

Comment from:



On the basis of prevention of public nuisance, I object to:

Noise from customers & films would spread widely, particularly in summer when, contrary to the present licence, windows and external doors are often open after 20.00.

Customers exiting onto the street in the small hours would be no less noisy and disruptive than they already are at closing times (e.g. at midnight on May 22nd 2023 we were woken by a fight – possibly a "mock" fight – between a group of young men outside the door to the pub on

*Removal of the restriction on numbers – currently 30 - of outside drinkers. Outside drinkers and eaters are noisy: they shout, cheer, scream down their mobiles, sing etc. Even with a door supervisor 30 is quite often exceeded. There is not space for more than 30. Drinkers stand and sit well outside the pub's curtilage on Marylebone Lane in particular, and on Bentinck Street, blocking the pavements and so endangering pedestrians who are forced to walk in the street.

*Extension of the time drinkers may take drinks outside from 20.30 to 21.30 This would add to the existing nuisance.

*Employing door supervisors following a risk assessment. Even current supervision is not fully effective (one supervisor said "well, what can I do? All the other pubs spill out like this one")

I have not complained recently about the noise from the pub nor about the blocking of pavements and the excessive numbers of outside drinkers, as I am sympathetic to the problems of small businesses trying to survive in these difficult times.

NB The green-hatching on the ground-floor plan shows a possibly inaccurate width of the pub's curtilage on Marylebone Lane. It is 28"/71 cms wide, scarcely enough for people to stand in a single line i.e. unsuitable for convivial drinking.

The plan does not show the tables outside the pub on Marylebone Lane. One small table fits into the curtilage, but two large, four-seater+ tables extend well on to the pavement, blocking pedestrians and forcing them into the street.

The proposed plan omits Main Entrance from the Lane door (given on the current plan).

On the basis of prevention of public nuisance, I object to:

The following is what I would say in objecting to the Coachmakers' proposals: 1: The showing of films on all floors between 10.00 and 1.30 a.m. Monday - Saturday, and 1200 to – 01.00 on Sundays.

Such showings would disturb the quiet and privacy of

Noise from customers & films inside the pub would spread widely outside, especially in summer when the pub's windows are usually left open. Customers going out on to the street at 1.30 a.m. are likely to be talking and laughing just as noisily as they already do at midnight. In we have secondary glazing, but we have to keep our windows shut even in the summer to

try to reduce the noise which emanates from inside and outside the pub. It disturbs conversations, watching television and listening to music, while we often hear raucous conversation and laughter well after midnight as groups linger before leaving

2: Recognising that the licensing trade faces difficulties I have tolerated the existing arrangements, (conditions added following a review) even though customers cause nuisance with their loud talk (especially into mobiles), laughter, shouting, singing, music etc. They also block the pavements on both Bentinck Street and on Marylebone Lane, where large tables and chairs extend well beyond the narrow width of the curtilage. I sympathize; but do not think the pub has a right to continue to create such nuisances.

I consider hours should not be extended beyond already licensed activities. Extension of the time customers may take drinks outside from 20.30 to 21.30 would only make matters a little worse for residents and the general public, unless properly controlled.

In the interests of protecting the public and residents, the restriction on numbers of outside drinkers (currently 30) should NOT be removed. Supervisors often seem to lack the authority to limit numbers, but do exercise some control, and should be retained as at present.

3: Particularly since the recent installation of a wooden cover for two large bins outside the pub on Bentinck Street there is scarcely enough room for 30 within the pub's curtilage. This number is often exceeded by customers on Bentinck Street standing outside the barriers, which are movable and consequently are sometimes pushed out into the pavement. Customers on Marylebone Lane can hardly fit into the very narrow (71 cms) curtilage, and two large tables extend well into the pavement, dangerously causing many pedestrians to step into the street. These tables, and a smaller one which does fit into the curtilage, are not shown on the proposed plan.

