<p>I write in relation to the application submitted for a variation of the premises licence for 32 Great Windmill Street, London, W1D 7LR.</p> <p>As a responsible authority under section 13 (4) of the Licensing Act 2003 as amended under the Police and Social Responsibility Act 2011, the Licensing Authority have considered your application in full. The Licensing Authority has concerns in relation to this application and how the premises would promote the four Licensing Objectives:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Public Nuisance</li> <li>• Prevention of Crime &amp; Disorder</li> <li>• Public Safety</li> <li>• Protection of children from harm</li> </ul> <p>The application seeks to vary the following:</p> <p>To increase the hours to:</p> <p><b>Sale by Retail of Alcohol</b>  Monday to Thursday: 09:00 to 00:00  Friday to Saturday: 09:00 to 01:30  Sunday: 09:00 to 22:30, remains the same.</p> <p>Non-standard Timings: 09:00 to 01:30 on the Sundays immediately before a Bank Holiday.</p>	

**Late Night Refreshment**

Monday to Thursday: 23:00 to 00:00

Friday to Saturday: 23:00 to 01:30

Non-standard Timings: 23:00 to 01:30 on the Sundays immediately before a Bank Holiday.

The premises are located within the West End Cumulative Impact Zone and as such various policy points must be considered, namely CIP1, HRS1 and RNT1.

The Licensing Authority note that the proposed variation does not fall within Westminster's core hours for Restaurants.

**Restaurants**

Monday to Thursday: 9am to 11.30pm.

Friday and Saturday: 9am to 12am.

Sunday: 9am to 10.30pm.

Sundays immediately prior to a bank holiday: 9am to 12am.

The Licensing Authority encourages the applicant to provide further submissions as to why the applicant wants to extend the hours beyond core as this can have a detrimental impact on the west end cumulative impact zone.

This application falls under Westminster's RNT1 (B) Policy which states 'B. Applications inside the West End Cumulative Impact Zone will generally be granted subject to:

1. The application meeting the requirements of policies CD1, PS1, PN1 and CH1.
2. The hours for licensable activities are within the council's Core Hours Policy HRS1.
3. The operation of any delivery services for alcohol and/or latenight refreshment meeting the council's Ancillary Delivery of Alcohol and/or Late-Night Refreshment Policy DEL1.
4. The applicant has demonstrated that they will not add to cumulative impact within the Cumulative Impact Zone.
5. The application and operation of the venue meeting the definition of a restaurant as per Clause C.

C. For the purposes of this policy a restaurant is defined as:

1. A premises in which customers are shown to their table or the customer will select a table themselves to which food is either served to them or they have collected themselves.
2. Which provide food in the form of substantial table meals that are prepared on the premises and are served and consumed at a table.
3. Which do not provide any takeaway service of food and/or drink for immediate consumption, except if provided via an ancillary delivery service to customers at their residential or workplace address.
4. Where alcohol shall not be sold, supplied, or consumed on the premises otherwise than to persons who are bona fide taking substantial table meals and provided always that the consumption of alcohol by such persons is ancillary to taking such meals.
5. The sale and consumption of alcohol prior to such meals may be in a bar area but must also be ancillary to the taking of such meal.

The Licensing Authority encourages the applicant to provide further submissions as to how the increase of hours will not add to cumulative impact in the West End cumulative impact area, in accordance with policy CIP1.

The Licensing Authority would like submissions from applicant in regard to the above questions so the application can be assessed further against any further relevant policy considerations.

The Licensing Authority looks forward to receiving further submissions from the applicant in due course.

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**I refer to the variation application for the above premises which is located in the West End Cumulative Impact Zone as defined in Westminster's Statement of Licensing Policy.**

Representation is made as the proposal may lead to undermining the licencing objective of Prevention of Public Nuisance.

A premises history check of Environmental Health records shows the current operation has not been the cause of nuisance complaints made against the premises since it opened earlier this year. Nevertheless as the premises are located in West End Cumulative Impact Zone the applicant needs to demonstrate 'exception to policy' in how the premises will not add to cumulative impact for this request to operate beyond 'core' hours.

The applicant is requested to contact the undersigned, including arranging a site visit, to discuss the issues raised by this application.

