayed at the exit of the premises requesting that patrons leave quietly.

Notices shall be prominently displayed at all exits requesting patrons to respect the needs of local residents and businesses and leave the area quietly.

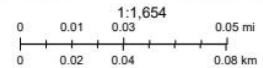
28. Regulated entertainment can commence from 08:00 on New Year's Eve and carry on through to the beginning of trading hours on New Year's Day.