(2)add the provision of films on all floors (There are four floors; films to be shown from 10.00 - 1.30 a.m. Monday – Saturday, 12.00 to 1.00 on Sundays)

(3)remove and replace conditions relating to door supervisors and the outside drinking area as follows:

to remove from annex 3 condition 20 and replace with the following wording: (Annex 3 condition 20 limits the number of outside drinkers to 30. The proposed new wording places no limit on the numbers)

1.Door supervisors shall be employed at the premises based upon a risk assessment carried out taking into account expected audience, time of year and whether there are any special occasions/holidays. All door supervisors will correctly display their SIA licence so as to be visible when on duty at the premises. (*Currently there is regular door supervision*) to remove from annex 3 condition 27 and replace with the following wording:

1.Alcohol consumed outside the premises building shall only be consumed by patrons within the area hatched green on the approved plan. (It is difficult to determine the width of the area hatched green – see my NB below)

This application has been discussed on site with Mr Dave Nevitt, Environmental Health Officer pursuant to a formal pre-app.

objection

On the basis of prevention of public nuisance, I object to:

*Showing films on 4 floors from 10.00 to 01.30 (12.00 - 01.00 Sundays). This would compromise the privacy and quiet of Despite secondary glazing and shutting our windows, noise penetrates to Despite secondary glazing permission sought beyond the hours of already-licensed activities?

Noise from customers & films would spread widely, particularly in summer when, contrary to the present licence, windows and external doors are often open after 20.00.

Customers exiting onto the street in the small hours would be no less noisy and disruptive than they already are at closing times.

*Removal of the restriction on numbers – currently 30 - of outside drinkers. Outside drinkers and eaters shout, cheer, scream down their mobiles, sing etc. Even with a door supervisor 30 is quite often exceeded. There is not space for more than 30. Drinkers stand outside the pub's curtilage on blocking the pavements.

*Extension of the time drinkers may take drinks outside from 20.30 to 21.30 would add to the existing nuisance.

*Employing door supervisors following a risk assessment. Current supervision is not fully effective (one supervisor said "well, what can I do? All the other pubs spill out like this one")

NB The green-hatching on the ground-floor plan shows a possibly inaccurate width of the pub's curtilage on Marylebone Lane. It is scarcely wide enough for people to stand in a single line i.e. unsuitable for convivial drinking. The plan does not show the tables outside the pub on the Lane. One small table fits into the curtilage, but two large, four-seater+ tables extend well on to the pavement, blocking pedestrians. The proposed plan omits Main Entrance from the Lane door (given on the current plan).

Comments: 23/05/2023 5:25 PM objects to this licence variation as we believe there will be an increase in public nuisance contrary to policy PN1.

This establishment was subject to a review in 2010 and the resulting licence conditions were acceptable to all locals concerned including the ability for drinkers to imbibe outside the premises up until 20:30. The pandemic then caused numerous changes to many pubs including this one and on a 'temporary basis' licencing conditions were relaxed to try and support the hospitality industry. This support came at the cost to many local residents in terms of increased evening-time noise nuisance from outside dining and drinking. We can see no reason why the conditions should not revert back to the pre-covid post 2010 ones.

In addition, we have local residents reporting to us that the time limit and numbers limit are frequently exceeded in the recent past so we do not agree to the withdrawal of SIA personel at the whim of the licencee. Given that the pavement in Marylebone Lane is rather narrow it is inevitable that pedestrians will be forced into the road so we believe outside control is important. The balance between the desire of the business and the wellbeing of the residents will be enhanced with continued external security personel.

Applicant's Written Submissions

This statement is made in support of an application to vary the premises licence with the intention of outlining the Applicant's case and seeking to address the concerns of those maintaining representations.

Amplification of the points made below, together with further submissions, will be made orally at the licensing sub-committee hearing.