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With reference to the application for **CheeMc, 32 Great Windmill Street, W1D 7LR – 23/07209/LIPV**, I am writing to inform you that the Metropolitan Police Service is **objecting** to this application on the basis that if granted, it would undermine the Licensing Objectives, namely the Prevention of Crime and Disorder.

The applicant is seeking to vary the current licence to:

**• Alcohol Sales (On Sales):**

Monday to Thursday: 09:00 to 00:00

Friday to Saturday: 09:00 to 01:30

Sunday: 09:00 to 22:30

**• Late Night Refreshment:**

Monday to Thursday: 23:00 to 00:00

Friday to Saturday: 23:00 to 01:30

The venue currently operates as a core hour's restaurant with on sale alcohol sales and is situated within the heart of Cumulative Impact Zone (CIZ).

However, the hours sought within the application are beyond those of the Westminster Councils Core Hours Policy (HRS1) and the Police are concerned that the venue may add to the cumulative impact in an already demanding area.

The crime levels within the CIZ are at significant levels and it is felt that the extra hours will have an adverse impact in the area. Customers may be tempted to remain within the CIZ and will continue drinking, as opposed to dispersing from the area. This may increase the risk of intoxication and vulnerability levels of the customers and will potentially allow them to become the victims and/or perpetrators of crime and disorder.

It is for these reasons that the Metropolitan Police Service have objected to this application and we request that the licensing sub-committee members to refuse the application in its current form.

<p>I am very concerned that yet another premises is applying for an extension to their licence beyond core hours. Already, local residents are kept awake later and later by the kind of drunken anti-social behaviour that this attracts ie: drug dealing, pedicabs etc. The street urination, vomiting or worse, [REDACTED] is in itself a powerful emetic. Why does a restaurant need such a late licence?</p>

<p>We object to this application to increase the hours of operation on Monday to Thursday, sales of alcohol until midnight and closing 12.30am, and Friday to Saturday, alcohol 1.30am, closing at 2am. The applicant describes the premises as a restaurant however it also provides karaoke facilities.</p> <p>As the Committee will be aware the onus is on the applicant to demonstrate they will not increase cumulative impact and will promote the licensing objectives.</p>			

'West End Zone 1 is the epicentre for issues associated with cumulative impact within the borough,' draft Cumulative Impact Assessment 2023 (CIA) a statement that comes as no surprise to Soho residents. Soho is at the heart of the West End's entertainment district with its **489** li- censed premises which includes a large proportion being late night **121** (25%) licensed with a terminal hour between 1am - 6am and a **capacity of 22,827**. The draft CIA 2023 confirms crime levels in Westminster has reached pre-COVID levels and since the last Cumulative Impact Assessment 2020 crimes have concentrated even further in the West End. The modelling shows a 50% increase in undesirable behaviours from any new OR extended licence. It proposes a new Licensing Authority Statement which makes it clear granting further authorisations and variations in the West End Zone 1 would be inconsistent with the authority's duty under the Licensing Act 2003. The evidence is clear any increase in hours of this restaurant at night will fail to promote the licensing objectives and increase cumulative impact. (Appendix 1 Cumulative Impact, Appendix 2 Crime and Disorder).

We support the residents who have objected to this application, [REDACTED] [REDACTED] have raised complaints of late night noise [REDACTED]. Overall there are real concerns amongst residents about the ever increasing numbers of licensed premises and people on the streets at night causing disturbance, they have been subjected to noise disturbance and anti-social behaviour that is beyond acceptable levels. They are disturbed by the late night activity as people walk by either shouting, screaming or arguing, noise from pedicabs, car doors slamming, horns honking, and are subjected to anti-social behaviour with people vomiting and urinating in the street and in their doorways.

Residents are also disturbed even if an establishment is not located directly on their street, as patrons usually intoxicated leave premises and either carry on their night out in Soho or as they make their way home making a noise and disturbing residents along the way.

It is therefore unsurprising that a survey conducted by [REDACTED] confirms that residents are disturbed by noise at night and this is having a negative impact on their lives. 87 people responded of which 78 are Soho residents with ages spread fairly evenly from 22 to 80, 59% having lived in Soho for more than 10 years.

When asked about disturbed sleep; 24% of respondents have their sleep disturbed 7 nights a week, 16% 5 or 6 nights a week and 19% 3 or 4 nights a week.

Furthermore, 64% of respondents agreed that noise nuisance from increased commercial activity at night is the most serious problem impacting Soho residents quality of life.