Background

The Applicant acquired the Premises, then a busy bar, in 2017. The Premises was refurbished and the menu changed to reflect the standards of the Applicant's sister pubs and boutique hotels in Belgravia, Knightsbridge, Pimlico, Mayfair, Notting Hill, the West End and the west side of Marylebone. Please see http://cubitthouse.co.uk/. Pictures of the Premises are at exhibit 1 with indicative food and drinks menus at exhibit 2. The Premises is divided into a cocktail bar/function room in the basement, a bar and dining room on the ground floor with a small outside area for vertical drinkers on Bentinck Street, a seated outside area (by virtue of a Pavement Licence) on Marylebone Lane and a more formal dining room on the first floor.

Before making this application, formal pre-app advice was sought from Mr Dave Nevitt of Environmental Health (now retired) and letters were posted to the residents of

Reasons for the Application

The reason for seeking this variation, as per the formal pre-app and as detailed in the application, is threefold:

To vary the approved plan to delineate an outside drinking area and vary times for outside drinking

The current conditions relating to outside drinking are vague, overly restrictive and probably unenforceable. The condition attempting to limit numbers reads:

"Throughout licensable hours no more than 30 patrons shall be permitted to take drinks from the premises in open containers and/or smoke outside at any one time."

At the pre-app meeting both the writer and Mr Dave Nevitt were unsure as to what this condition means. For example, can any number of patrons be outside with drinks provided only 30 move away from the Premises? Can one patron take numerous drinks for friends already outside and they do not add to the number? Or does it mean that once 30 patrons have stepped outside has the limit been reached even though some patrons have moved back inside? Mr Nevitt was of the view that it would be more sensible to have a delineated outside drinking area which would aid enforcement and ensure that patrons cannot leave the immediate environs of the Premises and, for example, drink on the steps of Bentinck Block opposite the Premises. Hence the application to remove this condition and lodge a plan with a hatched outside area.

Mr Nevitt was also in agreement that an amendment to the permitted outside drinking area was reasonable. When the 21.00 hrs curfew was applied the Premises was a wet-led pub with a high proportion of alcohol sales. Under the supervision of Ben Tish (critically acclaimed chef and author) the upstairs is purely a restaurant and food is becoming far more of a feature on the ground floor. The clientele has also changed with less of a focus on afterwork vertical drinking customers.

To add the provision of films

Whilst there are currently no firm plans in place the Applicant has toyed with the idea of showing films in the basement on quieter nights to create a themed event. For example, you could show a James Bond film with accompanying drinks such as Vespers, Champagne, Vodka Martinis etc.

To remove the requirement to have door supervisors

The requirement to have door supervisors is another hangover from when the Premises was a wet-led operation. No other site in the Cubitt House Group has a door supervisor requirement and there is no such requirement to have door supervisors on other similar establishments in the area. Not only are they very expensive but they give the wrong impression to potential patrons walking past. Nevertheless, the condition proffered does require that the need to have door supervisors is risk assessed and it might be appropriate to employ them at certain times of the year and, for example, when the basement is open late.

The Representations

After reading the comments below, if any interested party wishes to discuss any of the points raised, have remaining concerns or wish to suggest further conditions, they are urged to contact the writer, Niall McCann, at <u>niall.mccann@keystonelaw.co.uk</u>. In these difficult times the Applicant wishes to ensure a good relationship with all more than ever and will happily implement any further measures which are operationally viable.

The Applicant's comments on the representations are as follows:

Environmental Health

Unfortunately, Mr Nevitt retired before the end of the statutory consultation period. Ms Kudzaishe Mondhlani took over the application and has raised a representation. However, following a site visit on 25 May 2023, the Applicant understands that her concerns have been largely alleviated, albeit her representation remains in order to advise the Licensing Sub-Committee.

Local Residents

To avoid duplication, rather than commenting on each representation in turn, the Applicant's comments on the general concerns raised are as follows: • Noise from the showing of films

As explained above, the wish to show films is merely an idea at present. Any films shown on the ground and first floors are likely to be when these spaces are hired for corporate training days (which is very rare). Any films shown for informative or education purposes are not licensable. Given this, the Applicant is happy to restrict the showing of any films to the basement and proffers the following condition:

"Exhibition of Film as a licensable activity is to be restricted to the basement"

The hours sought for the exhibition of films reflect the current permitted opening hours.

• Concerns in respect of removing the current conditions restricting numbers outside

The rational behind seeking to remove this condition is explained above. At present there is no restriction on drinking standing well outside the Premises' curtilage and the proposed variation will directly address the residents' concerns. By ensuring that outside drinking is kept to the hatched areas there will be an effective limit on numbers in any event.

• Width of the Hatching and the Plan

If this application is granted as sought, the intention is to apply for a pavement licence on Bentinck Street and have standing drinkers on Marylebone Lane, thus reducing the number of patrons facing the residents which have raised representations. The proposed plan shows both doors onto Marylebone Lane.

Extension of hours

A modest extension to the permitted hours outside is sought. Other pubs in the area (most of which are far more drinks led) are situated close to residential properties and yet do not have such early terminal hours for the use of outside space. Given the markedly different operation of

the Premises to pervious guises the Applicant believes that slightly later hours will not have an adverse impact on the public nuisance objective. Also, by having patrons seated immediately facing the main residential block (and by extension often dining) there should be less noise than generated by patrons standing (see above).

For the avoidance of doubt, no application has been made to extend the hours of the Premises. Occasionally the basement of the Premises opens until later than the City of Westminster's Core Hours but only when there is a Temporary Event Notice in place.

Requirement to have a door supervisor

Most pubs in the City of Westminster, even those that are wet led, do not have a requirement to have a door supervisor on prescribed days. Those that do tend to attract a boisterous crowd and are open late or show Premiership football. This is not the case with the Premises. The Applicant has no knowledge of the alleged fight on 23 May 2023.

In any event, the current door supervisor condition is not fit for purpose with it being restricted to calendar dates and seemingly arbitrary times. Having a risk assessed approach means that the Premises' budget can be better deployed employing door supervisors when they are required. It should be noted that the Metropolitan Police, the 'independent experts' in respect of crime and disorder, have not raised a representation opposing this amendment.

Pictures in support of the objections

Pictures taken of the outside of licensed premises are often damming, being a mere 'snapshot' rather than an accurate portrayal of an operation over a long period of time. However, in this case, the Applicant does <u>not</u> believe they are incriminating. The pictures that are dated state 2021 and the first undated picture was taken during the City of Westminster's Al Fresco scheme as the yellow barrier closing the street to traffic is visible. This was a time when the country was still in the grip of Covid-19 with many patrons still wanting to eat and drink outside. Whole streets were closed and full of people eating and drinking. Nevertheless, the pictures show a well natured

crowd of both sexes and all ages, seating and standing in small groups chatting. There is no sign of anti-social behaviour.

Westminster City Council's Statement of Licensing Policy (the "Policy") and Case Law

There is no representation from the Licensing Authority – effectively the gatekeeper of the Policy. The Premises is not located within West End Cumulative Impact Area. Therefore, there is no rebuttable presumption to refuse the Application and that the application should be granted if the criteria in CD1, PS1, PN1 and CH1 are met.

As is well documented, it is currently a difficult time for the hospitality industry. At the same time as costs are rising due to inflation there is a cost of living crisis which is reducing patrons' spending power. Whilst a relevant argument Pre-Covid, the consideration of economic factors is now even more important. The Applicant wishes to remind the licensing sub-committee of the case of <u>*R*</u> (o/a/o Hope and Glory Public House Ltd) v City of Westminster Magistrates' Court and Others [2011] EWCA Civ 31, and the observation of Toulson LJ that:

"Licensing decisions often involve weighing a variety of competing considerations: the demand for licensed establishments, <u>the economic benefit to the proprietor and to the locality by drawing in</u> <u>visitors and stimulating the demand</u>, the effect on law and order, the impact on the lives of those who live and work in the vicinity, and so on."