62% of respondents agreed that the council should not grant any extensions of hours for premises in Soho.

60% of respondents agreed that noise nuisance and sleep deprivation is adversely impacting my health and the health of the people they live with.

46% of respondents agreed that noise nuisance is so bad that they have considered moving away from Soho.

The full survey can be found in Appendix 3.

### **In summary**

Considering the evidence presented above this application to increase the hours late in to night in the West End Impact Zone cannot be justified, the applicant has to demonstrate they will not increase cumulative impact and will promote the licensing objectives, they have failed to do and we respectfully ask the Committee to refuse this application.

**Appendix 1 : Cumulative Impact**

This area has been identified by Westminster City Council as under stress because of the cumulative effect of the concentration of licensed premises has led to serious problems of disorder and/or public nuisance affecting residents, visitors and other businesses. The evidence presented in the draft Cumulative Impact Assessment 2023 continues to show high levels of cumulative impact in the West End Zone 1 in 2022, it states,

**'West End Zone 1 is the epicentre for issues associated with cumulative impact within the borough.'** (p.50)

The proposed Licensing Authority Statement strengthens the previous 2020 CIA statement in acknowledging the increasing and detrimental impact of the large number of licensed premises in the West End, it concludes,

**'It is the view of the Licensing Authority that the number of relevant authorisations in respect of premises in parts of the West End is such that it is likely that it would be inconsistent with the authority's duty under section 4(1) Licensing Act 2003 to grant any further relevant authorisations or variations in respect of premises in that area. In accordance with section 5A(6) of the Licensing Act 2003 the Licensing authority will consult on its intention to publish this cumulative impact assessment prior to its final approval and publication.'** (p.80) **(our emphasis)**

In any application for an alcohol licence in the Cumulative Impact Zone the applicant is required to demonstrate that the application will not increase the Cumulative Impact. In the draft Cumulative Impact Assessment 2023 the modelling shows an overall factor of up to 1.5, which means that for every additional licence granted the number of undesirable behaviours expected in the area in a year would increase by up to a multiple of 1.5. This means **a 50% increase in undesirable behaviours from any one new or extended licence, similarly the figures suggest a 26% increase in reported theft for each additional licence issued - for whatever type of venue: club, restaurant or café.** In relation to noise, it concludes,

**'The number of licensed premises is a significant factor in the generation of noise complaints.'**

The policies in relation to the cumulative impact zone are directed at the global and cumulative effects of licences on the area as a whole (D16. of the SoLP).

D23. **'The proximity of residential accommodation is a general consideration with regard to the prevention of public nuisance.** It goes on, **'The nature of cumulative impact is that it is cumulative and affects not only the immediate vicinity of the premises, but the wider area;** thus the number of people visiting the premises, the nature of licensable activities and **the lateness of operations have an impact on an area as a whole, irrespective of whether or not there is residential accommodation in proximity to the premises.'** **(our emphasis)**

It is important to note the policy relates to the global effects of alcohol licences in the whole impact zone and not just a part of it.

**Appendix 2 : Crime and Disorder**

The draft Cumulative Impact Assessment 2023 states by September 2022 crime in Westminster had reached pre-pandemic levels. It compared the proportion of crimes that

occurred in 2022 against the period of the 2020 CIA (2017 - 2019) it indicates that '**crimes within Westminster has concentrated even further within West End Zone 1.**' (p.52).

It confirmed the majority of the hotspots for the four major crime types (overnight thefts, robbery, drug offences, violence against person) were closely concentrated in the West End, stating,

'This provides further evidence to the greater prevalence of criminal offences within this area, and given the temporal nature of this analysis, also suggests that criminal activity within this area is getting worse.' (p.47)

Overall the West End Zone 1 accounts for:

- Just under 66% of all crime in Westminster
- 47% of violent crimes - approximately 59% at night (most prior to and after midnight)
- 44% (968) of all overnight robberies
- Over 65% of sexual offences.
- 52% of all night time alcohol related ASB
- 74% drug offences, small clusters include Soho - Old Compton Street
- 57% of all ASB call details included reference to public house/nightclub, night-time transport route, station, hotel or restaurant establishment

It confirms the majority of crime takes place on Friday / Saturday and Saturday/Sunday between 6pm - 6am. Overnight crime is identified as being particularly prevalent in Old Compton Street, Greek Street and Frith Street.

The level of crime, disorder and anti-social behaviour continues to be a huge problem in Soho, the crime figures are high and rising. The police crime reports for April/May 2023 shows current levels of alcohol related assaults, sexual assaults and robberies within the West End area are now higher than at pre-COVID levels. The peak times for crime being between 10pm - 2am.

In Soho the majority of robberies take place at night, with people being targeted as they leave venues. Alongside the robberies and assaults drug dealing is a huge problem with groups of dealers congregating to sell drugs to people as they leave premises or as they pass by. There are more dealers in the area at night than during the day, this is directly linked to the large number of venues and people which creates the drugs market. Pickpockets also operate in the area, they are a part of a well organised criminal group who arrive in a van at night and disperse into

Soho before returning to be driven away.

It is well known that intoxicated people become victims of crime, their vulnerability being exploited by gangs or individuals who are in Soho explicitly to target them. We believe patrons leaving this restaurant at night will be at high risk of becoming victims of crime.

### **Appendix 3 : ██████████ Sleep Survey Results - 31 October 2022**

The survey conducted by ██████████ confirms that residents are disturbed by noise at night and this is having a negative impact on their lives.

87 people have responded of which 78 are Soho residents with ages spread fairly evenly from 22 to 80.

59% have lived in Soho more than 10 years  
26% between 3 and 10 years

6% between 1 and 3 years and

9% have lived here less than a year  
42% own their homes

20% are Soho Housing Association and the rest tenants with other landlords 10 respondents

have children living at home with them

58% have double glazing 37% single glazing

5% have triple glazing

24% of respondents have their sleep disturbed 7 nights a week

16% of respondents have their sleep disturbed 5 or 6 nights a week 19% of respondents have their sleep disturbed 3 or 4 nights a week 19% of respondents have their sleep disturbed once or twice a week 20% do not have a problem with environmental noise pollution

Topping the list in September was people drinking in the street with 54 mentions, then pedicabs with 51, waste collections at 48, construction noise 36, and car horns 33 and deliveries at 25.

Other noise sources identified were air conditioning, motorbikes revving, building alarms and music from licensed venues. The most common identified problem at 42% of respondents was people drinking and shouting in the street.

64% of respondents agreed that noise nuisance from increased commercial activity at night is the most serious problem impacting Soho residents quality of life

46% of respondents agreed that noise nuisance is so bad that they have considered moving away from Soho

60% of respondents agreed that noise nuisance and sleep deprivation is adversely impacting my health and the health of the people they live with.

67% of respondents agreed that the council should base its noise policy on the World Health Organisation guidelines

64% of respondents agreed that our ward councillors should make this their priority during the next four years

69% of respondents agreed that during the time I have lived in Soho noise pollution has got significantly worse

73% of respondents agreed that if noise limits are being exceeded the council should consider reviewing existing alcohol licences

72% of respondents agreed that the council should install electronic noise monitoring in Soho

56% of respondents agreed that the council should not grant additional premises licence for the sale of alcohol in Soho.

62% of respondents agreed that the council should not grant any extensions of hours for premises in Soho

68% of respondents agreed that the council should renew its noise strategy as a matter of urgency

Many respondents made additional comments:-

████████████████████, the noise & air pollution finally broke me. Like the frog in the pan of water with the heat gradually turned up, it took me a while to realise that it wasn't me going soft, it was the significant degradation of the environment around me. Since moved out of my flat, several other tenants have moved in & swiftly out again citing sleep disruption & excessive night noise as their reason for leaving. The flat is now used as an office rather than as residential.

I am disappointed that another restaurant unit is going to be let on Hopkins Street by Shaftesbury when the residents already have an enormous amount of noise from the existing restaurants. No doubt they will also want an alcohol license, which will increase the noise and disturb residents even more.

████████████████████ I find it extremely exhausting not able to have rest at night, Screams and noise of drunk people every night, The Landlord ██████ does not want to change the windows to a double glazing nor allow tenants to pay privately for windows to be upgraded. Noise at home, lack of sleep, and concentration in the day time. I have a hand held noise monitor, I recorded noise levels of 97db outside the pub at the corner of ██████████

More consideration needs to be given to residents from councillors, people visiting the area and local businesses in particular those who serve alcohol and have late night licences. Decisions such as granting planning and licence applications should not be made by people who do not live in the area and are therefore not impacted by the decision making.