Conclusion

This has been a carefully thought-out application where formal pre-app advice was sought and residents warned in advance. The Post-Covid world dictates that operators must avoid unnecessary expenditure and look to maximise what assets they have. The Applicant believes that the current burdens can be eased whilst still upholding the licensing objectives. The operation of the Premises is a world away from what it was in 2010 when the premises licence was reviewed and the Applicant respectfully asks to be permitted to trade in a similar fashion to other comparable venues in Marylebone.

 - (2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises—
 - (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to;
 - (i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
 - (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
 - (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
 - (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
 - (d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner;
 - (e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).
- 5. The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
- 6. (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
 - (2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.

- (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either—
 - (a) a holographic mark, or
 - (b) an ultraviolet feature.
- 7. The responsible person must ensure that—
 - (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures—
 - (i) beer or cider: $\frac{1}{2}$ pint;
 - (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
 - (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml;
 - (b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
 - (c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

A responsible person in relation to a licensed premises means the holder of the premise licence in respect of the premises, the designated premises supervisor (if any) or any individual aged 18 or over who is authorised by either the licence holder or designated premises supervisor. For premises with a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity that which enables him to prevent the supply of alcohol.

- 8(i) A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.
- 8(ii) For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 8(i) above -
 - (a) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979;
 - (b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula -

P = D+(DxV)

Where -

- (i) P is the permitted price,
- (ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
- V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;
- (c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence -

- (i) the holder of the premises licence,
- (ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or
- (iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;
- (d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and
- (e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.
- 8(iii). Where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8(ii)(b) above would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.
- 8(iv). (1) Sub-paragraph 8(iv)(2) below applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8(ii)(b) above on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.
 - (2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.
- 9. All persons guarding premises against unauthorised access or occupation or against outbreaks of disorder or against damage (door supervisors) must be licensed by the Security Industry Authority.

Conditions reproducing the effect of conditions subject to which the relevant existing licences have effect

10. The terminal hour for late night refreshment on New Year's Eve is extended to 05:00 on New Year's Day.

Annex 2 – Conditions consistent with the operating Schedule

- 11. The premises shall install and maintain a comprehensive CCTV system as per the minimum requirements of the Westminster Police Licensing Team. All entry and exit points will be covered enabling frontal identification of every person entering in any light condition. The CCTV system shall continually record whilst the premises is open for licensable activities and during all times when customers remain on the premises. All recordings shall be stored for a minimum period of 31 days with date and time stamping. Viewing of recordings shall be made available immediately upon the request of Police or authorised officer throughout the entire 31 day period.
- 12. A staff member from the premises who is conversant with the operation of the CCTV system shall be on the premises at all times when the premises is open. This staff member must be able to provide a Police or authorised council officer copies of recent CCTV images or data with the absolute minimum of delay when requested
- 13. A Challenge 21 or Challenge 25 proof of age scheme shall be operated at the premises where the only acceptable forms of identification are recognised photographic identification cards, such as a driving licence, passport or proof of age card with the PASS Hologram
- 14. An incident log shall be kept at the premises, and made available on request to an authorised officer of the City Council or the Police. It must be completed within 24 hours of the incident and will record the following: (a) all crimes reported to the venue (b) all ejections of patrons (c) any complaints received concerning crime and disorder (d) any incidents of disorder (e) all seizures of drugs or offensive weapons (f) any faults in the CCTV system, searching equipment or scanning equipment (g) any refusal of the sale of alcohol (h) any visit by a relevant authority or emergency service.
- 15. Substantial food and non-intoxicating beverages, including drinking water, shall be available in all parts of the premises where alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises.
- 16. (i) Alcohol may be sold or supplied:

(a)Monday to Thursday 10:00 - 23:30
(b)Friday to Saturday 10:00 - 00:00
(c)Sundays 12:00 - 22:30
(d)Bank Holiday Sundays 10:00 - 00:00
(e) On New Year's Eve from the end of permitted hours on New Year's Eve to the start of permitted hours on the following day (or, if there are no permitted hours on the following day, midnight on 31st December).