Very difficult to get the local authority to understand and take complaints seriously. Officers often helpful but then the case goes to committee and they always seem to rule in favour of the commercial premises rather than residents.

There is supposed to be a presumption to refuse new licences but in practice the council still lets new things through until after Midnight, which is far too late and has made a nonsense of the policy.

There should be a quiet window of 11pm to 8am every day. 7am deliveries are far too early for a lot of people if they are noisy or use cages or refrigeration.

████████████████████ Regularly now (most nights) there are traffic jams in the street at 3am in the morning with cars picking up people leaving clubs. The cars frequently are using their horns. Last night they had their door open with music blaring. we have 2 motorbike stands close together. 1 in ██████████ and 1 in ██████████ There is always at least one bike revving up at either 3am or really early like 530am This noise has changed and increased over the past 3-4 years. I am woken up most nights at about 3am. And i have double glazing and am on [a high] floor.

Businesses take no responsibility for their customers drinking/eating and mainly shouting outside, including when they are queuing, and particularly when they are leaving. Post al fresco, there is a new attitude that anything goes on the streets and that includes contempt for the community who live here. The Council need to rethink this and put some major resource into enforcement.

████████████████████ It's never been this noisy!

Early hours waste collections (including bottle smashing) also includes the food & beverage businesses putting their waste in the street and bottle bins at anti-social hours ahead of collection times. Our local restaurants are not supposed to put bottles out between the hours of 23:00 and 07:00 but they frequently do. Frequently delivery trucks some with noisy refrigeration units are also delivering early hours. Also deliveries & pedicabs. Unfortunately my lack of sleep due to noise has caused serious health issues and I now cannot work and suffer anxiety and depression. I'm woken up on average 5 times per night and have considered suicide. Why I'm being denied sleep between the hours of 11pm and 7am astonishes me. The Metropolitan Police Service wishes to submit the further following information with regards to the representation made for opposing the granting a variation of a Premises Licence for:

**CheeMc, 32 Great Windmill Street, W1D 7LR – 23/07209/LIPV**

As stated in my initial representation, the venue currently operates as a core hour's restaurant with on-sale alcohol sales within the Cumulative Impact Zone (CIZ).

The applicant is applying to vary the current licence to extend the hours of alcohol sales which will take it beyond that of the Westminster's core hour's policy.

The Police have concerns that by allowing the venue to open for longer, customers will be drawn to the venue and will remain within the CIZ rather than dispersing, thus adding to cumulative impact. The extension of alcohol sales may also increase the risk of intoxication and vulnerability of its customers as they disperse from the area.

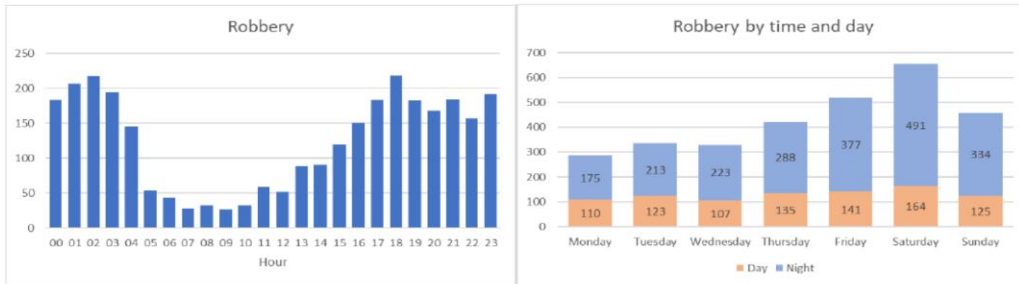
The current levels of Assaults, Sexual Assaults and Robberies within the West End are now higher than at pre-covid levels and when the current Cumulative Impact Assessment was conducted in 2020.

The new draft Cumulative Impact Assessment 2023 states that the West End (West End and St James Wards), now account for just under 66% of all crime within Westminster and 74% of all 'public realm' crime.