(ii). Notwithstanding the usual hours for the sale of alcohol and the provision of late night refreshment, in respect of the basement and first floors only, at anytime when the basement and/or first floor are set aside for the provision of table meals to which the sale or supply of alcohol and the consumption of alcohol is an ancillary a table meal, then the terminal hour for the sale of supply of alcohol in such areas shall be 11.30pm on Sundays and midnight on Mondays to Saturdays with an additional 30 minutes drinking up time in each case and the terminal hour for late night refreshment shall be midnight on Sundays and 00.30am on the day following on Mondays to Saturdays.

NOTE - The above restrictions do not prohibit:




- (b) the ordering of alcohol to be consumed off the premises, or the despatch by the vendor of the alcohol so ordered;
- (c) the sale of alcohol to a trader or registered club for the purposes of the trade or club;
- (d) the sale or supply of alcohol to any canteen or mess, being a canteen in which the sale or supply of alcohol is carried out under the authority of the Secretary of State or an authorised mess of members of Her Majesty's naval, military or air forces;
- (e) the taking of alcohol from the premises by a person residing there;



Annex 3 – Conditions attached after a hearing by the licensing authority

- 17. No noise shall emanate from the premises nor vibration be transmitted through the structure of the premises which gives rise to a nuisance.
- 18. All windows and external doors shall be kept closed after 20.00 hours, or at any time when regulated entertainment takes place on either the ground or first floor, except for the immediate access and egress of persons.
- 19. Notices shall be prominently displayed at all exits requesting patrons to respect the needs of local residents and leave the area quietly.
- 20. From 1st May to 30th September on Thursdays and Fridays, from 5pm to 10pm, there shall be 1 SIA registered door supervisor employed at the premises whose sole responsibility shall be to monitor the use of the outside areas. Outside of those dates and times the premises licence holder shall employ an SIA registered door supervisor where it thinks it is appropriate to do so.
- 21. The staff at all times shall monitor the activity of persons leaving the premises and when necessary remind them to respect the needs of local residents.
- 22. No customers shall be permitted to take drinks from the premises in an open container after 20.30 hours and any existing customer drinking in that area shall be cleared by 21.00, this includes those patrons smoking.
- 23. A sufficient number of clearly marked receptacles shall be provided outside the premises for the disposal of cigarette butts.
- 24. The pavement from the building line to the kerb edge immediately outside the premises, including gutter/channel at its junction with the kerb edge, shall be swept and or washed, and litter and sweepings collected and stored in accordance with the approved refuse storage arrangements.
- 25. The highway and other land in the vicinity must be monitored regularly throughout licensable hours to ensure that drinking containers/vessels are removed and best endeavours will be used to prevent public nuisance or obstruction to the public highway.
- 26. A direct telephone number for the manager at the premises shall be publicly available at all times the premises is open. This telephone number is to be made available to residents in the vicinity.
- 27. Throughout licensable hours no more than 30 patrons shall be permitted to take drinks from the premises in open containers and/or smoke outside at any one time.

(d)Bank Holiday Sundays 10:00 - 00:00
(e) On New Year's Eve from the end of permitted hours on New Year's Eve to the start of permitted hours on the following day (or, if there are no permitted hours on the following day, midnight on 31st December).

(ii). Notwithstanding the usual hours for the sale of alcohol and the provision of late night refreshment, in respect of the basement and first floors only, at anytime when the basement and/or first floor are set aside for the provision of table meals to which the sale or supply of alcohol and the consumption of alcohol is an ancillary a table meal, then the terminal hour for the sale of supply of alcohol in such areas shall be 11.30pm on Sundays and midnight on Mondays to Saturdays with an additional 30 minutes

drinking up time in each case and the terminal hour for late night refreshment shall be midnight on Sundays and 00.30am on the day following on Mondays to Saturdays.

NOTE - The above restrictions do not prohibit:

- (a) the sale or supply of alcohol to or the consumption of alcohol by any person residing in the licensed premises;
- (b) the ordering of alcohol to be consumed off the premises, or the despatch by the vendor of the alcohol so ordered;
- (c) the sale of alcohol to a trader or registered club for the purposes of the trade or club;
- (d) the sale or supply of alcohol to any canteen or mess, being a canteen in which the sale or supply of alcohol is carried out under the authority of the Secretary of State or an authorised mess of members of Her Majesty's naval, military or air forces;
- (e) the taking of alcohol from the premises by a person residing there;
- (f) the supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises to any private friends of a person residing there who are bona fide entertained by him at his own expense, or the consumption of alcohol by persons so supplied;
- (g) the supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises to persons employed there for the purposes of the business carried on by the holder of the licence, or the consumption of liquor so supplied, if the liquor is supplied at the expense of their employer or of the person carrying on or in charge of the business on the premises.

In this condition, any reference to a person residing in the premises shall be construed as including a person not residing there but carrying on or in charge of the business on the premises.

Annex 3 – Conditions attached after a hearing by the licensing authority

- 17. No noise shall emanate from the premises nor vibration be transmitted through the structure of the premises which gives rise to a nuisance.
- 18. All windows and external doors shall be kept closed after 20.00 hours, or at any time when regulated entertainment takes place on either the ground or first floor, except for the immediate access and egress of persons.
- 19. Notices shall be prominently displayed at all exits requesting patrons to respect the needs of local residents and leave the area quietly.
- 20. From 1st May to 30th September on Thursdays and Fridays, from 5pm to 10pm, there shall be 1 SIA registered door supervisor employed at the premises whose sole responsibility shall be to monitor the use of the outside areas. Outside of those dates and times the premises licence holder shall employ an SIA registered door supervisor where it thinks it is appropriate to do so.

Condition 20 is proposed to be varied by the applicant as follows:

- 20. Door supervisors shall be employed at the premises based upon a risk assessment carried out taking into account expected audience, time of year and whether there are any special occasions/holidays. All door supervisors will correctly display their SIA licence so as to be visible when on duty at the premises.
- 21. The staff at all times shall monitor the activity of persons leaving the premises and when necessary remind them to respect the needs of local residents.

22. No customers shall be permitted to take drinks from the premises in an open container after 20.30 hours and any existing customer drinking in that area shall be cleared by 21.00, this includes those patrons smoking.

Condition 22 is proposed to be varied by the applicant as follows:

- 22. No customers shall be permitted to take drinks from the premises in an open container after 21.30 hours and any existing customer drinking in that area shall be cleared by 22.00.
- 23. A sufficient number of clearly marked receptacles shall be provided outside the premises for the disposal of cigarette butts.
- 24. The pavement from the building line to the kerb edge immediately outside the premises, including gutter/channel at its junction with the kerb edge, shall be swept and or washed, and litter and sweepings collected and stored in accordance with the approved refuse storage arrangements.
- 25. The highway and other land in the vicinity must be monitored regularly throughout licensable hours to ensure that drinking containers/vessels are removed and best endeavours will be used to prevent public nuisance or obstruction to the public highway.
- 26. A direct telephone number for the manager at the premises shall be publicly available at all times the premises is open. This telephone number is to be made available to residents in the vicinity.
- 27. Throughout licensable hours no more than 30 patrons shall be permitted to take drinks from the premises in open containers and/or smoke outside at any one time.

Condition 27 is proposed to be varied by the applicant as follows:

27. Alcohol consumed outside the premises building shall only be consumed by patrons within the area hatched green on the approved plan.