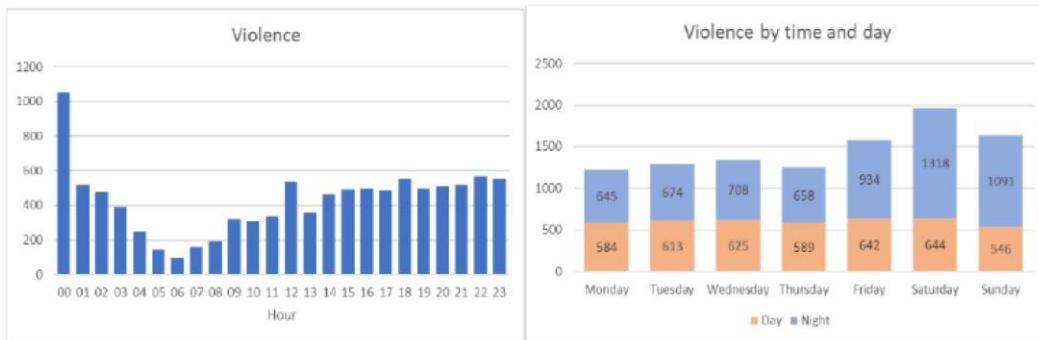
On page 51 of the new assessment, it describes the area known as West End Zone 1 (where this venue sits) as the epicentre for issues associated with cumulative impact and states that this area holds a quarter of all licensed premises, a majority of which are restaurants.

Within the CIZ, there is a high concentration of Street Robberies and Violence against the Person and a majority of these offences are committed at or after midnight and especially on Fridays and Saturdays. This can be seen on pages 16 and 18 in the new draft policy which states:

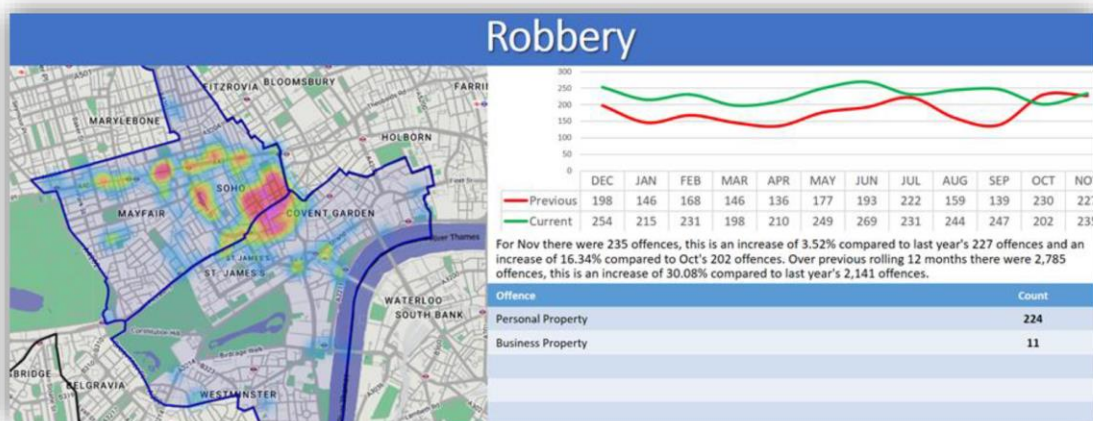
**Robbery offences are highly concentrated by time and day, with 70% (2,101) occurring between 6pm and 6am. Key times are after midnight on Saturday and Sunday mornings.**

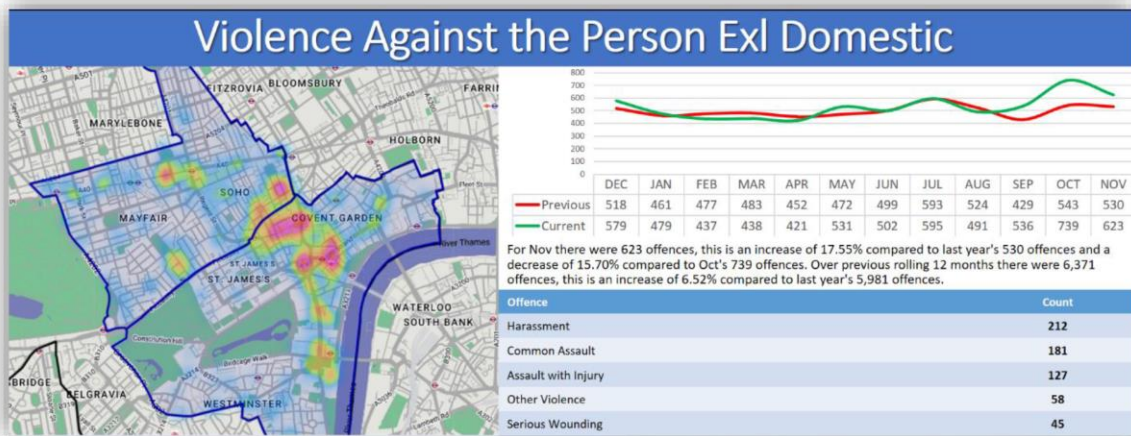


**Approximately 59% (6,028) of violent offences occur between 6pm to 6am and most concentrated in the period just prior and to and after midnight. The peak times are 11pm to 3pm, especially overnight Friday/Saturday and Saturday/Sunday.**

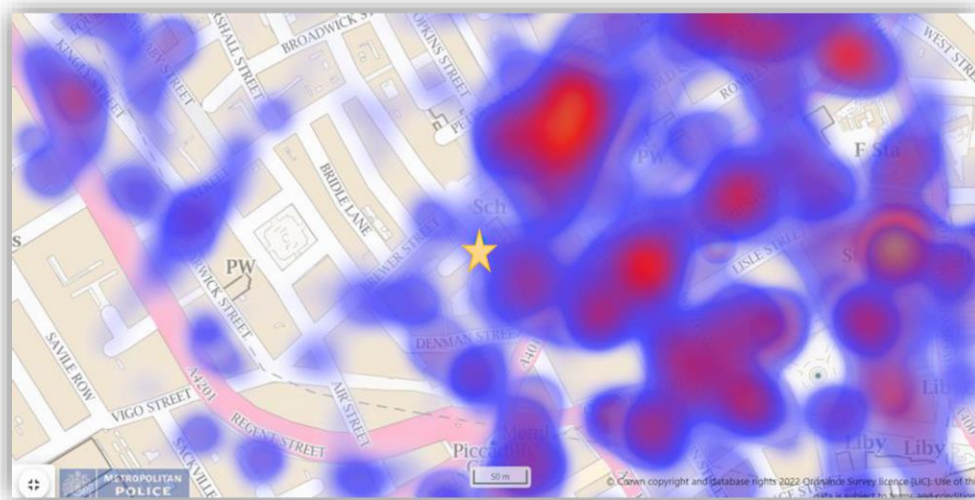


Of these crimes, the most recent figures can be seen below and shows the offences and heat maps for Robbery and Violence against the person for the month of November 2023.





The last illustration shows a heat map of Robbery and Violence offences within the CIZ that have taken place within the last 12 weeks.



The Police feel that the applicant has not submitted sufficient mitigation to show that they won't add to cumulative impact and the Police have concerns that by allowing another venue within the CIZ to remain open beyond core hours, it will have a negative impact within the area and has the potential to increase the demand on the Police and the Emergency Services in an already very demanding area.

It is for these reasons that the Police have objected to this application and request that the Licensing Sub-Committee refuses the application in its current form.

**Summary of application**

**32 Great Windmill Street, London, W1d 7LR**

These submissions relate to the variation application submitted on behalf of the applicant who operates the above premises.

The original premises licence was granted in September 2022 for this restaurant which is located in the Westminster CIA. The applicant applied for, and was granted the Westminster core policy hours in respect of restaurants.

Since September 2022 and the submission of this new variation application, the applicant has traded without incident.

This variation application seeks to extend the trading hours beyond the policy core hours, for a premises within the Westminster CIZ.

As a result the following policies apply to this application.

Taking each of these policies individually, the applicant would say this.

**Policy CIP1    Cumulative Impact Policy**

The premises has traded to the core hours since September 2022, without any incident, therefore has not added to the cumulative impact in the area. This has been achieved by following a number of robust conditions agreed on the original licence, (attached).

Therefore the question to be considered with this application is would the grant of the extended hours mean these premises would now add to the cumulative impact in the area.

From Monday to Thursday, the request is for an additional 30 minutes per day, for the sale of alcohol and the provision of late night refreshment.

Friday and Saturday the request is for an addition 1 hour 30 minutes for the sale of alcohol and the provision of late night refreshment.

There is no request for a change of hours on a regular Sunday.

Sundays immediately preceding a bank holiday, the request is for the same as a Friday and Saturday, i.e. an increase of 1hour 30 minutes for the sale of alcohol and the provision of late night refreshment.

In total, on a normal week, the applicant is seeking an additional 5 hours of licensable activity.

Given the current hours provide no increase to the cumulative impact in the area, would an additional 30 minutes of licensable activity on a Monday to Thursday change this?

Very unlikely. It has been suggested that by being open later, this restaurant will encourage customers to stay out in the area longer. The applicant would argue that if a customer was going to stay out in town after they have left the restaurant, then they would do this whether

licensable activities ceased at 23:30 or 00:00. It is more likely that by staying open that little bit longer the customer is more satisfied they have had their night out and are seeking more than ever to return to their homes.

For Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays immediately preceding a bank holiday, the same general principal applies. The rest of town stays open later, and the current permission for licensable activities extends to midnight on these days. The longer customers stay in the restaurant, seated having consumed alcohol with their extended table meal, the longer these customers are staying off the streets, and visiting other venues which may be open. Again, by the end of the licensable period, the strong likelihood is they will be seeking a route home rather than looking to extend their evening elsewhere.

In addition, the business has to be practical, in that they need to ensure the customer has enough time to come into the restaurant, order food, eat their food and leave without being rushed, therefore the last entry for Monday to Thursday would be 22:30, with licensable activity ceasing at 00:00 and the doors to the premises locked at 00:30, and for Friday Saturday, and Sunday preceding bank holidays, the last entry would be 00:00, with licensable activity to cease at 01:30, and doors locked at 02:00.

Therefore, there will be no opportunity for any customer to use the premises for a quick snack and drinks 5 to 10 minutes before the end of licensable activity.

Further, it is rare for all restaurant customers to remain on the premises until the terminal hour. Customers finish their food and drink at different times, and so leave the premises on a staggered basis. A table of 4 leaving the restaurant less than 1 hour 30 minutes before the end of licensable activities, cannot be replaced by a new table of four given the point already made in this section.

In addition, transport links away from the premises are favourable to ensure the customers from the restaurant can disperse and leave the area quickly and safely.

The closest tube stations are as follows:

Piccadilly Circus 1min away from the restaurant

- 1.Piccadilly line week day finish 00:00 and weekend 24hours
- 2.Bakerloo line all week ends 00:00

Leicester square 3mins away from the restaurant

- 1.Northern line week day finish 00:00 and weekend 24 hours
- 2.Picadilly line week day finish 00:00 and weekend 24 hours

In addition there are various taxi's that can assist in customers getting home safely.

## **Policy HRS1**

## **Core Policy Hours Policy**

This application seeks to take the permitted hours of operation beyond the core hours policy. In mitigation, the applicant would say this.

There is no regulated entertainment taking place at the premises, therefore no potential of increasing public nuisance in terms of noise.

All customers will have been in the premises under strict restaurant conditions, meaning the venue does not lend itself to encouraging customers to drink to excess, and therefore cause a public nuisance or/ and ASB, on leaving the premises.

Indeed, given the strict restaurant conditions, they will leave the premises in a relaxed frame of mind, not seeking trouble.

The favourable transport links have been detailed under the previous section above, and will ensure no addition to the cumulative impact in the area.

The existing licence already has robust conditions in place in respect of deliveries (condition 13), and the applicant is not seeking to change this condition.

## **Policy RNT1                      Restaurants Policy**

The premises currently operate to robust restaurant conditions within the core hours, with no incident, and no addition to the cumulative impact in the area.

There are three conditions contained in the original licence, (attached), that relate specifically to the restaurant policy, and again the applicant is not seeking to change any of these conditions.

The conditions that relate to this are conditions 11, 25 and 26. These conditions are to remain.

### **Conclusions:**

In the above submissions, the applicant has dealt with the prevention of crime and disorder objective, and the prevention of public nuisance objective. This variation will not engage the public safety objective, or the protection of children from harm objective. There is no addition to the cumulative impact in the area currently on any of the 4 licensing objectives, and it is the applicants submission that this variation will not change the current situation.

As a result the applicant requests that the application as applied for be granted.

  - (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.

- 8(iv). (1) Sub-paragraph 8(iv)(2) below applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph 8(ii)(b) above on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.
- (2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.
